
We have political and personal freedom unknown to those in Communist countries. It has been won and preserved at a great price.

Chief Cullity Ends Career

Master Chief Aviation Boatswain's Mate, William M. Cullity, Chief Master-At-Arms for 18 months, was piped off Kitty Hawk to begin a well-earned retirement. Captain Pugh presented a plaque to Chief Cullity as the 42year-old veteran departed the ship in early November, prior to deployment.

Chief Cullity began his career in September 1942 in Boston, Mass., at the age of 18. The young New England lad was aboard the destroyer USS Dehaven when she was torpedoed off Guadalcanal in February 1943. Cullity received his discharge following World War II in 1946, but re-enlisted in 1949 in time for duty in the Korean Conflict. He earned the Navy Unit Commendation for his three years of duty in the waters off Korea.

South Pole Duty

Chief Cullity's most memorable experience was his two years of duty in Antarctica in conjunction with the 1957-58 Geophysical Year. He was the sole aviation boatswain's mate assigned to an expedition that included such famous explorers as Sir Edmund Hillary and Sir Hubert Wilkins.

Sporting a full beard and the Navy-Marine Corps Medal, Chief Cullity re- Capt. Pugh bids farewell to Chief Maritime Photo Contest. turned to warmer waters in 1959 when Cullity with a plaque of appreciation he received orders for duty in Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, with the Fleet

Chief Cullity reported aboard Kitty Hawk in September 1964, and was the leading chief in the Air Department before assuming duties as CMAA in February 1965.

He was a model sailor who was re-spected by both his seniors and juniors. His understanding nature and sense of responsibility were admired, and will not soon be forgotten by his shinmates.

Chief Cullity was also the ship's brig counselor. He drew great satisfaction in helping young sailors who had strayed from the herd to get back on the right path. There are sailors throughout the Navy who will remember, in the ensuing years, his guiding hand, and be thankful that there was someone like him in the early years of their Naval careers.

His pride in the Navy was obvious to all who knew him. He often remark-"Kitty Hawk is just a hunk of steel. Without good men, she is worthdo aboard this ship, no matter what space to keep things 'ship-shape'

Chief Cullity reminisced that his past two years aboard Kitty Hawk had been his most enjoyable. "This is the best ship in the Pacific Fleet and the greatest bunch of sailors I've served with in the Navy." In his twenty years in the Navy, he

received more than 25 ribbons and citations for his devoted duty to his

The contestant's name and address should be printed or typed on a separate sheet of paper, and attached to the back of each print, or printed on the transparency mount.


Photographs not awarded a prize may be purchased by the Naval Institute, payment being made at the normal rates; photographs not purchased will

be returned after the judging. Entries should be mailed to the Photo Contest Editor, U.S. Naval Institute, Annapolis, Maryland, 21402.





For the second time in less than a year and a half, Kitty Hawk was the setting for a Hollywood movie produc-tion. On 11 & 12 October, Liberty In-ternational Productions of Hollywood transformed the flight deck of Kitty Hawk into a movie set for the filming of the final scenes of "What Am I Bid?". The film centers around a country-western theme, starring Leroy Van Dyke, Stephanie Hill, and Kris Nelson of the 'Ozzie & Harriet' television

Van Dyke is no stranger to country-western fans. His "Walk On By " is an all-time favorite with record sales in the vicinity of 800,000. Kris Nelson, Ricky's wife, is the daughter of former football great Tom Harmon of Mich-

The story centers around Van Dyke, a Navyman whose life's ambition is to become an auctioneer upon discharge, but somehow he gets sidetracked by a talent scout in the entertainment business. Matters are complicated when Van Dyke's sister (Kris Nelson) falls in love with the talent scout and Van Dyke falls for Stephanie Hill.

The final scenes of the movie are filmed aboard Kitty Hawk when Van Dyke returns to his old ship to give a benefit show. In these scenes, approximately 1,500 Kitty Hawk sailors had a chance to be on the screen.

Throughout both days of filming, most of the men of Kitty Hawk had a chance to see a movie in the making. The thousands of feet of hot lights, cameras, cues, and all the glamour that is found only on the Hollywood beat were much in evidence on the flight deck. Many crewmembers had the opportunity to converse with several of the stars while off the set.

The movie, which is scheduled to be released in March 1967, will be anxiously awaited by the 1,500 movie stars of Kitty Hawk.

The occasion of this record is the result of competent leadership, superior technical skill and outstanding airmanship. This performance is in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service."

Cdr. Wilson accepted the award on behalf of the 30 pilots and radarintercept officers of the Miramarbased squadron. Cdr. Wilson cited the entire squadron by saying: "... This award represents the work of many men. I'm very proud to accept this award on behalf of every man in this squadron..."





VF-213 flew more than 1,800 sorties against insurgent forces in both North and South Vietnam during the period 23 NOV 65 - 23 MAY 66.

Although the Mark II, P-4B Phantom jets armed with Sparrow III air-to-air missiles, were used primarily as fighter-bombers, the squadron assumed the attack role in the highly-successful attacks on the Hai Dong and Haiphong bridges, and the Uong Bi thermal plant near Hanoi.

The awards were presented in recognition of the part these aviators played in the 1965-66 WESTPAC deployment of Kitty Hawk.

The Black Lions' of VF-213 are again flying their F-4B Phantons as a component of Air Wing ELEVEN. They were recently seen escorting Russian 'Bears' through the skies above Kitty Haw.

While enroute from Hawaii to Japan, Kitty Hawk was blessed by visits from several Soviet reconnaissance alroraft. Most of these were Bears', a four-engine, turbo-propaircraft with a maximum speed of approximately 600 m.p.h. with a 25,000 pound load, and a range of 7,800 wites

The Russians also sent a flight of 'Bisons' over Kitty Hawk. The 'Bison' is believed to be the Soviet Union's only operational four-jet bomber, but has been withdrawn from strategic bombing units. It's primary mission - long range maritime recommaissance - was made quite apparent to Kitty Hawk.

Alcindor Ready To Bring NCAA Championship Back To UCLA

sity basketball, but Lew Alcindor of the UCLA Bruins has already been named to practically every pre-season All-American Team. Some experts have gone as far as to concede the NCAA Championship to the Bruins for the next three years. Such is the impact that 'Looie' Alcindor has had on college basketball.

Schoolboy All-American

Alcindor was a schoolboy All-American at Power Memorial in New York City, scoring 2,067 points and hauling in 2.001 rebounds in three years in which Power won 71 of 72 games. Eastern collegiate coaches were set to grab this high school phenomenon, but Coach Johnny Wooden of UCLA was more persuasive. Alcindor chose UCLA for 'its educational program, not its basketball reputation'. Alcindor was a B-student in high school, and unlike many ath-letes, didn't need his coaches' assistance to stay on the squad.

Perfect 21-0 record

Last season, Alcindor led the Frosh to a perfect 21-0 record while averaging 33.1 points and 21 re-

No player since Wilt Chamberlain played at Kansas in the middle '50's has had the publicity given to Lew Alcindor. The obvious question is: 'Just how good is Alcindor? Is he just another tall string-bean with plenty of press clippings, or is he as good as they say he is?"

More aspiration than Wilt

Wilt Chamberlain who went through the same adoration as Alcindor is now experiencing says: "The boy has more aspiration than I had in col-lege. He uses his head and has the stuff to make a good pro in a few years.'

All-around player

Alcindor can dominate a game like Wilt, but then the similarity stops. This young star is a well-coached. polished player with plenty of savvy. He dribbles very well for a man his size, and his hustle and teamwork will make Coach Wooden smile often in the next three years. His best shot is a medium jumper from 10-15 feet out. He drives the baseline well, and is a tiger on both boards. And most important of all, Alcindor is a winner. Chamberlain has carried a 'loser's complex' with him since his college days.

Alcindor will have a lot of help in UCLA's bid for a national championship this year. Mike Warren (18.9) and Mike Lynn (16.9) are back from last year's team which compiled an 18-8 record, while three other Frosh stars - Lucious Allen, Kenny Heitz and Lynn Shackleford - will battle for the other positions.

Adolph Rupp, the 'Baron' of all collegiate coaches, says: "Alcindor is no one-man team. Kansas couldn't win the championship with Chamber-

lain. I concede nothing to UCLA,"
And thus, the 1966-67 NCAA College Basketball season opens on the 3rd of December, the beginning of the "Alcindor Era."
