Washington, Jan. 18 .- A permanent tariff board along the lines of the Dalzell bill was agreed upon by the twelve Republican members of the House committee on ways and means today, by a vote of eight to four. The action followed a series of conferen ces over the various plans for a permanent tariff body, which President Taft has been urging Congress to pro

vide at this session. Today's action was taken after a long discussion of the two leading plans, the Longworth bill, favored by the administration, and the Dalzell bill.

The Longworth bill provides for commission of five members at \$7,500 each annually, and the Dalzell bill \$7,500 and the other two \$7,000 each. The Dalzell bill authorizes the board President's consent is necessary to inquiries abroad and the reports are to be made to the President or the House ways and means committee, or the Senate finance committee, whenever called for.
