

OREGON SYSTEM OF GOVERNMENT

Senator Bourne Praises It and Precipitates Great Debate in the Senate.

AS TO FEDERAL OFFICIALS

Bacon of Georgia Made Plan for More Voice in Their Appointment in the South.

Washington, May 5.—Commending the election system of his state, Senator Bourne of Oregon in an extended speech in the senate today aroused a general debate on the question of representative government, which dealt especially with the effect on the southern states of the system of selecting federal officials for that section.

Mr. Bourne dwelt in terms of admiration on the methods of conducting elections and selecting office-holders in Oregon. No sooner had he taken his seat than Senator Bacon of Georgia entered upon a plea for more voice in the appointment of federal officials for the southern states.

When Mr. Bourne concluded, Senator Brown of Nebraska asked general consent that 50,000 copies of the speech be printed for circulation, but Mr. Gallinger objected.

Mr. Brown spoke of the speech as a "remarkable one," and said it had demonstrated the Oregon system was no longer an experiment.

Georgia's senator's speech evoked extended remarks by Senator Carter of Montana, who advocated taking the postoffice out of politics.

Agreeing with a suggestion made by his colleague, Mr. Clay, that the senate should adopt a rule against the confirmation of any federal appointee not endorsed by the senators from his state, Mr. Bacon made a general condemnation of the referee system prevailing in the south.

Mr. Smith of Michigan opposed application of the classified service law to postmasters.

Mr. Carter found in the postal commission's proposed change of the postal laws a panacea for the ills mentioned. Under that system the postal service would be put upon a business basis, he said, and by the elimination of 50,000 postmasters from politics, the difficulties suggested by Mr. Bacon would be overcome.

The Carter scheme did not appeal to Mr. Hale. He denounced it as a plan for the obliteration of all state lines and the usurpation of power by the federal government.

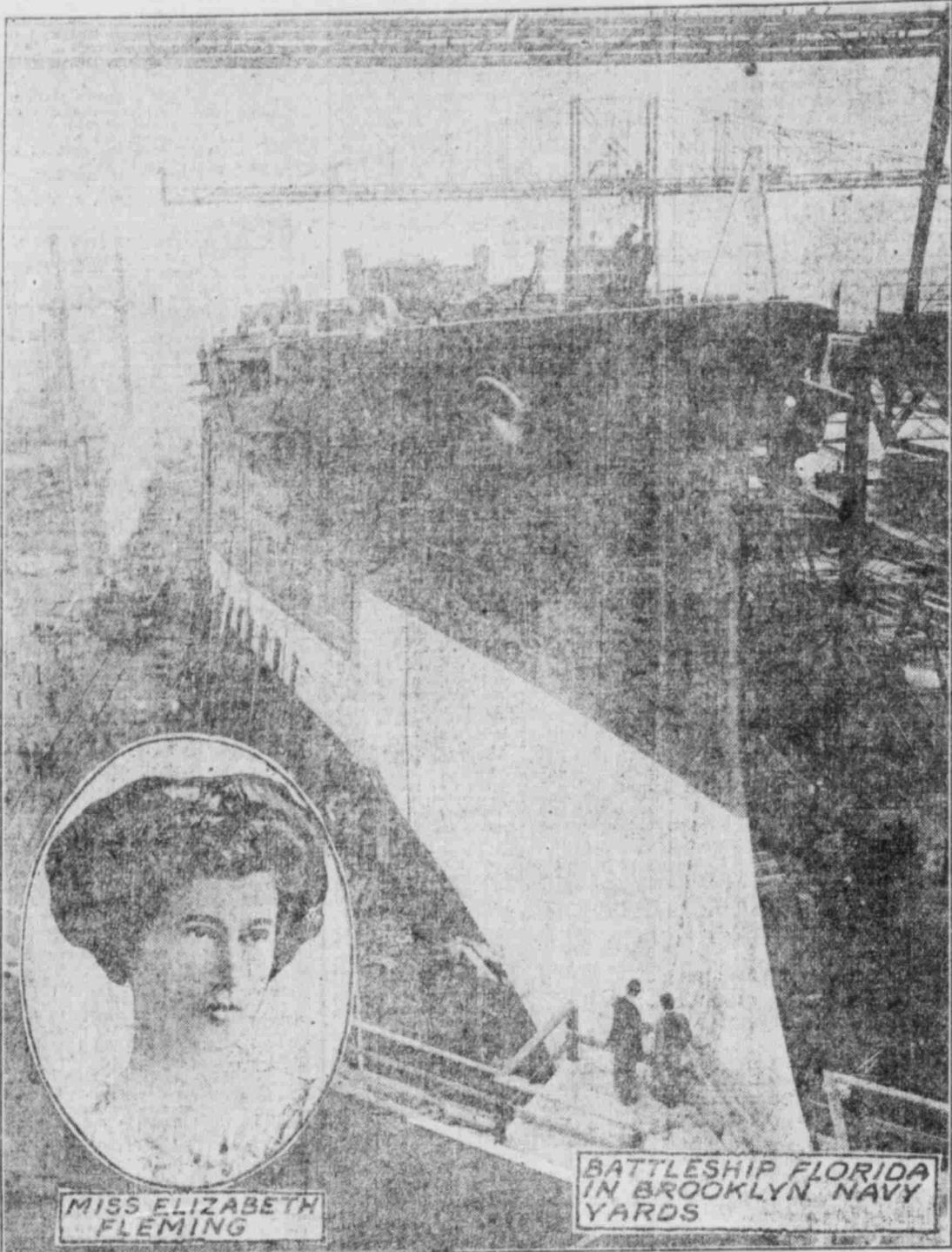
SENATOR BOURNE'S ADDRESS.

After outlining the contest, Mr. Bourne said:

"At the general election, June, Senator Chamberlain defeated Mr. Calkins notwithstanding the state was overwhelmingly Republican, thereby leveling from the Democratic candidate into the people's choice for United States senator. The normal Republican majority in Oregon, I think, is from 15,000 to 20,000.

"With full recognition of Gov. Chamberlain's ability and fitness for the office the fact that for nearly six years he made the best governor Oregon ever had and considering that undoubtedly he is the most popular man in our state, I deem it but just to the law and as proper to the criticism of enemies of the law that it destroys party lines and integrity to state that in my opinion Senator Chamberlain received the votes of several thousand Republican enemies of the law who believed that in selecting Gov. Chamberlain, a Democrat, they would pre-

vent a Republican legislature from ratifying the people's election. "Thus they hoped to make the primary law and state cumbersome and odious and sought to create what they thought would be an impossible condition by forcing upon a Republican legislature for confirmation the popularly designated Democratic candidate for United States senator. "They failed to realize that greater than party and infinitely greater than any individual the people's choice becomes a representative of the principle and law; and that the intelligence and integrity of the whole electorate of the state, as well as the integrity and loyalty of the members of the legislature, were at stake. The mere intimation of

the possibility of the legislature failing to obey the instruction of the people would only be an insult to the intelligence and independence of the Oregon electorate. "Senator Bourne declared the primary system to be preferable to the old convention plan, largely because it protected the people against boss rule. "Results attained under direct legislation in Oregon," he said, "compare so favorably with the work of a legislative assembly that an effort to repeal the initiative and referendum would be overwhelmingly defeated. No effort has been attempted. "Plainly stated, the aim of our law is to destroy the irresponsible political machine and put all elective offices in

the state in direct touch with the people as the real source of authority; in short, to give direct and full force to the ballot of every individual elector in Oregon and to eliminate dominance of corporate and corrupt influences in the administration of public affairs. "The Oregon laws mark the course that must be pursued before the wrongful use of corporate powers can be destroyed, the people restored to power and lasting reform secured. They insure absolute government by the people."

CHAMP CLARK HONORED.

Funeral Oration Over De Armond Sent Out as Campaign Document.

Washington, May 5.—Representative Champ Clark, the Democratic leader, has been accorded the unprecedented distinction of being the first member of the house to have one of his funeral orations sent broadcast over the country as a campaign document. Recently Mr. Clark delivered in the house an eloquent eulogy upon the life of the late Representative DeArmond of Missouri. In the course of his address he dwelt upon the long and uninterrupted service in Congress of Mr. DeArmond and of the great value of his work in the house to his constituents by reason of their allowing him to remain in Congress for nearly a score of years. Mr. Clark pointed out how the abilities of congressmen are increased with the length of their service in Washington.

Now Mr. Clark's speech is being sent broadcast in 10,000 lots by Democratic members who are endeavoring to convince their constituents they should be continued in Congress.

BELIEVE SHINGLE ORDERS HAVE BEEN "KITED"

Seattle, Dn., May 6.—The belief that a large number of lumber and shingle firms in the middle west have been "kiting" shingle orders on a large scale, has put shippers in the northwest on their guard, so that now it is only after an investigation that shingles are forwarded at all. Hundreds of cars of shingles that were shipped during April from Washington mills to small unknown retailers in the middle west, principally to points in Kansas, Nebraska, and Missouri, are said to have been stopped and bonds furnished the railroads to guarantee freight charges and to indemnify them against damages.

Middle west firms, it is stated, have ordered at least \$2,000,000 worth of shingles in the northwest without advancing money to the shippers and ordering the shippers to forward the bills of lading so that they might be in a position to divert the cars while in transit. Shippers here declare they have proof that in several instances firms ordering cars in the northwest sold the shingles to shippers who agreed to pay the original shipper.

Those looking into the mysterious operations of middle west firms have not as yet learned how many cars were delivered before they could be stopped.

Shingle manufacturers who are participating in the movement to curtail the output of the mills of the state have issued a statement that 50 per cent of the mills are idle. As a result of the suspension it is declared from 1,500 to 2,000 carloads of shingles have already been kept off the market.

SALOONS IN GARY.

Hundred and Fifty Said Not to be Excessive Number.

Chicago, May 6.—After sending an investigating committee to Gary, Ind., the political action committee of the United Societies yesterday reported that 150 saloons is not an excessive number for the steel town. The investigation was caused by reports that with a return to a "wet" regime May 1 too many saloons would be established.

The committee report says: "The committee desires to report that, while it is opposed to the opening of a great many saloons in any one locality, it believes that the present situation at Gary presents a much better outlook than under the prohibition rule." Gary has a population of about 15,000.
