BATTERED USS SANGAMON SHAKES OFF KANIKAZE HIT

## (NUMBER ONE OF FIVE-PICTURE SERIES)

A star witness to the rugged construction of Navy escort carriers, and the indomitable courage of those who man them, the USS SANGAMON survived the harrowing effects of a hit by a Jap Kamikase plane off Kerama Retto in the Ryukyus on May 4, 1945, and is now undergoing repairs. This series of unforgettable photographs depict action during the attack in which the ship was hit, and portrays the extensive damage suffered by the carrier.

The SANGANON is being repaired at Portsmouth, Va.

L. ATTACK THAT MISSED—Tracer bullets etch streaks amidst the battle smoke as gunners aboard the SANGAMON stick by their posts to riddle this encoming Jap plans—seemingly a certainty to smash into the ship. However, it missed by a hair's breadth and crashed into the Pacific near the flattop. Hot) long after another suicide plane succeeded in crashing on the flight deck of the SANGAMON, inflicting widespread damage and killing 36 men.

A star vituess to the sturdy construction of Navy warships, and the indomitable courage of those who man them, the Navy escort carrier. USS SANGAMON is now back at Portsmouth, Va., after shaking off the harrowing effect of a Jap Kamikase hit in the Ryukyus on Ney 4, 1945. This dramatic series of photographs depicts battle action during the meles in which the ship was hit, and portrays the extent of the damage suffered by the carrier.

2. HOT BREATH OF DISASTER--Knocked down by anti-aircraft fire just as it seemed a dead certainty to crash into its target, the excert carrier HSS SANGAMON, this Jap plane plumets down past the catualk on the starboard quarter of the ship. Shortly after this narrow escape from disaster, the SANGAMON resled from the shock of a successful Hamilhage attack, the suicide plane exploding in the center of its flight dock.

A star witness to the sturdy construction of Mavy warships, and the indomitable courage of those who man them, the escort carrier USS SANGAMON is now undergoing repairs at Fortsmouth, Va., after surviving the harrowing effects of a Jap Kamikara attack in the Ryukyus on May 4, 1945. This dramatic series of photographs depicts scenes during the action in which the ship was hit and portrays the extent of the damage.

3. CHAOS ON A CARRIER-This view looking forward on the carrier USS SANGAMON indicates the transmidous amount of damage inflicted by the Jap Kamikase plane which smashed into the carrier on May 4, 1945. In the foreground is the twisted debrie which once was the aft flight deck elevator. In the right center is the gutted skeleton of a plane, while along the charred and littered length of the flight deck the remains of other planes can be seen.

4. NIGHTWARE ET DAT-Officers and creemen of the USS SANGAMON survey the havor wreaked by a Jap Kamikase plane which smashed into the flight deck of their ship. Gapang holes, charred wreckage and water-scaked and heat-twisted installations greet their eyes on the 'morning after' the disaster. The fires set by the explosion raged for hours.

AFTERMATH OF INFERNO-Lighted by rays of sunlight pouring through the opening in the 'overhead', this chaotic scene is the hangar deck of the USS SANDAMON the morning after the ship suffered a hit by a Kamikaze plane. The jumbled, fire-blackened and water-soaked wreckage bears testimony to the fury of the flames which raged for hours after the suicide plane struck. Despite the haves, the gallant ship weathered the 12,000 miles back to Portsmouth, Va., for repairs.
