

THE VINCENNES

10,000 TON WARSHIP

VICE-ADMIRAL ON BOARD

With the sun shining on her imposing bulk of superstructure, the 10,000-ton American cruiser cennes moved up Rangitoto Channel shortly before two o'clock this afternoon and dropped anchor in the stream. She will berth at Prince's wharf later this afternoon.

The cruiser brought to New Zealand for his fourth visit this year Vice-Admiral Paul Hendren, Commander of the South Pacific Area and Force, who will go to Wellington next week on official business.

Features of the Vincennes, in addition to her considerable superstructure, are the two treble turrets for and aft and two smaller turrets on either side of the batteries. There are a number of antiaircraft guns.

When she came up the harbour the Vincennes was fiving the vice-admiral's flag—two white stars on a blue background—and the American ensign.

The ship's arrival attracted many
Aucklanders to the waterfront.

Arrangements for allowing the
public on board the ship, if any, will
be made later.

There will be an exchange of visits
between Vice-Admiral Hendren and
civic and Service representatives following the berthing of the ship. First
to call on the vice-admiral will be
the United States Consul in Auckland, Mr. John C. Fuess. Other
callers this afternoon will be Commodore W. K. D. Dowding, R.N.,
naval officer in charge at Auckland,
the captain superintendent of the
Devonport naval dockyard, Captain
D. A. Bingley, R.N. (retired), the captain of the New Zealand cruiser
Gambia, Captain R. Edwards, R.N.,
and Auckland Harbour Board representatives.

To-morrow at 9 a.m. the Officer
'ommanding the Northern Military
District, Brigadier A. B. Williams,
will go on board the cruiser and will
be followed by the senior R.N.Z.A.F.
officer in Auckland, Group-Captain
C. C. Hunter. Vice-Admiral Hendren
will then return the calls, calling on
the Mayor, Mr. Allum, at 10.15 a.m.
Mr. Allum will visit the ship at
11.30. A reception at Milne and
Choyce's Reception Hall will be held
by the Consul from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m.
Several concerts will be given by
the large band that is carried in the
ship, including a lunch-hour recital
in the Town Hall on Thursday, a
recital in the Auckland Hospital
grounds on Saturday afternoon and
another on Sunday afternoon at the
Parnell Rose Gardens.
