"The Almighty has been pleased to grant us a signal victory on Lake Champlain, in the capture of one frigate, one brig and two sloops of war of the enemy." Thus did Captain Thomas MacDonough, USN, commanding officer of the Lake Champlain flotilla, modestly report to the Secretary of the Navy on the inspiring victory on September 11, 1814--a triumph which served materially to bring to a close the War of 1812.

The LAKE CHAMPLAIN is the first United States Ship to bear this name. The men and women of the Norfolk Navy Yard are justly proud that so fine a vessel carries with her the memory of a glorious battle won with a flotilla whose entire tonnage was less than that of the ship that we christen today.
