WE MUST DE ADEAM OF CORINTO THIS A.M. It is a town in the Republic of Nicaragua and used to be of some importance in transport circles. Some 600 Marines were stationed in Nicaragua until a year or so ago. They wanted mail, food, equipment. The Navy boats supplied most of their wants. The transports stopped outside Corinto's harbor to drop and take on mail and, occasionally, other articles. Ten Marines under the command of a Master Sgt. were stationed in Corinto. They met the transports in a launch: Once, there was furniture to be sent ashore. The unloading required seven or eight hours. The writer went ashore in the morning and stayed all day. Corinto is interesting enough. It is another Central American town. It boasts serveral foreign representives among its inhabitants. There are plenty of saloons. The sanitary equipment is not all that it might be. A R.R. runs from Corinto to the south and east. We believe that its other terminus is Managua. That is where most of the Marines were located. If the canal is ever digged it will not have Corinto for its West Coast terminus. It will enter the Pacific some sixty or eighty miles down the coast from Corinto.

THE RAILROAD COMMISSARIES CLOSE AT FIVE O'CLOCK. The one on the Pacific Side will not be open to Republic passengers if the above "guess schedule" is made the order of the day. That is, it will not be open, unless, special arrangements are made otherwise. This has been done on other occasions and may be done this time, for all we know, The Post Exchanges will be open in the evening to accomidate Republic purchasers. SACRAMENTO* Flood danger in the rain swept Sacramento Valley passed Tuesday but another victim of a train collission died bringing the storms dead to 21. Ten section hands were killed Monday night in a head on crash between a Southern Pacific motor dar and a train hauling gravel to repair a section of track washed out by heavy rains. The eleventh victim died Tuesday. The storm resulted in nine deaths by drowning. One man was killed in a snow slide at Lake Tahoe. The government weather Bureau reported Sacramento River waters were lower averting for the most part danger of floods. .

NEW YORK* Richard Whitney publicity withdrew Tuesday from the race for Presidency of the New York Stock Exchange setting to rest Wall Street rumors that he might seek re-election as independent candidate.

WASHINGTON* A bill to forbid war time profiteering strengthened and invigorated through the persistent effort of a Bloc of youthful independents received Tuesday the overwhelming approval of the house 367 to 15. Successful in forcing leaders to include a potentially severe excess profits tax the young progressives just before passage rallied their forces again and struck out the measures authorization for a conscripted army. While the bill now would prohibit the president from ordering a draft it could not prevent a war time congress from enacting conscription.

PARIS* AFrench proposal to strenghthen the League of nations in the form of Military pacts for automatic punishment of any agressor will be taken to Stressa it was disclosed Tuesday. Permier Pierre Evienne Flandin will accompany his Foreign Minister Pierre Laval. To the Italian Village there to neet Premier Benito Mussolini of Italy and Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald of Great Britain and six discuss ways of securing the continent against war. The British were understood to be not averse to the two point French proposal for a General non agression accord and nutual assistance pacts as a second line of defense against war while Russia w s understood to favor the idea.

PARIS * A France Russian Mutual assistance plan to backstop Frances plan for a general accord within the league of nations will be signed when Foreign misister Pierre Laval visits Moscow late this months official circles said Tuesday. These circles siad Laval and the Soviet Foreign Compissar Maxim Litvinoff wold sign the accord which they described as calling for Mutual aid only if the mutual assistance terms of the proposed General opact fall down.

LONDON- Sir John Simon British Foreign Secretary gave the house of Commons the first official surmary of Germanys security views Tusday as the British Government completed the outline of its stressa proposals. Hitler Sir Hohm Simon told the Commons wants land and Air amns equality. A mavy 35 percent as large as Great Britains or about 400,000 tons. A non-aggression pact among powers interested in European questions with provisions for consulatiations in case of aggression but no "Eastern Locano "Nor nutual assistance pact with Russia. No Non-Aggression pact including Lithuana until the status of the Memelterritory is regulated satisfactorily and a pact providing non-interference in Austria only if the powers are able to agree on one satisfactory to Germany.

VIENNA - Police arrestedtwo leaders and six sub leaders of the Nazi railway brigade Tuesday at Vienna railway stations where they had established Head-quarters. The officers sid they found papers indicating the Nazi movement had made steady headway among railroad men despite the fadt the party had been outlawed.

PARIS - Vatroslav Reich croat born naturalized French chemist denied espionage charges Tuesday and accused Robert Gordon Switz American spy and informer of implicating him and others on trial to save himself. Reich known as "Agent 611" in the ring broken up by the arrest 16 months ago of Switz and his wife accused the couple of trying to benefit by the clemency clause in the espionage law for those who involve others.

NEW YORK NY .. Hugh Baillie Tuesday was elected President of the United Press Associations succeeding Karl A.Bickel who will continue as a director of the organization and a number of its executive committee.

USAT REPUBLIC

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Bucharest.. Anti-semitic demonstrations and attacks continued Tuesday in Bucharest for the Fourth successive day despite vigilance of Gendarmes patrolling the streets with fixed bayonets. The majority of jewish residents remained in their homes behind locked doors. A greek orthodox priest was injured attempting to rescue a group of German-Jews being attacked by a maddened mob. The Roumanian movement against the Jews is headed by former Premier Alvan Voevod, -recently expelled from the National peace party because he allegedly favored colimiting the number of positions Roumanians of Non-Roumanian blood may hold to the percentage of their representation in the Nations total population. About twenty percent of the population is either Jewish or Hungarian.

-LONDON. Sir John Simon bluntly revealed sharp differences between Britan and Germany in the house of Commons Tuesday over Adolf Hit lers far-reaching rearmament plans to restore the Reich to Pre-War Military might and Colonial power. The foreign Secretary eased tension among the former allied powers Britain France and Italy Two days before their conference opens at Stress, Italy, by re-emphasizing the wide divergence between the British government and Germany on Hitlers proposals. Sir John said Hitlers proposals included 1-Germany be allowed an army of 36 divisions, representing a maximum of 550,000 soldiers. 2-Permission to possess all types of arms other powers own. 3-Germany be permitted "With certain reservations" a may 35 percent of the British in tonnage or about 385,000 tons. 4-Air parity with Britain and France. If the Russian air force is expanded. Germany would expand further. 5-Restoration of Germany as a colonial power. Sinon made it clear he expected few conclusive decisions either at Stress or at the extraordinary session of the League of Nations council at Geneva on April fifteenth, to consider German rearmament also.

WASHINGTON D.C...Bruno Richard Hauptmann charged Tuesday that he was "Railroaded to the Trenton death hopse" and denied that he owed income taxes.

WASHINGTON D.C...The House Tuesday passed the McSwain Bill, by a vote of 367 to 15, in an effort to enroll the United States in the cause of peace at a time when the world is afire with talk of war. If the bill passes the Senate its advicates believe there will be little incentive for the United States Government "Ever to ceclare war aginn except in defense of its coasts and, borders. "The bill included the following provisions" The President is erpowered to fix prices in event of war. The Government can seize all excess profits taxes in war time. Under its terms. "No man can be drafted - al millions were drafted in the World War - and sent to alien soll to wage a war of aggression." The President is authorized to commandeet industrial plant s and to determine the priority on which certain articles shall be manufactured. He can conscript the financial resources of the nation in event of war. The President is empowered to license business firms in war.

NAPLES...Additional troops sailed for East Africa Tuesday, including 2,100, soldiers and 200 officers, for duty on the Italian Somaliland-Abyssinian frontier.

WARSAW...Joel Gang Polish newspaper correspondent, was released by the Danzien police Tuesday and left for Warsaw.. He had been held on charges he sent out anti-Nazi information during last weeks Danzig Parliamentary election campaign.

ROOSEVELT WILL HEAD WORK RELIEF PROGRAM.

WASHINGTON D.C...President Roosevelt returned to the capital Tuesday, to supervise the task of putting seven million unemployed Americans to work and announced he would hold a number of conferences before determining the set-up under which four billion dollars will be spent to try to do it. The White House said the President will be the active as well as titular head of the program. It is understood on good authority that relief administrator Hopkins and Under Secretary of Agriculture Rexford G. Tugwell will have important parts in distribution of the funds.

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Salvador is the smallest, but most densely populated of the Central American Republics, and the only one without a coastline on the Atlantic seaboard. We pass this country sometime tomorrow. There are two mountain chains which cross the entire country. These attain considerable height and send out numerous spurs. Inclosed by there spurs are many willows of great fertility. In these fertile regions are grown such products as coffee, sugar cotton, balsam, indigo, sisal, beans, tobacco and corn which is extensively raised for home consumption. This country is also rich in minerals such as gold, silver, copper and lead. The National forests contain valuable dye woods. The only port on the coast of Salvador is Port La Union.

The Republic of Hondmans, north of Salvador and Nicaragua, is the most mountainous of the Centural American countries. As a result it has a great diversity of climate, soil, and products. There are large and fertile plaind and valleys which is conductive of agriculture. On the Atlantic coast there is a great stretch of land suitable for and devoted to the chief source of wealth of Hondwas, hamely bananas. Coconuts are also important, while cattle raising is radiply developing. The country also has other sources of wealth in tabacco, sugar, maize, coffee, hides, mahogany and dye woods. There are numerous minerals to be found and much of it has been unexploited. The Rosario mines are the dhief silver producers. Zinc, iron, lignite and coal are among the other minerals to be found. The aplital of the Republic is Tegucigalpa which has a population of about 40,000 inhabitants.

U. S. POSTAGE RATES

Letters bearing U. S. postage stamps may be dropped in the mail boxes aboard ship for mailing in the Canal Zone. Regular letter postage (3¢ per ounce) rates apply, except that the AIR MAIL rate from Panama to the United States is 20¢ for each HALF¥OUNCE; and Air-Mail letters must be fully prepaid; otherwise they are forwarded as ordinary mail. While letters mailed aboard ship may bear U. S. Stamps, letters mailed in the Canal Zone or in the Republic of Panama require Canal Zone or **Panamenian** stamps, according to where mailed. Closing time for Air Mail at Balboa, C.Z., Friday, 5:30 P.M.

PANAMA RAILROAD SCHEDULE

Trains from Paname City (Pacific side) to Colon (Atlantic side), and from Colon (Atlantic side) to Panama City (Pacific side), are as follows: Daily: 7:05 A.M. 12:35 P.M. and 4:45 P.M. Fare: First class \$2.20; second class \$1.20. Special rate to Service men, \$1.45.

Time required for trip across Canal, about 1 hour and 45 minutes. Presentation of Panama Commissary identification slips will enable passengers to secure the reduced rate.

IMPORTANT CUSTOMS NOTICE

All classes of passengers bound for the Panama Canal Department are advised that Customs regulations and other formalities MUST be complied with. Passengers debarking at the Pacific torminal (Balboa, C.Z.) will please not leave the pier until Customs officials have inspected their baggage. The same rules and regulations apply to the Atlantic terminal (Cristobal, C.Z.)

COMMISSARY PRIVILECES

Identification slips for Panama Railroad Commissary privileges, properly authenticated, may be obtained at the office of the Quartermaster Agent by THROUGH PASSENGERS ONLY. Passengers making purchases in Panama should make arrangements with the Port Transportation Officer for handling of packages prior to delivery at the pier. To insure manifesting and receipt of such articles, delivery at the pier should be made at least two hours before sailing.

STATEROOM KEYS

Through passengers going ashore at Panema should provide themselves with stateroom keys. Keys may be obtained by <u>through passengers only</u> from their respective room stewards, and passengers will be held strictly accountable for their returm.

BAGGAGE ROOM HOURS

The baggage room will be open Thursday, April 11, 1935, from 9:30 to 11:30 A.M., and from 1:30 to 3:30 P.M. This will be the last time the baggageroom will be open until after leaving Cristobal.

ALPHABETIC TAGS

To expedite handling baggage and customs clearance, all cabin and hand baggage should be plainly tagged or labelled with owner's name (alphabetic tags for this purpose may be obtained at the office of the Quartermaster Agent). Cabin and hand baggage of those debarking at the Pacific terminal will be ready to be removed from staterooms before time of docking.
