

ESCAPES FALL TO DEATH Cow on Trestle Causes **Big Pilikia--Stops** Engine LIHUE'S EASTER SERVICES

A tragedy was narrowly averted last Thursday night, when freight train No. '23'' of the Lihue and Ianamaulu division ran over a cow which had apparently attempted to cross the bridge which spans the Hanamaulu River near Hanamaulu it the dizzy height of nearly two hundred feet.

The train pulled out of Lihue, empty shortly after eight o'clock. On approaching the Hanamaulu bridge, Engineer Figueira brought his engine to the usual speed, and o his carefulness in so doing, probably the entire train crew owes its ife. He had scarcely entered the bridge when his engine was observed to be acting strangely. He applied the breaks but before the engine could be brought to a full stop, the front wheels had been lifted from the track. A hurried investigation revealed the remains f a cow which had been run down und become entangled with the nachinery. A wrecking crew soon ppeared on the scene and succeeded n clearing the track without considerable delay. Had the engine toppled over, a sheer drop of nearly two hundred feet to almost certain death to the train crew would have resulted. The engine was slightly damaged.

The newly acquired property, embraces a five, acre tract of land beginning at the lower side of the Lihue Park, the same now being in cane which will be harvested at once, in order to expedite preparatons for the construction of county buildings.
