Fellow Association Members, Former Sailors, Friends, and Family,

I hope this newsletter finds all of you safe and in good health and spirits. I watch the news as you do and am concerned about Hamas's attack on Israel. I agree with our military response to the situation and am thankful for where we are today. But I would be remiss if I didn't tell you this situation reminds me of past Deployments to the Mediterranean. I am familiar with the whole area and have visited many ports in Israel.

When I heard the call for a second US aircraft carrier, the *USS Dwight D. Eisenhower Carrier Strike Group*, to join the *USS Gerald R. Ford Carrier Strike Group*, memories came flooding back to me. I remember our ship, the USS Yosemite, being part of a large Battle Group with numerous other ships involved in the Gulf War. As many of you may know, the Yosemite consistently played a vital role in those world events at the time. We did all the same things happening today, went to the same places, and were often on station with other ships for the same reasons.

During the Gulf War, we were directed to the area of hostilities just like today's sailors serving the *USS Dwight D. Eisenhower and R. Ford Carrier Strike Groups*. As sailors of the US Navy, we are both dedicated to our duty and performing our mission. I recall working long hours supporting those ships in the Gulf War with different names that had been forgotten for the many repair jobs. Our presence made it possible for ships to be repaired at sea and not have to enter a port, which would put them at risk or in harm's way. Many of you were on fly-away teams to support ships or traveled by small boats to support the mission. I even recall having a ship strapped to us underway to accomplish repairs.

While we are no longer on the front lines, we have been in the same Mediterranean waters at different times. We were there under the same tension of wartime trauma as today's US Navy sailors will feel. I still remember doing my mission-critical work at sea under these stressful conditions! It is equally important that our memories be shared and kept alive.

Now, to change the topic to our 2024 Reunion, it has been six months since our last Reunion, and many of you who will read this had good reasons they couldn't join us in

Cream Of Celery Soup, Saltines, Stuffed Celery, Ripe Olives, Giblet Gravy, Cranberry Sauce, Roast Tom Turkey, Apple Dressing, Sweet Potatoes, Baked Ham Hawaiian Cabbage-Orange Salad, Sweet Mayonnaise, Buttered Asparagus, Parker House Rolls, Buttered Whipped Potatoes, Steamed Kernel Corn, Bread, Butter, Mince Pie, Ice Cream, Lemonade, Cigars and Cigarettes.

Now that is going all out!



and we can tell them at the Reunion with like-minded sailors sharing their stories and maybe adding to yours. Please make that your next priority.

I know that some of you have been struggling with health issues. While it has been known to only a few, I have had significant challenges this year. If it were not for modern medicine, I would not be with you now. But no matter what, I intend to be at the Reunion because I am very aware that some time cannot be made up. I want to be among those who attend the Reunion to re-live our experiences and, with the help of some who were with me, perhaps modify some of my own stories to keep them as factual as possible.

I still believe the Repair Officer (now Retired Capt. Phil Johnson) was at my side when I was in a predicament trying to get back to Yosemite. We have just reacquired a complete sampling of the Mines that we had recovered during the Gulf War. As my side of the story goes, I was getting ready to be perhaps incarcerated along with all my helpers and six others standing by the truck full of Mines confiscated. But those close to my table at our last Reunion must have heard the correction I was receiving from Phil, being supported by Lt Avery, who I think was paid to take a side opposing my story. Phil had a different version of the story of liberating these mines as Rear Admiral Raynor Taylor ordered.

According to Phil, my side of the story lacked an essential detail; he wasn't with me when I faced incarceration, but Phil did prevent it from happening with a couple of phone calls. The only reasonable solution for me will be to find some of those who were a part of the group to collaborate on my side of the story. This is part of the fun of telling sea stories. At the next Reunion, don't hesitate to ask me about this story performed in the dark of night to recover enemy mines from a Navy facility unwillingly to give them up.

I never personally met Gilbert "Smokey" Honermann myself. But, I was well aware he was active in our Association and contributed his time and efforts to improve it and keep it going. In the last newsletter, I told you that I had been in contact with Jane Sonnabend, his daughter. Smokey was so pleased to receive all of our newsletters, and daughter read them all to him. At the last Reunion in Jacksonville, we received a host of great things donated to us by Jane that we raffled off. Those artifacts were happily given to fellow sailors on behalf of her father. Smokey ran our Yosemite's Ships Store, as well as Secretary, Treasurer, and Historian in the past, and was well acquainted with the best choices of things of interest. In my May newsletter, I talked about Smokey and some of
