## USS JOHN ADAMS (SSBN 620)

USS JOHN ADAMS (SSBN 620) is the Navy's seventeenth nuclear powered fleet ballistic missile submarine and is named in honor of John Adams, the second President of the United States, and John Quincy Adams, the sixth President of the United States.

USS JOHN ADAMS began her career as she slid down the ways at Portsmouth, New Hampshire, at 1:10 pm on January 12, 1963. At 425 feet and 8000 tons, the JOHN ADAMS was the largest submarine launched from Portsmouth at the time. Mrs. James C.(Abigail Adams) Manny, the great-great-great granddaughter of John Quincy Adams, broke the traditional bottle of champagne on the submarine's stern, sending her bow first, into the icy Piscataqua River. On May 12, 1964, CDR Lando W. Zech, Jr. and CDR Paul J. Early assumed command of the Blue and Gold crews of the JOHN ADAMS and set the first watch as the ship was commissioned.

After a shakedown cruise, and test firing of her Polaris missiles off Cape Kennedy, Florida, USS JOHN ADAMS joined other Polaris missile subs on station. JOHN ADAMS then completed sixteen Polaris deterrent patrols while assigned to the Atlantic Fleet in operations based in Holy Loch, Scotland, and Rota, Spain. In August 1968, she transited the Panama Canal on her way to Puget Sound Naval Shipyard in Bremerton, Washington, for overhaul and modernization. JOHN ADAMS completed overhaul in August 1969, and returned to sea as a unit of the Pacific Fleet. It was during this time of service in the Pacific Fleet that the USS JOHN ADAMS was awarded a Meritorious Unit Commendation for her outstanding performance from December 1969 through October 1970.

Upon completion of her thirty-second patrol, JOHN ADAMS entered Portsmouth Naval Shipyard at Portsmouth, New Hampshire, for her second overhaul and conversion to the Poseidon missile system. During the overhaul period, JOHN ADAMS was presented with the 1975 COMSUBLANT Golden Anchor Award signifying the highest retention rate in the Atlantic Fleet Submarine Force. The ship completed her 26 month overhaul and conversion in April 1976, and returned to sea as a unit of the Atlantic Fleet.

After completing an additional forty-three patrols, from both her homeport in Charleston, South Carolina, and Holy Loch, Scotland, USS JOHN ADAMS transited the Panama Canal to again enter Puget Sound Naval Shipyard; this time in preparation for deactivation after a long and distinguished career.

During her last three years of service, the USS JOHN ADAMS has been awarded the 1986 Commander Submarine Force, U.S. Atlantic Fleet Silver Anchor Award for outstanding retention, been designated a COMSUBLANT Tactical Readiness Evaluation "Top Performer" for three consecutive years, and was awarded the 1987 Commander, Submarine Squadron FOURTEEN Battle Efficiency "E" and Engineering Red "E".


Fast, silent, and virtually immune to surprise attack, JOHN ADAMS has combined the endurance of nuclear power with the deterrent might of sixteen Poseidon Missiles for over twenty-four years of distinguished commissioned service. During her seventy-five strategic deterrent patrols, she has traveled over 975,000 miles, nearly 900,000 of these submerged, for a total of over fifteen years below the waves in defense of her nation.



## JOHN ADAMS (1735-1826)

When John Adams was elected President in the last years of the eighteenth century, the United States was a weak continental power, its influence ending at its own shores. During his four years as this nation's second Commander in Chief, John Adams became one of the leading proponents of a strong Navy. For his efforts, he is often referred to as "The Father of our Navy." John Adams became one of the first seven Commissioners of the Navy and helped draw up the first Navy Regulations. It was during his administration that the Department of the Navy was formed, and three famous frigates commissioned: the UNITED STATES, the CONSTITUTION, and the CONSTELLATION. Before he left office, John Adams saw to it that sixteen more vessels were authorized by Congress.

Before his death, John Adams was to see his vision and the nation's new Navy proved during the War of 1812. To the amazement of the world, the USS CON-STITUTION defeated the British frigate GUERRIERE. This battle marked the beginning of the end of Great Britains undisputed control of the seas.



## JOHN QUINCY ADAMS (1767-1848)

John Quincy Adams, the son of John Adams, was an early convert to the influences of sea power. Coming from Quincy, Massachussets, he saw first hand the relationship between a free seagoing trade and the success of the New England colonies. As a highly successful Secretary of State, and later as the sixth President of the United States, John Quincy Adams strove to keep the governments of the Americas free from foreign pressure and intervention. In an effort to ensure the free and independent development of the Americas, John Quincy Adams implemented the state paper which is now known as the Monroe Doctrine.

In 1823, when the Monroe Doctrine was proclaimed, the United States Navy was greatly outnumbered by the British Fleet. Yet John Quincy Adams, knowing full well this state of affairs, placed great confidence in the abilities of the Navy, and boldly declared to the Old World that ". . . we could not view any interposition of any foreign power in the Americas in any other light than as a manifestation of an unfriendly disposition towards the United States." Thus John Quincy Adams helped place the U.S. Navy in the position it holds today as a defender of the rights of free nations to follow their own destinies.

VICE ADMIRAL LANDO W. ZECH, Jr., USN(Ret) Vice Admiral Lando W. Zech, Jr. is currently the Chairman of the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission. During his career as a naval officer. Admiral Zech was instrumental in the development of the modern nuclear submarine navy.

Admiral Zech graduated from the Naval Academy and was commissioned in June of 1944. He served aboard two destroyers before entering the submarine service. Following entry into the submarine service, he served onboard the submarines USS FLY-ING FISH (SS 229), the USS BLACKFIN (SS 322) and the USS IREX (SS 482).

Admiral Zech assumed command of the submarine USS SEA ROBIN (SS 407) in January 1956. A year later he took command of the revolutionary high speed submarine USS ALBACORE (AGSS 569). For many years ALBACORE was the world's fastest submarine. In 1958, Admiral Zech entered the Navy's nuclear propulsion program.

His next assignment was as Commanding Officer of the Navy's, and the world's, first nuclear powered submarine, the USS NAUTILUS (SSN 571). During the period of his command, the NAUTILUS completed the first overhaul of a nuclear powered

ship and subsequently steamed more than 60,000 miles, most of which were submerged.

After leaving NAUTILUS, Admiral Zech attended courses of instruction in the Polaris Submarine Systems and reported to Portsmouth Naval Shipyard in November 1962 as prospective Commanding Officer (Blue) of USS JOHN ADAMS (SSBN 620). He completed construction of JOHN ADAMS and took part in commissioning the ship, becoming the first Commanding Officer of the Blue Crew.

Admiral Zech then returned to the surface fleet as Commanding Officer of the guided missile cruiser USS SPRINGFIELD (CLG-7), flagship of Commander SECOND Fleet.

Admiral Zech's shore duty assignments included an assignment to the Secretary of the Navy's Office of Program Appraisal; Deputy Chief of Legislative Affairs, Department of the Navy; and Deputy Commander of the Navy Recruiting Command, all in Washington, D.C., from 1970 to 1974. He then assumed the duties of Commandant of the Thirteenth Naval District, Seattle, WA, until 1976, and Chief of Naval Technical Training, Memphis, TN, until 1978. From 1978 to 1980, he served as Commander of U.S. Naval Forces in Japan.

Admiral Zech's last assignment was Chief of Naval Personnel and Deputy Chief of Naval Operations for Manpower, Personnel, and Training. He was stationed in Washington D.C., from July 1980 until his retirement from the Navy in October 1983.

Admiral Zech became Chairman of the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission on July 1, 1986. He has been a member of the Commission since July 5, 1984.

Among his honors are two Distinguished Service Medals, two Legion of Merit Awards, and the Navy Commendation Medal.

Admiral Zech and his wife, Josephine, live in Falls Church, Virginia. They have five daughters.

## REAR ADMIRAL PAUL J. EARLY, USN(Ret)

Rear Admiral Paul J. Early is presently a consultant for both the construction and electrical utility industries. His career spans nuclear power from the initial NAUTILUS prototype naval nuclear reactor in 1953 to the nuclear generation plants in service to-day.

After graduation from the U.S. Naval Academy in 1947 and following duty on a destroyer, an aircraft carrier, and two conventional submarines, Admiral Early entered the Navy's nuclear propulsion program in 1953. During his two years at the prototype of the NAUTILUS reactor plant in Idaho, he participated as a Chief Operator in the initial operational testing and took part in the first refueling. It was during this tour that Admiral Early became the second naval officer to qualify as a Reactor Engineer.

Admiral Early served for two years as the Chief Engineer of the USS NAUTILUS (SSN 571), the world's first nuclear powered submarine. During this tour, he participated in the Arctic Ocean under ice explorations of 1957 and 1958 which included the first under ice voyage from the North Pole by a ship. For this, the NAUTILUS was awarded the first peacetime Presidential Unit Citation. Before leaving the NAUTILUS, he directed the ship's first reactor refueling.

From 1958 until 1961, Admiral Early served as Executive Officer and Navigator of the USS HALIBUT during its construction and shakedown voyages. He went on to command the nuclear attack submarine USS SARGO from 1961 to 1963, the first Commanding Officer not to have had prior command experience on a conventional powered submarine.

In 1963 Admiral Early reported as the first Commanding Officer of the Gold Crew of the nuclear Polaris missile submarine USS JOHN ADAMS (SSBN 620). He served during the ship's construction and completed six successful strategic deterrent patrols operating from both Holy Loch, Scotland, and Rota, Spain.

From 1967 to 1970, as the first Senior Member of the Atlantic Fleet Nuclear Propulsion Examining Board, Admiral Early established high fleet standards of training, maintenance, and operational ability for nuclear propulsion crews.

In 1970 and 1971 Admiral Early served as Commander, Submarine Squadron FOURTEEN, in Holy Loch, Scotland which was responsible for the repair and replenishment of forward based fleet ballistic missile submarines. He followed with a tour in command of the Submarine Flotilla at New London, CT, where 25 nuclear submarines were supported, 20 other nuclear submarine crews were trained, and the Basic Submarine School is located.

After two years at the Pentagon as Director of Ocean Surveillance, Admiral Early retired from the Navy in 1976 to join the New York Power Authority. In over 11 years with the company, Admiral Early rose to Senior Vice President and Manager of Projects.

While on active duty, he was awarded two Legions of Merit, two Meritorious Service Medals, a Presidential Unit Citation, and a Navy Unit Commendation.

Admiral Early and his wife, Violet, reside in Manhasset, NY. They have a son, Brian, and a daughter, Susan, as well as a grand-son, Robert.

COMMANDER THOMAS J. ELLIOTT, JR., USN Commander Thomas J. Elliott, Jr., the son of CDR and Mrs. T.J. Elliott, USN(Ret.) of Hendersonville, North Carolina, graduated with distinction from the United States Naval Academy in June 1970, with a Bachelor of Science (BS) Degree in nuclear physics.

Following commissioning, he completed the Submarine Officer Basic Course and reported onboard the USS DOGFISH (SS-350)

where he served as Communications Officer and qualified in submarines.

From September 1972 to October 1974, Commander Elliott attended the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) under a Burke Scholarship during which time he earned an Engineers Degree in Ocean Engineering.

Following completion of Nuclear Power Training in December 1975, Commander Elliott reported to the USS WILL ROGERS (SSBN-659) where he served as the Reactor Control and Damage Control Assistant and qualified as Engineer Officer. In May 1978, he reported to the USS ROBERT E. LEE (SSBN 601) as Engineer Officer. During this tour, he completed a Demonstration and Shakedown Operation, an interfleet transfer and two years of varied operations, in the Pacific Ocean. Following detachment from the ROBERT E. LEE, he served as the Engineering Training Department Director at the TRIDENT Training Facility, Bangor, Washington, developing and implementing eighty-seven Trident engineering courses of instruction.

In October 1983, Commander Elliott reported onboard USS OHIO (SSBN 726) as the GOLD crew Executive Officer. During the next two years, OHIO was awarded the Navy Meritorious Unit Commendation, the Squadron SEVENTEEN 1985 Battle Efficiency "E", the 1985 Supply Readiness "E", and the 1985 and 1986 ASW "A".

Commander Elliott has been awarded the Meritorious Service Medal and the Navy Commendation Medal, and is authorized to wear the Navy Meritorious Unit Commendation and the Battle Efficiency "E" Ribbons.

Commander Elliott is married to the former Deborah Marie Marshall of Hackettstown, New Jersey. He and his wife, Debi, have twin daughters, Sacha and Heather.
