Since most of the ships in the Military Sea Transportation service were built in NWII, they are not luxurious, but they are safe, dependable and comfortable. With the limitations of existing Iacilities.

You can be assured that everything posstble will be done to make your voyage a memorable one.

The RCSE is virtually a floating city. She is 609 feet long and contains numerous facilities and services to make the voyage safe and pleasant. Power is supplied by four boilers located in two engine rooms, developing a total of 20,000 horse-power. Maximum speed is 21 knots, but the cruising speed, the most economical, is about 19 knots.

The engine room also contains evaporators. These convert sea water into drinking water by distillation.

Passengers on MSTS Transports are often curious and occasionally angry about the fact that many of the activities aboard the ship are not in full operation by noon of sailing day, or even the day after.

Perhaps the easiest way to begin an explanation is to point cut that the military department whose principle responsibility is the welfare of the passengers total not more than 25 persons. Since almost half of them are medical personnel not directly concerned with "entertainment" of passengers--it is obvious that all of this work must be performed by the troops.

And wer less than 700 troops are being carried, the military department falls under strength.

Troops stand guard, work in the gelleys, operate the equipment to provide the ship's music, run the movie projectors, staff the game room, libraries, and newspaper, and generally help the Chaplain do a host of additional jobs that add to your comfort.

NEW COMMLNDER NiMED FOR U.S. FORCES IN VIETNiM

Lieutenant General William C. Westmoreland has been appointed commander of imerican advisory forces in the Republic of Vietnam, the Defense Department has announced.

General Westmoreland, a combat veteran of wWII and the Korean Nar, succeeds Gen. Paul D. Harkins, who is retiring.

Before the appointment, Gen. Westmoreland served as deputy to Gen. Harkins, having been assigned early in 1963. General Harkins beceme commander of smerican forces in Vietnam in Feb ruary, 1962.

General Westmoreland, 50, was a passenger recently in a helicopter fired on by Communist Viet Cong snipers. The General was uninjured, but four other bmericans received minor wounds.

A graduate of West Point, Cla ss of 1936, General Westmoreland was appointed Superintendent of the f.cademy in 1960, a post he held for three years.

He first saw combat when he led an artillery batallion ashore at Casablanca in 1942. He fought in Tunisia and Sicily and later fonded June 6, 1944 , (D-Day) on Utah Beach in France as an executive officer of the 9th Regt., 2 d Inf Div.

It was in 1952 in Kores, where he was commander of the 187 th Lirborne Regiment Combat Team, that General Westmoreland was promoted from colonel to brigadier general. In 1956, at the a age of 42 , he became the youngest major general in the hirmy.

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L.RMED FCRCES STRENGTH SHOWS DROP IN MARC

The Defense Department has announced that the strength of the lirmed Forces on March 31 was 2812 less than in Feb .29.

Preliminery reports show the merch 31 total as $2,692,922$. In comparison, the March 31, 1964, strength is 1,640 less than the same date in 1963.


COMMITTEE SEEKS FLCTS OF NLSL TEST MISHAP

A National Leronautics and Space idministration ( $\mathrm{N}_{1} \mathrm{Sh}$ ) factfinबing committee, in a prelfminary report on the accidental ignition of a solid propellant rocket motor in the Spin Test Facility at Cape Kennedy, Fla., ispril 14, has recommended a series of tests to determine if static electricity caused the accident.

The Orbiting Solar Observatory B (OSO-B) spacecraft was mounted atop a Delta third stage X-248 motor which ignited. The rocket tore away from the alignment stand on which it was mounted, hit the ceiling of the buildingand landed in a far corner. Eleven men working in the building were burned - two fatally and the spacecraft badly damaged.

The fact-finding committee concluded that there were four possible reasons why the rocket motor: could have ignited: heat, shock, outside radio signals or an electrical impulse.
hlthough at the time of the accident, all power was off in the spacecraft, the committee said it is possible static electricity could have built up in such a way as to cause ignition. The committee has recommende that a series of tests Be made to determine sources and energies of static electricity required to cause ignition of the motor.

Until the fact-finding committee completes its investigation and makes its final report, NhSh will attempt'no further flights of the $\mathrm{X}-248$, which has been used as third stage of the Delta and fourth stage of the Scout launch vehicle.

United Stetes personnel will continue to be brought back to the United states as they complete treining missicns with the ZVN forces.
MI anticipate," McNamara said, "the majority of the training missions can be completed by the end of 1965 . I continue to belie ve we should not leave an imerican in South Vietnam longer than necessary to train a Vietnamese counterpart to carry on that acticn."

The Secretary would not predict what the totals of personnel reduction or returns would be at the end of this .year or. 1965, but added that the United States is sending new persannel to the Republic of Vietmm for training mission nct previously carried on.

He did indicate that much of the light aircreft training should be completed before the end of l965. He also reemphasized the pledge that United States aid to South Vierem would continue as long, as needed.

## Treatment of Unions and Lator in Hungery

Unlikg the Enst Berlin outbreak, the Hungrien rebellion begen as a student protest movement, invelving both non-Communists and some younger members of the flungrian Communist Party itself.

By degrees, the dissident student grcups were joined by industrial workers and others. Finally, the entire neticn staged a general insurrecticn, backed by the national lator federation.

The attempt of Hungarian, Labor to assert its rights during the 1956 rebellion wes donmed by armed Soviet intervention. Nevertheless, the Hungarian uprising hes historical significance as a mss "workers.revolt" against Communist pelicies.

Immedintely after the end of WWII, the first postwar election in Hungary gave the Communists only 17 percent of the votes. The great majority of votes went to agrarien and Sociolist candidates, resulting in a libern coalition government.

However, between 1945 and 1947, the Communists steadil undermined and infiltrated the gevernment until, on hug 3l, 1947, the legitimate government wes unseated through a oerefully arronged and minaged electicn. The attrition of labor's freedem begen shortly afterward.

The first act of the Budapest Communist negime in late 1947 was to abolish the right to strike. During the next three yonrs, the rights of 1abor were progressively worm cway until, by 1950 , there wes almest totil regimentetion.

The work-book system, intro-duced in 1950-51, effectively tied Hungnian workers to their jcbs and pleod at the tyercy of Communist plant managers. \& decree issued in 1952 provied penalties of up to five years imprisonment for plant managers whe hired workers withcut beoks.

Punishment imposed for infreetions of the work-bock law added
to the growing bitterness of Hungary's working class prior to the 1956 rebellion.
Bad working conditions and a stendy increase in production demends, thrcugh the device of raising norms, contributed to the spirit of rebellion that permeated the entire metion by Octcber, 1956.


## U.S. MILITARY FORCES PLLN JOINT EXCH:NGE IN EUROPE

f new single exchange system that will serve both the U.S. l.rmy and tir Force in Europe and the Middle East will be activated July 25, 1964.
Establishment of the new Europe Exchange System (EES) was jointly announced by Gen. P.L. Frceman Jr. Commander in chief, U.S.irmy, - Eurcpe, and Gen.Gabriel P. Disosway, 6 ommender, U.S.hir Force in Europe.

The streamlined dolle r-saving orgenization, to be ectivated on the 69th anniversary of the worldwide Excha nge Service, will replace the present Eurcpean Ex change System and lir Force Europe Exchange. Headquarters will be in Nurnberg, Germany.
With physical facilities large encugh to absorb the orgenization, the new system will offer greater eccnomy of operation without disrupting customer service.
Military steffing of the new exchange system will be provided jointly by U.S. irmy and tir Force in Europe.
The jrint European Exchange System will result in anified opganization with a single headquarters and single field orgenizaticn and one procurement, distribution and transportation system,

## SOUTH:MPTON: "GITETHY TO ENGLL.ND"

Southampton, where so many l.tlantic travellers first set frot on Tnglish scil, has always been on of the fricatest of Britain's seaports, and, from earliest times, it has played an importantpart in English history. To the komans who named it Clausentum, it was an important communication link. In the cerly years of the sixth contury came the Saxens, to be followed later by the Danes, by which time the town had assumed, in Suthamtune, a reconizble form of its present name. It was at Scuthampton, sc legend has it, that Canute, second of the Danish kings of England, demonstrated to Psycophantic court his inability to stem the flow ing tide. Next came the Normans who as was their wont, built frrtificatlons of such solidity and strength that many of them still exist today.

During the almost ceaseless wars with France, in the Middle ges, Scuthempten sow the derinro ture nf-mere than one expeditionary force, and waved farewell to the men whowent to moke history at Grecy and l.gincourt. Under the Tudor scvereigns, Southąmpton lost much of its importance, thrught the period left its mark upon the town, notably in the lovely Tudor House, which is now the townls principal museum.
The reign of James I staged at Southampton an evenit of transcendant and incalculable importances on lugust $15 \mathrm{th}, 1620$, the persecuted Pilgrim Gathers embarked in the MiYFLO:NER for their journey to the New World, One of the unforeseen but inevitable consequencesof this venture was the subsequent growth of transatlentic treffic, which raised Southampton to its present position as one of the world's greatest ports and principal ocean passenger gateway to Britain.

The total length of quays at the Old a nd New Docks is 31,000 feet. There are six dry docks which con eccomnodate all types of ships, and the King George $V$ Dry Dock at the western end of the New Docks is the largest in the world. The passenger reception accommodation et the Docks is amongst the most modern to be found at any port. The New Docks provide a deep-water quay

I $1 / 2$ miles long, and its nine berth can accommodite the laggest ocemn-going liners. Over $20,000,000$ tons of shipring and neerly three-quarters of a million passengers are dealt with at the Docks annually.

Southempton was one of the major embarkation ports during the
1914-1918 and 1939-1945 wars, and suffered heavey demate from bombing raids in 1940-41. Reconstruction has been planned with foresight and determination and a fine new shopping centre has been built. fillowance tas been mede for the growth of the town as a mejcr distribution centre.

Today Southempton plays three roles: is is, as hes been alroady stated, one of the most important passenger ports in the world, and is concerned with commercial and industrial activities of all kinds; it is a modern residential and holliday tourist rescrt, with ammenities and distractiens of a 11 :kinds; only 79 miles from London, it is a centre from wheih many places of great interest and benum ty, as well as some of England's most attractive ccantryside, are easily reached. British Railways run reguler services between Scuthempton and Lehavre, the overnight express route to Paris, and also to St. Malo which serves more southerly areas of France.
imong Southampton's recreational facilities mey be mentioned The Common, which covers 360 acres, and is composed mainly off netural grassland, but also incluces a paddling pool, model yetch lake, cricket and football grounds; the Lido, one of the le rgest and best equipped swimming pools in the country; and the Sports Centre which contains two golf couŕses, nine footbell pitches, four cricket pitches, three hockey pitches, twelve tennis ccurts, bcwling and puttin $g$ greens, cycling and running tracks, canoe lake, paddling pool and children's pack. Speedway racing, greyhound racing, cone certs, theatrical entertainments, cinemas and dances are some of the entertainments provided. Southampton Vater and the Solent are known to yatchsmen all over the world.

Try to get to Southampton while ycu are in Europe. You will find it to be a pleasant experience.

The citation said Boctor Friedman roceived the award because of "his dedication to furthering the Navy's mission in research which has revealed in the teaching and training of young scientists who by their discoveries, have in turn, written new chapters in man's knowledge of the universe."

Last year Dector Friedman received a $\$ 10,000$ Superior Performance hward, the largest individual cash award given by the government.

The Captain Dexter dward is presented annually to an individual who has made outstanding contributions to Naval research and development. Captain Dexter was the primary architect of the Navy's basic research program.

## i. FEW FLCTS ON* GERMMINY

Perhaps many people aboard are wondering about what lies ahead when they reach Germany. For many, this will be your first trip overseas, and all the fascinating mysteries of Germany may leave you wondering what excitement is waiting at the voyage's end. For this reason, a few facts on the subject may help to give a better understanding.

Germany is located in central Europe, and is bordered on the north by the Baltic and North Seas and Denmark; on the east by Poland and Czeckoslovakia; on the south by fustria and Switzerland; and on the west by France, Belgium and Holland.

Southern Germany is mountainous, while northern Germany is a great plain. The Danube, Elbe, Oder, Weser, Neckar, Ems, and Eider Rivers are all to be found in the scefic mountain areas.

The climate of Germany is fairly uniform throughout. The annua 1 temperature varies from $35^{\circ}$ in some sections to over $50^{\circ}$ in others. The average rainfall ranges from 25 to 70 inches per year.
I.griculture is the chief occupation of the German people, even though the soil is sandy. The chief crops are rye, wheat, oats, berley, sugar beets, and potatoes. There is also an extensive amount of livestock raised each year.

Germany is essentially an industrial mation.. There is a great reseurce of minerals, and Germany still ranks high in the production of chemicals.
tmong specific products for which Germany is noted are her toys and fine lenses, known throughoưt the world as among the best.

Transportation in Germany is no problem for the person caught without a qar. The railroads offer quite satisfactory tranportation, the railways are only exceeded in
total length by Canada and the United States. In 1937, Germany had 217,000 miles of good highways, and today they are more than double that.

The German people are often noted for their blond hair and tall stature, even though they are very similar to the average kmericans visiting them. Seasoned travelers usually•find the German people friendly: and easy to get along with.

THET ANSNEES: THE CALL . . .
On May 20, 1927, Charles Augustus Lindbergh made the first solo flight across the fitlantic Ocean, He made it in the "Spirit of St. Louis," a plane financed by the citlizens of the Missouri city. The perilous trip took 33 $\frac{1}{3}$ hours from New York to Paris and was logged at 3,600 miles. Lindbergh's heroic effort blazed a trail followed by military and commercial flights and focused fmerican military efforts on air power. The famous flight gave new meaning to the airplane. Spurred by Lindbergh's success, Rmerican air force pilots, probing the mysteries of flight, then began making rapid advancement in the field of aviation.
