Great Crowd Witnesses Event at Mare Island Navy Yard—Miss DeYoung of San Francisco Christens New Vessel

VALLEJO, Cal., Oct. 8 .- The new training ship Intrepld was successfully launched today at the Mare Island navy yard in the presence of a large crowd which, despite a heavy rain, came from San Francisco and other places to witness the ceremony. On the stand provided for the launching party were Miss Helen de Young, daughter of M. H. de Young, proprietor of the San Francisco Chronicle, who had been chosen by Secretary of the Navy Morton to act as sponsor to the vessel; United States Senator Per- men, a captain, nine wardroom officers kins, the mayors of San Francisco, Oakland and Vallejo, Rear Admiral McCalla, commandant, and the heads of various departments of the navy yard. The gunboat Annapolis was provided for other invited guests.

Launched Without Hitch

After a prayer by Chaplain McAllister, Rear Admiral McCalla introduced Senator Perkins, who made a brief address. He spoke of the spiendid equipment of Mare Island for the building of vessels and referred to the importance of favorable legislation.

The Intrepid will be a steel bark. The Intrepid is a little over rigged training ship of the following half completed. The keel was general dimensions: Length on load laid early this year, two months water line, 176 feet 5 inches; length between perpendiculars, 176 feet; length over all, 219 feet 6 inches; breadth, 45 feet 6 inches; displacement, about 1800 tons; mean draught, 16 feet 5% inches.

Her battery will be as follows: Six four-inch forty-caliber rapid-fire guns, four six-pounder rapid-fire guns, two one-pounder rapid-fire guns, two automatic Colt's guns, .30 caliber.

The four-inch guns will be on the ary 2 last.

The ship has a double bottom, three masts and a bowsprit, the lower masts of steel.

She will be entirely propelled by sail, but will have an auxiliary steam plant for operating the electrical plant, steam heating and other interior arrangements. Her crew consists of 229 and six warrant officers.

Third of Her Name in Navy

The Intrepid is the third ship to be built at this yard, besides a number of tugs and smaller craft. The monitor Monadnock, now in China waters, and the wooden training ship Mobican, now in the Philippines, were also built at the Mare Island navy yard, the monitor Monadnock being partially built on the Vallejo side.

The Intrepid is the third ship of the American navy to bear the name, the first having been with Admiral Derather an experimental vessel and was afterward broken up. This, the third, has been constructed in accordance with advanced ideas of training men When the vessel touched the water for the navy, it being a generally conceded principle that men trained in sailing ships are much better fitted as seamen than are those who have never had experience aboard a vessel

Little Over Half Completed
