U.S.S. SARDA (SS-488)

Ship's History

The U.S.S. SARDA was built at the U.S. Naval Shipyard, Portsmouth, New Hampshire, during the latter part of World War II and was launched on 24 August 1945. The building of SARDA was financed during the Seventh War Loan by bonds purchased by residents of Lynn, Massachusetts. For this reason the U.S.S. SARDA is known as "The City of Lynn Ship".

In April, 1946 SARDA was commissioned and after shakedown cruise in the Caribbean area was assigned to Submarine Division 22 in New London, Conn.

Between overhaul periods in 1947 and 1949 SARDA earned and received the coveted Navy "E" Battle Efficiency Pennant for the Atlantic Submarine Force.

Following the 1949 overhaul SARDA was transferred from Submarine Division 22 to Submarine Division 21. The SARDA underwent four more overhauls in Philadelphia, in 1951, 1953, 1955, and 1955, returning after each to training duties in New London, Conn.

The SARDA has specialized in training duties for both Enlisted and Officer personnel. However the SARDA has participated in many maneuvers and trips.

Some of the places visited by the SARDA include Bermuda, Cuba, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, Panama, Halifax, Jamaica, Brazil, Cape Verde Islands, and numerous U. S. seaboard ports.

The U. S. S. SARDA has had eight commanding officers to date.

PROPULSION PLANT

Two direct current electric motors, each driving one shaft, and receiving power from either a combination of one to four Diesel - generator sets (surfaced) or from the ship's batteries (submerged).
