Historic wooden yacht arrives in Beaufort for restoration

BEAUFORT — The arrival here last week of a piece of presidential history passed without fanfare, but the 1939 luxury yacht that served eight of the past 10 commanders in chief will be here for awhile.

The 96-foot El Presidente arrived Oct. 6 at Moores Marine, a Florida-based company, which broke ground on an 18-acre site at Jarrett Bay Marine Industrial Park near Beaufort in 2006. The company, still operates in Riviera Beach, Fla., specializes in American wooden yacht res-

Renowned rock music promoter Frank Lynch, a native of Scotland now residing in Charleston, S.C, recently purchased the yacht in Chicago, Ill., where it was being chartered for private excursions. The seller's advertised asking price was about \$1.7 million for the vessel, which still bears the presidential insignia.

El Presidente Capt. John May said he expects to be here with his two mates for several months as Moores Marine strips away the restoration work of earlier craftsmen.

"We're going to be de-modernizing her. Mr. Lynch wants to take it back in time," Capt.

The crew traveled more than 2,000 miles and through 48 locks on its journey here from Lake Michigan.

Moores Marine founder Jim Moores said Monday that the work includes undoing modifications made during earlier overhauls. The yacht was last refitted in 1996. Mr. Moores said the latest effort will take about three months of intensive work without hauling out the vessel.

"All the work at this point is going to be done in the two 20-millimeter cannons

Mr. Moores joined Capt. May and a naval architect from Wilmington on a visit to a Marshallberg boatyard where another restorer is working on a similar Trumpy yacht, the 95-foot, 1926 Linetta. The three will study the cabin and other design elements for authenticity.

Trumpy yachts, which were built in the Chesapeake Bay area from the 1920s until the early 1970s, are at the center of attention for Moores Marine. The company has restored 23 of the remaining 89 Trumpy yachts. "We keep legends alive" is the company's slogan.

"We started focusing in on Trumpys about 15 to 17 years ago. They were some of the best master craftsmen in the United States," Mr. Moores said. "These are very cool pieces of American history and we're into restoring American history.'

Founder John Trumpy designed the most famous Trumpy, Sequoia, in 1925. That vessel served eight U.S. presidents beginning with Franklin Roosevelt.

Capt. May and his crew joked that they often tell onlookers that the El Presidente is "the other presidential yacht." But El Presidente has a rich history all its own.

The vessel was originally named Innisfail and was commissioned by the J.M. Cudahy family of Illinois and built by the Mathis-Trumpy boatbuilding company.

During World War II, the vessel was pressed into U.S. Navy service and refitted as a coastal patrol boat at the naval shipyard in Philadelphia in May 1942.

Commissioned as the YP-354, the ship was armed with yachts still in existence. That half-dozen includes, in addition



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After decommissioning in 1947, the vessel was refurbished but remained in government service until the mid-1960s through an arrangement with the owner. The name was changed to El Presidente in 1965.

The yacht was used by U.S. presidents including Roosevelt, Truman, Eisenhower, Kennedy, Nixon, Ford, Reagan and Clinton to entertain dignitaries and heads

of state. Mr. Moores said there are only six other similarly sized Trumpy

to the 125-foot Seguoia and the 95-foot Linetta, the 96foot Commodore, the 103foot Freedom, the 75-foot Coconuts (formerly named Exact) and the 95-foot Enticer.

Mr. Moores said the work, while specialized, is steady.

"We've got another 74footer coming in shortly," he said. "We are one of only four companies doing Trumpy restoration work on this scale and the others are all up in Maine."
