



# The commissioning tradition

t is a time-honored tradition, this ceremony that commissions a ship of the United States Navy. The commissioning ceremony signifies the acceptance for service and the entry of a ship into the fleet.

When her commissioning pennant breaks to fly from the mast, USS Abraham Lincoln (CVN 72) becomes a proud ship of the line.

The naval commissioning ceremony has been a tradition of all navies for centuries. It has been in the United States Navy since its beginning. The commissioning is the final act that marks entrance of a man-of-war into the naval forces of her nation. This is the final and perhaps the most significant event of the triad that brings a ship to life: keel laying, launching and christening, and commissioning.

In the early periods of our navy's history, no exact commissioning procedure was prescribed. Thus, a ship's date of commissioning was recorded as any one of a number of days — when the colors were first raised, when the officers and crew reported aboard, when the first log entry was made, or when the ship first put out to sea.

Throughout the years, however, one visible and significant sign of the commissioned ship has remained constant: active ships of the United States Navy, from days of handsome frigates under sail to the era of the nuclear powered ships, have proudly flown a commissioning pennant and the "Stars and Stripes."

Today, as the distinctive mark of a commissioned warship, the pennant is flown except when displaced by the flag of a higher authority.

Our national commissioning pennant is blue at the hoist with a union of seven white stars and a horizontal red and white stripe at the fly. It has been the symbol for centuries of a man-of-war. The symbol is believed to date from the 17th century, when the Dutch were at war with the English. Dutch Admiral Maarten Harpertzoon Tromp hoisted a broom at his masthead to symbolize his intention to sweep the British from the sea. British Admiral William Blake hoisted a horsewhip to the masthead in response. The victorious British thus set the precedent for a long, narrow commissioning pennant to symbolize the original horsewhip as the distinctive symbol for a fighting ship.

The commissioning ceremony is a solemn, yet joyous event. It is within this context that the ship is brought to life.

On her commissioning day, USS Abraham Lincoln assumes a unique personality and is infused with the will, the spirit and the dedication of those who serve in her. Indeed, the indomitable will and the spirit of her namesake, President Abraham Lincoln, already have been imbued in the officers and men serving aboard this vessel.

This aircraft carrier has a special international distinction wherever she sails. USS Abraham Lincoln projects the character and perseverance of her namesake and her nation.

We firmly believe that your presence here today will ensure us "fair winds and a following sea" in all her endeavors.

# Mr. Lincoln's Navy

eadership. Innovation. Integrity. The many attributes of Abraham Lincoln, the man, are reflected aboard USS Abraham Lincoln, the Navy's newest aircraft carrier.

Lincoln's Navy. Not many of us today, barring a few historians, think of President Lincoln in a naval context. Indeed, his many great acts and personal heroism are not often marked by naval milestones.

But before he was President, Lincoln was a leading patent attorney. He also made modest contributions as an inventor, including many mechanical devices, one of which was a device designed to lift vessels over shoals.

Historians credit Lincoln's interest in naval artillery with bringing Commander John A. Dahlgren to the forefront in his early career. Mr. Lincoln often visited the Washington Navy Yard, where Dahlgren labored, for demonstrations of naval ordnance and other weapons.


Lincoln's personal interest and intervention in naval matters during the Civil War are credited with making the blockade of Confederate ports and rivers into a reality. As the war began, Confederate forces had seized or threatened important navy yards. Quickly, Lincoln realized that a strong Union navy should be created, literally from scratch.

Historians say the relative unpreparedness of the national fleet was a blessing in disguise. The Confederacy may have had the upper hand in the navy yards, but since the peacetime fleet was sparse, the Confederacy got few ships. In spite of excellent seamanship, these soon were obsolete.

The Union needed deepwater ships to enforce its coastal blockade and a flotilla of river vessels was required to press operations on the great rivers that were the highways into the South.

The Union pressed many ships into service. New vessels also were quick to come, yielding early Union victories that were important to national morale. From there, the course was clear.

Union Navy superiority was established inland, and its blockading forces severed the Confederacy's overseas supply lines. The lack of



vital supplies foretold the land battle victories that would close the war.


Lincoln and the Union had learned the lesson that secure sea lanes of communication mean the survival of an island nation such as the United States. That doctrine continues today.

Another little noticed lesson of the era was Lincoln's contribution to naval aviation. Thaddeus Lowe came to Lincoln with the idea for a corps of observation balloons. Some deployed in the Washington area aboard the George Washington Park Custis, a converted coal barge moored on the Potomac River during the Civil War and named for Lincoln's father-in-law. But the idea never took shape.

The real beginnings of naval aviation would wait some fifty years.

# **Beginnings**

Before the ship there was the crew. Three crewmembers reported "aboard" Lincoln's Precommissioning Unit when the ship as we know her today really didn't exist.

The colossus was beginning to take shape when Master Chief Petty Officer Robert C. Wellcome, Petty Officer 2nd Class Carey E. Campbell and Captain Ralph H. Lipfert arrived.

Master Chief Wellcome arrived first, on January 20, 1987. "The ship was built up to the main deck," says Wellcome. "You had to be careful where you were walking because there were a tremendous number of big holes."

According to Master Chief Wellcome, there were no frills built into the ship at that time, no heat, no lighting, no installed ventilation. In fact, there was no such thing as habitability, only big open spaces. Even the bulkheads weren't up yet.


Lincoln's second crewmember to report, Petty Officer Campbell, says the bow wasn't installed when he first arrived in May of that year. "I saw them put the bow on," Campbell related. "It was picked up, set in place and welded together. It was an impressive sight to see from the pier."

The ship's 350-ton superstructure was getting its final touches on the pier at about this same time. It would later be lifted by a 900-ton capacity crane onto the flight deck. Newport News Shipbuilding and Drydock Company's workers scurried above and below decks simultaneously fitting, grinding and welding the superstructure into place.

While the shipyard work proceeded, Master Chief Wellcome initiated the crew's part in the massive project. He began by working with Fleet Training Command (FTC) in Norfolk. "They didn't think we would be manned until July or August of '87. There was no organization, no money, no unit identification code; we did not exist on the Navy rolls."

Those challenges notwithstanding, Master Chief Wellcome coordinated with FTC and Superintendent of Shipbuilding to form the nucleus organization for the 3,000 crew members to follow.

Petty Officer 2nd Class Carey E. Campbell hit the deck running by organizing the fledgling crew's transportation department. He later attended several schools on the ship's electrical



systems which he now helps to repair and maintain.

In July 1987, Master Chief Wellcome organized subsequent arrivals into working parties to clean up Building 608. The tan, four-story structure was to be home for the ship's crew until April 1989, when offices and berthing spaces began moving aboard the ship. Getting the building habitable was no easy task. A lot of painting, deck cleaning and furniture repair was needed to establish suitable office spaces.

Captain Lipfert, the ship's Reactor Officer, reported aboard and immediately rolled up his shirt sleeves to assist with the start-up of the Precommissioning Unit. It would be almost two years before he completed installation of the ship's two Westinghouse nuclear reactors.

Arrangements were made for berthing single sailors and geographical bachelors who were arriving for duty aboard. Captain Lipfert and Master Chief Wellcome arranged for rooms in a Navy barracks (originally a school in downtown Newport News). Huntington Hall became the home for over 400 Lincoln sailors, only to be outgrown in the first year.

The crew started small in humble surroundings. It has grown large and now inhabits the Navy's newest and finest ship.

If there is seniority among plankowners, these three pioneers have clearly staked their claim, having been aboard for two and a half years before the commissioning of this great ship.

# A force for peace

oday's commissioning of USS Abraham Lincoln marks almost 91 years of aircraft carrier construction, an evolution which began in 1898 under spartan conditions.

It was at the turn of the century when Assistant Secretary of the Navy Theodore Roosevelt spurred interest in both the Army and Navy to look into the work of Professor Samuel P. Langley from the Smithsonian Institute. He was actively developing the airplane, or "aerodrome." This was four years before the historic Wright Brothers' flight at Kitty Hawk, North Carolina. The Navy demurred, however, describing the airplane as "only fit for land service."

However in 1910 — seven years after the Kitty Hawk flight — naval interest in air flight from ships was renewed.

It was in late 1910 that civilian flyer Eugene Ely launched his Curtiss pusher plane from an inclined deck aboard the cruiser Birmingham in Hampton Roads, Virginia. Two months later in January 1911, Ely took off from shore and landed on a platform erected on the stern of the cruiser Pennsylvania while it was anchored in San Francisco Bay. This landing was the Navy's first arrested landing, as Ely's plane was stopped at the 120-foot mark by his arresting gear (mounted on the bottom of his aircraft) snagging cables stretched across the deck and anchored with 50-pound bags.

It was not until after the first World War, during which the Navy used seaplanes for reconnaissance, that the Navy converted the collier Jupiter (a coal carrying ship) and two battle cruisers into aircraft carriers.

Jupiter, known thereafter as USS Langley was used primarily for research and development. The two battle cruisers became the first real carriers: Lexington and Saratoga.

In 1929, the Navy was authorized to build its third carrier, the Ranger, to be followed by Wasp and Hornet in the mid 30's. These carriers were 14,500-ton vessels, a far cry from today's 95,000-ton super carriers.

Despite the additional construction during World War II of the escort carriers, or CVEs as they were known, it would be the Essex-class which would be the bedrock of naval air oper-

ations against the Imperial Japanese Forces in the Pacific. Essex-class carriers were to endure until well beyond World War II, with many remaining in commission until the late '60s and early '70s. The Essex-class carrier USS Lexington is still in commission today and serves as a training carrier for aspiring naval aviators.

In 1949 the keel for the Navy's first super carrier, initially named United States, was laid in Newport News, Virginia. This projected 60,000-ton aircraft carrier, however, fell victim to competing interests. Subsequently, the '50's saw the construction of USS Forrestal, lead ship of a new class of true super carriers, and the introduction of nuclear powered ships. The Navy's first nuclear aircraft carrier, USS Enterprise (CVN 65) was commissioned on November 25, 1961 and is deployed to the Pacific today.

Even more formidable are the Nimitz-class carriers, of which USS Abraham Lincoln is the fifth. These super carriers displace over 95,000 tons and will take the Navy's air arm well into the twenty-first century.

### **Mixed emotions**

as Abraham Lincoln is commissioned and enters the fleet, there are mixed emotions at Newport News Shipbuilding and Drydock Company, builder of the aircraft carrier.

For some, the departure of the ship from the yard is a happy event. The commissioning is a time to celebrate the delivery of another first-class ship to the Navy. It's time to celebrate a job well done and it's a joyous feeling experienced many times during the company's 103-year history. Ever since delivery of Ranger (CV 4) in 1934, Newport News has constructed the strategically important floating air bases that have been so important in U.S. foreign policy.

For other employees, however, Abraham Lincoln's commissioning is a solemn event. It is like saying good-bye to an old friend, one that many employees have "lived" with since the ship's keel was laid on November 3, 1984. They also said farewell to the officers and crew, many of whom have become friends during the last two years. Building Abraham Lincoln required an intricate coordination of man and machinery, a unique blend of talent and technology, carefully orchestrated to mesh the individual contributions of thousands of employees into one project.

That's why Newport News Shipbuilding employees will follow with interest the travels of Abraham Lincoln, because each man and woman onboard feels "that's my ship, I built it."

Some 30,000 Newport News employees help make the yard the nation's premier shipbuilder. Since 1886, the shipyard's employees have built more than 700 ships, from passenger liners to battleships, from tugboats to aircraft carriers, from oil tankers to submarines. Those ships have carried the Newport News hallmark of quality to ports throughout the world.

Today, Newport News' business base is centered primarily around building the Nimitz class aircraft carriers and the Los Angeles-class fast attack submarines.




Newport News delivered Nimitz (CVN 68) in 1975, followed by Dwight D. Eisenhower (CVN 69) in 1977, Carl Vinson (CVN 70) in 1982 and Theodore Roosevelt (CVN 71) in 1986. The shipyard is currently building George Washington (CVN 73), which will be christened next year, and has contracts to build John C. Stennis (CVN 74) and United States (CVN 75), also of the Nimitz-class.

Newport News also built the world's first nuclear-powered aircraft carrier, Enterprise (CVN 65), delivering her to the Navy in 1961. Enterprise is scheduled to return to the shipyard in 1990 for refueling and overhaul.

Newport News has delivered 17 Los Angeles class submarines to the Navy and is currently building 11 submarines of the same class. The company is also the lead design yard for the Navy's newest class of submarine, Seawolf, and is competing for construction contracts in that class.

Finally, I would like to recognize the wives, children and extended families of the men of LINCOLN. You have endured difficult work schedules and impossible traffic jams as we pushed to fashion ourselves into the finest crew in the Navy. Thank you for your understanding and dedication. We salute you and thank you, as should the nation. We know you will carry forward that same support as we become a ship of the line.

SHALL NOT PERISH

W. B. Hayden

aptain William B. Hayden was born in Oakland, California, but was raised in Bethesda, Maryland. He attended Dartmouth College under a Naval ROTC scholarship and graduated in 1966 with a Bachelor of Arts Degree. He went on inactive duty for a year earning a Masters of Aerospace Engineering Degree from Cornell University in June 1967.

Captain Hayden reported to flight training in June 1967 and was designated a Naval Aviator in September 1968. He reported to VT-21, Kingsville, Texas, for SERGRAD instructor duty in the F-9F and the TA-4. He then transferred to VF-121 in Miramar, California, where he

completed F-4 readiness training.

In March, 1970, he reported to VF-143, making two WESTPAC deployments with the "Pukin Dogs" aboard USS Enterprise (CVN 65). While overseas he was selected for test pilot training and graduated with distinction from the USAF Test Pilot School in December 1973. His next assignment was to Air Test and Evaluation Squadron Four at Point Magu, California, where he became Project Officer for the first Air Combat Maneuvering Range. Following Navy acceptance of the ACMR, Captain Hayden became Assistant Chief Project Officer for Air-to-Air Tactics and also served as test pilot for CNO Project HAVE IDEA until May 1976.

After completing replacement pilot training in the F-14A, Captain Hayden reported to VF-14 aboard USS John F. Kennedy (CV 67). He made two MED deployments, serving first as Operations Officer and then as Admin/Personnel Officer for the "Tophatters." In November 1978, he reported to VF-101 serving first as Maintenance Officer and ultimately as Executive Officer. In November 1979, he received orders to VF-32 as Executive Officer and returned to JFK for one more MED deployment where the "Swordsmen" won the Admiral Joseph Clifton Award as best Fighter Squadron in the Navy. Captain Hayden assumed command of VF-32 in April 1981 and accepted new reconnaissance configured (TARPS) Tomcats before deploying with Air Wing Six on USS Independence (CV 62). The "Swordsmen" won the Battle "E" for their performance during the subsequent Mediterranean Sea deployment. In September 1982, Captain Hayden reported to Nuclear Power



School in Orlando, Florida. Upon completion of nuclear power training in March 1984, he reported to USS Dwight D. Eisenhower (CVN 69) as Executive Officer. Following two years on IKE, Captain Hayden reported to Washington, D.C., as Executive Assistant to the Deputy Assistant Secretary of the Navy for Tactical Programs. Captain Hayden commanded USS Iwo Jima (LPH 2) from April 1987 to November 1988 where his crew won the Battle "E" and all departmental awards. He assumed command of Abraham Lincoln (CVN 72) Precommissioning Unit in December 1988.

Captain Hayden's decorations include the Legion of Merit, the Meritorious Service Medal, one individual Air Medal, seven Strike/Flight Air Medals, and the Navy Commendation Medal with Combat "V." He has flown more than 4,000 hours in 20 different aircraft and logged more than 800 carrier landings.

Captain Hayden is married to the former Margaret "Kit" Church of Annapolis, Maryland. They reside in the Southern Points section of Virginia Beach, Virginia, while their two sons, Will and Matt, are away at college.

## Captain Robert L. Peterson, USN

### **Executive Officer**



aptain Robert L. Peterson graduated from the United States Naval Academy in 1968 and received his Masters Degree in Electrical Engineering from the Naval Postgraduate School in Monterey, California the following year. He then attended flight training in Pensacola, Florida, and earned his wings of gold as a Naval Aviator in June 1970.

Captain Peterson was assigned to VAW-124, where he served as Avionics Division Officer, deploying to the Western Pacific and to the Mediterranean Sea. In January 1975 he returned to the Naval Academy for instructor duty in the Academy's Electrical Engineering Department. From January 1978 until February 1980 he was assigned to the aircraft carrier USS America (CV 66) as Flight Deck Officer. He then returned to VAW-124 again as the squadron's Maintenance and then Operations Officer.

Upon detachment from VAW-124 in December 1982, Captain Peterson reported to Commander Carrier Airborne Early Warning Wing TWELVE, where in April 1983, he reported as Officer in Charge of the VAW-127 precommissioning detachment. He then became VAW-127's first Commanding Officer on 2 September 1983. From August 1985 until August 1987, Captain Peterson served as Air Officer in USS Coral Sea (CV 43). From September 1987 until May 1989, Captain Peterson completed nuclear power training, including schools in Orlando, Florida; Balston Spa, New York; Newport, Rhode Island, and Washington, D.C.

In June 1989 Captain Peterson reported as the Executive Officer for the Precommissioning Unit, Abraham Lincoln (CVN 72). Captain Peterson has accumulated more than 4,500 flight hours and more than 400 aircraft carrier arrested landings.

His decorations include two Meritorious Service Medals, three Air Medals, the Navy Achievement Medal, and various unit commendation medals, service and campaign medals.

The son of Mrs. F.J. Alt of Harvard, Illinois, he and his wife, the former Mary Ellen Andrew, reside in Norfolk, Virginia, with their children Robert, 19, and Erica, 16.

### Master Chief Petty Officer Howard R. Lincoln, USN

### **Command Master Chief**



aster Chief Aircraft Maintenanceman Howard R. Lincoln was born in Winfield, Kansas. He enlisted in the Navy Oct. 27, 1960. After enlisting, he attended basic training at Naval Training Center, San Diego, California. From January through August 1963, he was assigned to Training Squadron Seven. After attending Aviation Machinist Mate "B" School at Memphis, Tennessee, he was assigned to Patrol Squadron Four at NAS Barbors Point, Hawaii, where he qualified as an aircrewman in P2 Neptune aircraft, subsequently deploying to Southeast Asia.

He transitioned from the P2 Neptune to the P3 Orion in August of 1966 and made numerous deployments to the Western Pacific and Southeast Asia. Following shore duty and another squadron tour, he was transferred in July 1978 to the Navy Element, Headquarters, Allied Forces Southern Europe in Naples, Italy, where he served as the Command Master Chief. He then served as Command Master Chief of Patrol Squadron Fifty. Master Chief Lincoln was then transferred to Oceanographic Development Squadron Eight in Patuxent River, Maryland, where he served as Command Master Chief. He assumed duties as Command Master Chief of Precommissioning Unit Abraham Lincoln (CVN 72) on Dec. 31, 1987.

His decorations include one individual Air Medal with Strike/Flight Award, the Navy Commendation Medal with Combat "V," and both Vietnam Campaign and Service Medals.

Master Chief Lincoln is married to the former Suzanne Lee Margiot of Santa Clara, California. They reside in Newport News, Virginia, with their two sons, Thomas, 7, and Joshua, 6.



Rour score and seven years ago our fathers brought forth upon this continent, a new nation, conceived in Liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal.



### The newest seafarers

hipmates all. The Illinois state capitol rotunda in Springfield marked the start of navy careers for 73 men from the Land of Lincoln. On October 19, 1988, Governor James Thompson helped swear these young men into the Navy.

The ceremony marked the first time that a special recruit company from Illinois was formed and assigned to a future U.S. Navy man-of-war.

Men from the Land of Lincoln. Illinois is a state with a proud tradition of national service. Consider Illinois for a moment.

"We don't really have any seaports," says Michael A. Osborn, 22, of Alsip. "But we do have Lake Michigan, which can give you a sense of ocean since it is so large.

"I joined the Navy to make something of myself, although my previous jobs were OK. I know that I have matured and learned a lot about myself and about teamwork.

"Since I work on the flight deck, I know that everybody has to do his job right. If you don't, there will be casualties."

The men of the Lincoln Company already have found their calling in a variety of ratings.

Their dedication and perseverance started at Great Lakes Naval Training Center, where the Abraham Lincoln Company was named a "color company," honoring superior dedication, academic and training achievements.

Observers at the swearing-in ceremony saw a group of somewhat nervous young men who only a few months later were self-assured, disciplined and motivated.

The early lessons of teamwork and esprit de corps had sunk in.

"I learned a lot about the Navy and about life during boot camp and even more in "A" school," says Mark J. Cabanski of Elgin, a personnelman, who at 28 was one of the older recruits of the Abraham Lincoln Company.

"The Navy has taught me so much. As a civil-

ian, I thought I was mature, but the Navy has given me self-discipline."

Captain William B. Hayden, commanding officer of USS Abraham Lincoln, says the group "is a cohesive, extraordinarily motivated group of young men who support each other. Their identification with the state, with Abraham Lincoln and with each other has caused nice things to happen aboard the ship.

"The character of a ship is shaped by the character of her crew. There is much to learn aboard an aircraft carrier, and much responsibility placed upon these young men. But, I have already seen their response to the demands of Navy life, and I am proud to have them aboard."

As plankowners, men who are first assigned to a ship upon its commissioning, these young sailors have an added tradition and a duty.

"We really are the first owners of this ship," says Damage Controlman Third Class Jesse Powell, 19, of East St. Louis, the first Lincoln Company member to achieve petty officer status.

"The Navy has taught me a great deal, I have learned to take discipline, to take orders and to give them. I'm ready to defend my country. It is an honor to do so."

USS Abraham Lincoln is a combination of the American drive and the American desire for a strong national defense posture.

As a front line man-of-war, Abraham Lincoln will be ready for action, but her men prefer her to be an instrument for peace.

"I want to go to sea, and I feel an obligation to defend our country, but I don't want to see action as much as I want world peace," Petty Officer Cabanski says.

Abraham Lincoln, the man, was willing to fight to preserve his nation. The crew of USS Abraham Lincoln and the men from the Land of Lincoln are willing to do no less.

# A penny saved

onsider the Lincoln penny. Some people may think it doesn't go far these days, but not sailors aboard the Abraham Lincoln.

Sailors aboard the Navy's newest aircraft carrier have adapted the nation's copper coin for their ship's seal. They also glue pennies to their nametags as a unique way of distinguishing Abraham Lincoln sailors from other sailors in the fleet.

The ship's seal uses copper coloring and superimposes the famous silhouette of Lincoln found on the penny over the bow of the carrier. Wheat stalks flank the silhouette to the left and right.

The seal was created by Ezra L. Bettis, a machinist's mate first class, whose idea was inspired by the style of the old penny, sometimes called the "wheat penny."

"I was sitting at home trying to come up with an idea, and I must have had one of those old wheat pennies in my hand," he says.

Bettis decided to enter the ship's contest to design the seal, but coming up with the final design was no easy task.

"I was working on the seal, and I just gave up on it, because I couldn't get it to look the way I wanted. I didn't think I would win the \$100 savings bond anyway.

"But my wife, Terri, told me to keep working on it, and the next night, it just came together."

The idea for the seal came to Bettis almost as surprisingly as the news he had won the contest.

"The ship was over at the drydock pier, and I went over to the precommissioning building to visit the personnel office," he says.

"When I was passing the ship's temporary store, I saw my seal idea on a T-shirt. I asked the guy behind the counter if that was the ship's seal. He said it was, and I kept saying, 'That's my idea!"

"A couple of days later, the captain called me at the shop and told me I had won."

The Lincoln penny has played many significant roles in the ship's short life. The idea for pennies on nametags came from Master Chief Petty Officer Robert Wellcome.

New crewmembers are given a nametag with a 1972 Lincoln penny glued on it when they report to the ship. The coin is a giveaway that a man is from the Lincoln. The 1972 date was an obvious choice, since the ship's hull number is 72.

"We didn't have the money to buy a ship's emblem to put on the name tags in the beginning, and we were looking around for something we could afford," says Wellcome, who reported aboard as the ship's first crewmember on January 20, 1987.

"One day I was looking at a penny and said hey, why not? I put a penny on a blank nametag, and it looked pretty good. My wife called the Treasury Department, and they told us it was legal as long as we did not deface the coin. It has snowballed from there."

Where does one find enough 1972 pennies for an aircraft carrier with some 3,000 crewmembers aboard?

Sounds like a tough task, but not for the students at Dunbar-Erwin Middle School of Newport News, part of the Navy's Adopt-A-School program. The students at the school recently donated over 3,200 of the 1972 coins to accommodate the immediate need for nametags.


The school set up a contest which gave the students a chance to compete against each other and also help sort and collect the 1972 pennies.

"Each class' goal was 100 pennies," says Flora L. Fulton, the Dunbar-Erwin project coordinator.

"But one particular class, an eighth grade class, collected more than 500 pennies. Most of the classes beat the 100-penny goal."

The penny drive was a successful effort on the part of the Abraham Lincoln crew and the Dunbar-Erwin students and staff, bringing together a ship and the city in which she was born.

"The school has taken care of our nametag problem for over a year," says Captain William B. Hayden, Lincoln's Commanding Officer.

Of course, no commissioning would be complete without a Plankowner's Dinner to honor the ship's original crew. At that event in Virginia Beach, the committee hosted 4,500 people and awarded a commemorative plaque to each crew member.

# What Is A Plankowner?

A plankowner is a ship's crewmember who is assigned to a U.S. Navy ship on the day of the ship's commissioning.

The Navy term "plankowner" finds its origin back in the days of sailing ships when sailors slept on deck. Because some planks of the deck were softer than others, the crew would select those to sleep upon, and in time would regard them as their own. In many cases, when the ship was dismantled, crew members would, in fact, lay claim to these planks as mementos of their seagoing days.

The sense of ownership felt by a ship's crew, especially by its commissioning crew, has carried this naval term into the twentieth century - to today's steel ships capable of carrying jet aircraft. The officers, chief petty officers and crew of the newly commissioned USS Abraham Lincoln (CVN 72) are justifiably proud to have been on board during the ship's construction. and to have taken her to sea for the first time these last few weeks. 


