If they wish to have every charge against them pushed by the District Attorney's office, with that office demanding the limit on every count on which they may be found guilty, they will confree by making it appear that that official is standing between them and 100 cents on the dollar.

This information came to The Tribune yesterday from a source whose reliability cannot be questioned. Personally Mr. Whitman refuses to discuss Siegel's lialk of fight and the efforts that are being made to force his hand. He may tolk later. He resents very strongly what he considers an effort on the part of SI wel, Vogel, their lawyers and their Triencs to compel any promise of immu-


