REGULAR SERVICE IN OGDEN CANYON. NEXT SUNDAY

Regular car service through the Ogden canyon, in addition to the Ogden valley cars, is to be started next Sunday, April 30, arrangements for the time-tables being made by J. M. Read, superintendent of transportation, and W. B. Mowbray, traffic manager of the Ogden, Logan & Idaho railway system.

Idelwild was opened on Saturday evening and the Hermitage will be opened on May 1. Preparations are being made for the early opening of the Hermitage grove as a pleasure resort and of the various summer camps.

Several families have already moved into their summer homes in the canyon and others are preparing to make the change from the city.

Indications are that traffic through the canyon will be heavier this year than ever before, many organizations having started their plans for outings, while inquiries are constantly being received in Ogden regarding the trips through the canyon for summer tourists.

SPECIAL TRAINS ARE HAULING SHEEP TO HUNTSVILLE

Twenty-three carloads of sheep shipped by Blinn Brothers of Huntsville, from ranges in the southern and western parts of Utah, reached Ogden early this morning over the Oregon Short Line and were immediately transferred at Browning station, north of the city, to the Ogden, Logan & Idaho railway.

The shipment was sent on special trains through Ogden canyon to Huntsville, this being the largest single shipment ever hauled over the Ogden valley line and the second large sheep shipment over the interurban lines this year, the other of 30 carloads having been sent to Hyrum last week.

Several other heavy shipments of sheep for the Ogden and Logan range districts are expected, the movement of sheep from the winter to summer ranges now being well under way.

SERVICES AT THE M. E. CHURCH

At the First Methodist church yesterday, Easter was observed with an early morning prayer meeting and morning and evening services. At the early morning meeting, Mr. Homer A. Seip led in prayer and Rev. G. F. Rassweiler delivered the Easter sermon at the 10:30 o'clock service. In part, the pastor said:

"One of the unique characteristics of the Christian religion is that it is a religion of power. Christ differs from other religious teachers and founders among other things in that while they only offered a system of thought or a series of revelations, Christ proposed to endow his followers with power through the Holy Spirit. Other teachers might show the way up the heights of attainment, but he reached down a mighty arm to help men up the steep. Zoroaster, Buddha, Confucius taught many beautiful truths, but they had no power to offer to help men to live up to these truths. But Jesus we are told taught with power and His disciples preached in the demonstration of the Spirit and of power." Wherever Jesus went, there was a shock of energizing power, devils were cast out, storms were calmed, even the dead were raised. This same power brought Him out of the tomb with a body transmitted into a glorified condition, and wherever His Gospel is truly proclaimed there the same power begins its work of resurrection.

"The world is 'dead in trespasses and sins,' moral sensibilities are dull, consciences seared, moral impulses corrupted, the ethical will inert. What the world needs is not so much more moral truth, though it needs that, but enough, but power to live up to what it already knows. Everywhere mankind has better ideals than actions, everywhere mankind is living below the level of their moral standards. This is what the great heathen religions and ethical systems such as Buddhism and Confucianism lacked—the power to vitalize men with new moral energy. The same power which raised Christ from the tomb will raise us to newness of life, will renew deadened spiritual faculties, awaken the conscience, kindle the love of goodness, quicken the aspirations and empower the will in all good purposes."

A special program of music formed an appreciated part of the service. The Treble Clef choir sang two Easter anthems; Miss Lucille Griffin sang "Easter Song" (Dennee); Miss Rosamond Laird sang, "Consider the Lilies" and Miss Vera Frey played several appropriate pipe organ selections. A number of infants and young people were baptized and several adults received into the church.

In the evening, a sermon on "Christian Virtues" was preached by Rev. S.

REPUBLICAN PRIMARIES

In accordance with the call of the Republican State Committee, and action taken thereon by the Weber County Republican Central Committee, primaries are hereby called to be held in the several election districts of Weber County on Friday, April 28th, at 8 o'clock p. m., for the purpose of electing seventy-four delegates to the State Convention and to the Congressional Convention of the First District of the Republican Party—to be held at Provo, Utah, May 1st, for the purpose of electing delegates and alternates to the Republican National Convention to be held at Chicago June 7, 1916.

The same delegates chosen at said primaries will attend both of said Conventions.

The apportionment of delegates to said Convention is upon the basis of one delegate for each seventy votes or major portion thereof cast for Hon. Joseph Howell for Congress at the general election of 1914, and thereunder Weber County is entitled to seventy-four delegates to said Conventions.

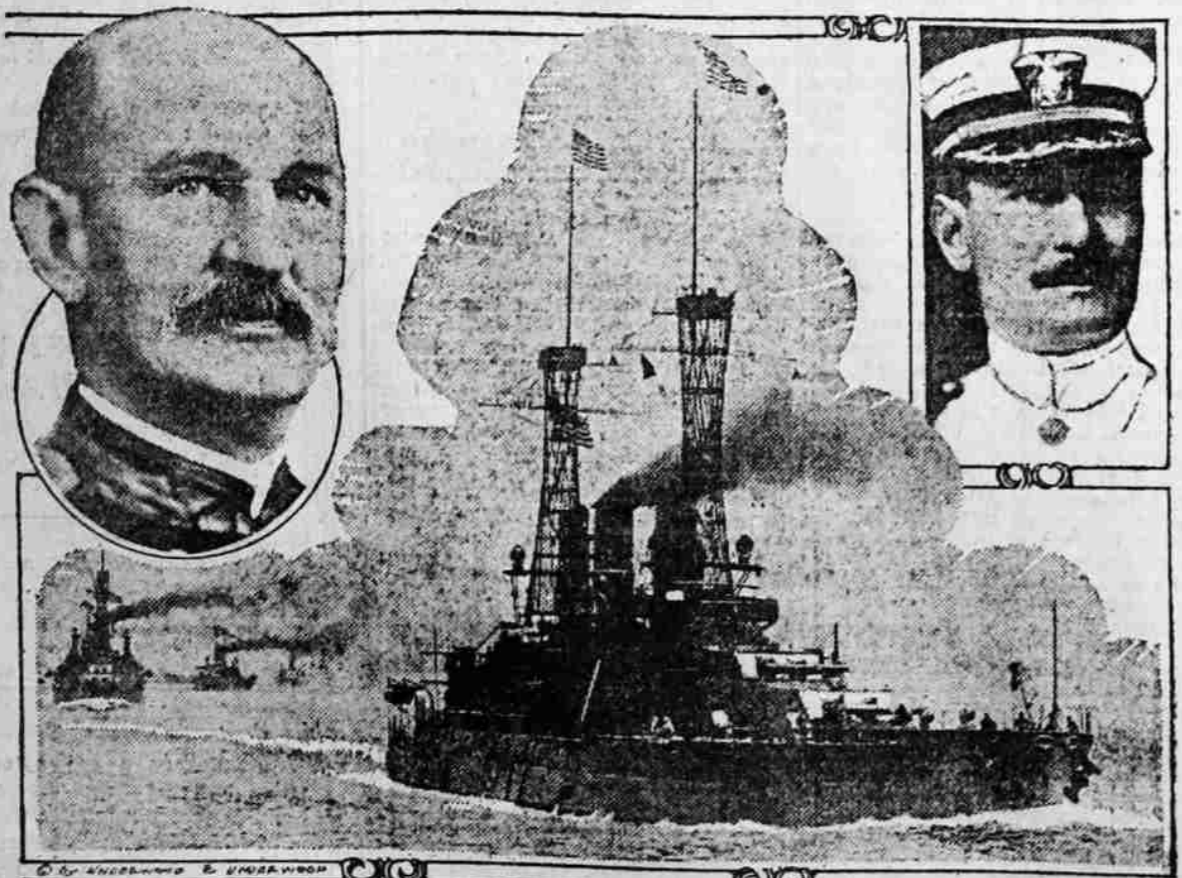

WELFARE WEEK IN OGDEN SCHOOLS

Following the plan outlined in pamphlet by the state university, Ogden schools will observe Community Welfare Week, beginning May 1. In some of the schools there will be general observance of the occasion, and in others it will be confined to classroom work.

Common branches of education will be taken up and stress placed upon manual training and many of the practical things that should be known by the well rounded out grade or high school student. Among the subjects to be considered will be local geography, transportation, industries, resources, markets, sanitation and civic condition.

Monday will be geography day; Tuesday, history; Wednesday, health; Thursday, civics, and Friday, Utah day.

EXERCISES AT STATE SCHOOL

Easter Sunday was duly observed at the State Industrial School, the Rev. G. F. Rassweiler, pastor of the First Methodist church, delivering the Easter sermon to the boys, and the Nylander string orchestra furnishing the music.

A joint session of the boys' and girls' Sunday school classes was held in the forenoon, beginning at 11 o'clock, at which interesting exercises were given and music furnished.

At 6:30 p. m. the intermediate boys gave a creditable program of songs and readings, after which Superintendent E. S. Hinckley awarded prizes for meritorious Easter stories, as follows: Nelson Johnson, first prize; Robert Hillan, second; and George Warner, third. Albert and Charles Kemmerle received favorable mention. The first prize for the small boys was received by Albert Jensen, and the second by George Christian.
