

Probably none of the "new navy" has been equipped in a more hasty man-er. Sundays have been fully occupied of alle getting her armament on beard. Just what is the exact reason for the unusual matter is not clear. aste is not clear.

haste is not clear. The Puritan, though built a score of years ago, has never been in commission. She is the largest ship of her class in the American navy. The Puritan is a double turreted affair. Her main armaingnt con-sists of four 12-inch rapid-firing guns, placed in the fore and aft turrets. Besides this the monitor carries a dozen other guns of smaller caliber. The ves-set's waterline length is 289 feet six in-





by Judge Henderson. Rockville, Nov. 11.-At the meeting of the November term of the circuit court, which

November term of the circuit court, which began here yesterday, Associate Judge James B. Henderson spoke strongly of the recent crimes, and referred to the Buxton tragedy and the lynching of Bandolph. In his charge to the grand jury he dwelt at length upon the many crimes which have been committed in this county since the last -session of court, and statted that never be-fore in the history of the court has there been so many prisoners in jail and so many heinous crimes committed in such a short space of time. He spoke of the Buxton tragedy, the Thornton murder and the lynching of Randolph.

He characterized the latter crime as deliberate, willful, and cowardly murder, which, he believed, was committed by a small crowd of brutat men, organized with the sole purpose of murder.

He directed the jury to make a thorough investigation of this terrible blot on the good name of Montgomery county, and, if possible, bring the perpetrators to justice.
