SHIP'S HISTORY

The BLUEGILL's Keel was laid in the South part of the Main Yard at Electric Boat Company, Groton, Connecticut on December 17, 1942.

On August 8, 1943, she was christined by the Sponsor, Mrs. W. Sterling Cole, wife of Congressman Cole from New York State.

The U.S.S. ELUEGILL was commissioned at the U.S. Naval Submarine Base, New London, Connecticut on November 11, 1943. Commanding Officer was Lieutenant Commander E. L. Barr, Jr., U.S. Navy. After the commissioning ceremony the Officers and Crew took over.

On January 3, 1944, the ELUEGILL sailed for U. S. Naval Base, Balboa, Panama, stopping at Key West, Florida. She arrived at U. S. Naval Base, Balboa, Panama, on February 2, 1944, where she had a training period. On February 22, 1944 the BLUEGILL departed for the South West Pacific, stopping briefly on February 25th at South Seymore Island Naval Base, Galapagos, where King Neptune came aboard.

The BLUEGILL arrived at Milne Bay, New Guinea, on March 23, 1944 and moored alongside the U.S.S. EURYALE.

On April 1, 1944, the BLUEGILL departed for her first . War Patrol. In the following months, the BLUEGILL made six (6) War Patrols sinking 12 ships, miscellaneous sailing vessels and capturing Pratas Island. The total tonnage of ships sunk was 51,158 and total tonnage of ships damaged was 12,000 tons.

The BLUEGILL was relieved on the 6th of June 1945 with orders to proceed to Pearl Harbor via Saipan. She arrived in Pearl Harbor, T. H. on the 21st for a short rest.

A week later she was enroute for the west coast and passed below the Golden Gate Bridge on the morning of July 2. She went to Bethleham Steel Submarine Repair Basin where she started undergoing a navy yard overhaul.

Upon completion of navy yard overhaul at Bethleham Steel, the BLUEGILL reported to Mare Island Naval Shipyard where she went into mothballs on March 1, 1946.

The BLUEGILL was a member of the zipper fleet until the call of her country came once again. On April 20, 1951, the
