USS GATO (SSN 615) HISTORY

"594 TOUGH"

USS GATO (SSN 615) was the last of the PERMIT class nuclear fast attack submarines in commission.

GATO, the second ship to bear the name, was authorized to be constructed in the 1960 Shipbuilding Program. The keel to the ship was laid on 15 December 1961 at the Electric Boat Division of General Dynamics Corporation, Groton, Connecticut. The ship was launched 14 May 1964 at Groton after being christened by Mrs. Lawson P. Ramage, wife of then Rear Admiral Ramage, Deputy Commander Submarine Force, U.S. Atlantic Fleet.



Originally intended as the twelfth submarine of the PERMIT Class, GATO was extensively modified during the construction period. Shortly after launching, she was towed to the Quincy Division of General Dynamics Corporation where various alterations were accomplished to increase her capabilities over previous ships of the class.

These alterations included lengthening of the hull by adding a new section amidships, installation of a large sail, and accomplishment of modifications which upgraded the integrity of sea water systems. Following successful completion of sea trials, GATO was commissioned on 25 January 1968.

In August 1968 she became the first nuclear powered submarine to visit Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. In July 1976 GATO became the first nuclear powered submarine to transit the tortuous Straits of Magellan in her circumnavigation of the South American continent. GATO was commended several times for successfully completing highly classified missions which have contributed significantly to the defense of the United States. GATO has steamed over 650,000 miles during her 28 years of service.

GATO was awarded the Meritorious Unit Commendation five times and was awarded the following awards as the outstanding submarine in Squadrons TEN and TWO:
