THE COMMISSION PENNANT

The commission pennant has for centuries been the symbol of a man-of-war. Today it is a distinctive mark of a ship of the Navy in commission and is flown from the masthead, except when displaced by the personal flag of an admiral or commodore aboard a flagship.

It is said the commission pennant dates back to the 17th century war between Holland and England. A Dutch Admiral hoisted a broom at the masthead, indicating his intention to sweep the English from the sea. This gesture was answered by an English Admiral who hoisted a horsewhip, indicating his intention to chastise the Dutchman-which he did. Ever since that time the narrow, coachwhip pennant, symbolizing the original horsewhip, has been the distinctive mark of a ship of war adopted by all nations.

The modern U.S. Navy commission pennant is blue at the hoist, with a union of seven white stars and has two horizontal stripes, a red and a white, at the fly.

THE UNION JACK

The Union Jack, like many customs and traditions in the U.S. Navy has its origin in the British Navy. Its derivation has been traced to the south-east coast of England in the early 1500's. Sailors of the Cinque Ports, by whom the royal navies in early days were principally manned, are recorded to have worn as their uniform, "a cote of white cotyn, with a red crosse and the armes of ye ports underneathe." These surcoats, or "Jacques" came in time to be known as the "Jacks" of the various nationalities they represented; and it was from the raising of those on board, when troops were being conveyed by water, that the single flag bearing on it only the cross of St. George, or the cross of St. Andrew, came to be known as a "Jack." From this origin too, the small flag-pole at the bow of a ship is still called the "Jackstaff."

This custom of wearing the national Jack at the bow became early established, and was recognized as a distinguishing mark of a man-of-war in the British Navy as early as 1634. A jack has been shown flying on an American Naval vessel in paintings and drawings as early as 1785. The Union Jack as we know it today is traditionally flown at the jackstaff when a ship is moored. It has been displayed at points other than the jackstaff for several other purposes, such as to indicate a General courts-martial in session or the presence of diplomatic personnel on board a boat.

ACCOUNTABILITY

"We are told men should no longer be held accountable for what they do as well as for what they intended. To err is only human, it absolves responsibility."

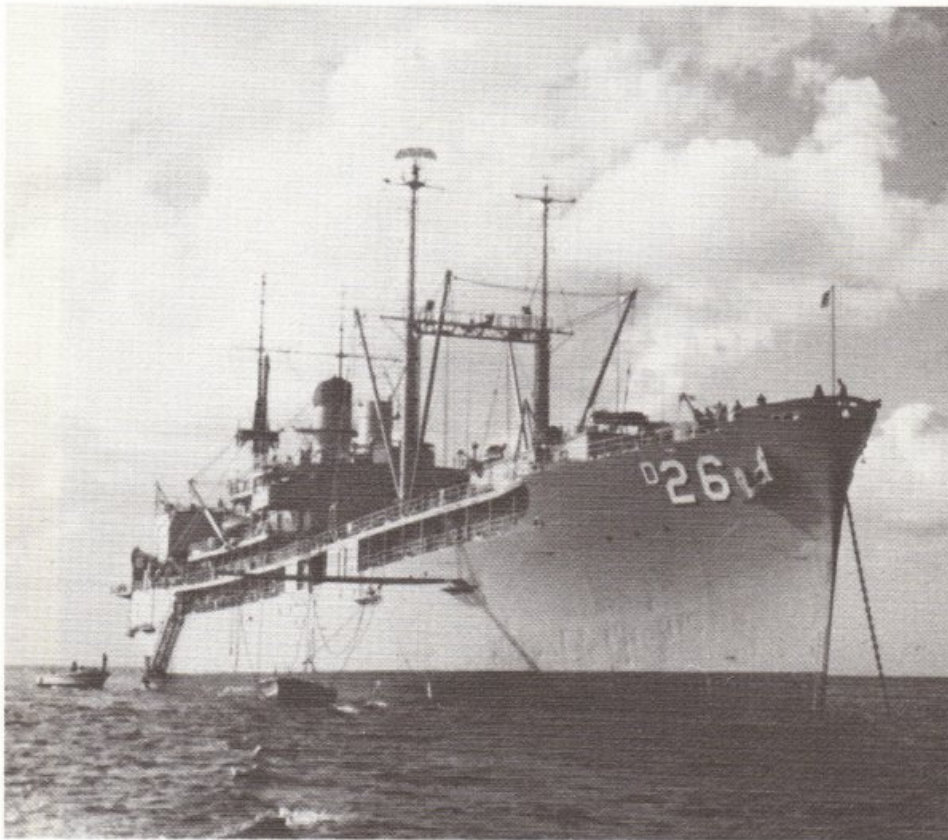

"This accountability is not for intentions but for the deed. The captain of a ship, like the captain of a state, is given honor and privileges and trust beyond other men. But let him set the wrong course, let him touch ground, let him bring disaster to his ship or to his men, and he must answer for what he has done. No matter what, he cannot escape . . ."

"It is cruel, this accountability of good and well-intentioned men. But the choice is that or an end of responsibility and finally as the cruel scene has taught, an end to the confidence and trust in the men who lead, for men will not long trust leaders who feel themselves beyond accountability for what they do."

"And when men lose confidence and trust in those who lead, order disintegrates into chaos and purposeful ships into uncontrollable derelicts."

**CODE OF CONDUCT FOR MEMBERS
OF THE
UNITED STATES ARMED FORCES**

I

I am an American fighting man. I serve in the forces which guard my country and our way of life. I am prepared to give my life in their defense.

II

I will never surrender of my own free will. If in command I will never surrender my men while they still have the means to resist.

III

If I am captured I will continue to resist by all means available. I will make every effort to escape and aid others to escape. I will accept neither parole nor special favors from the enemy.

IV

If I become a prisoner of war, I will keep faith with my fellow prisoners. I will give no information or take part in any action which might be harmful to my comrades. If I am senior, I will take command. If not, I will obey the lawful orders of those appointed over me and will back them up in every way.

V

When questioned, should I become a prisoner of war, I am required to give name, rank, service number and date of birth. I will evade answering further questions to the utmost of my ability. I will make no oral or written statements disloyal to my country or its allies or harmful to their cause.

VI

I will never forget that I am an American fighting man, responsible for my actions, and dedicated to the principles which made my country free. I will trust in my God and in the United States of America.

HISTORY

Named for Virginia's beautiful Shenandoah National Park, USS SHENANDOAH (AD-26) was the first destroyer tender of her class to be constructed by the Todd Shipbuilding and Drydock Corporation of Tacoma, Washington. She was christened on 29 March 1945 by Mrs. Daniel Hunt and commissioned 13 August 1945.

SHENANDOAH'S mission has best been described by her motto, "We keep destroyers fit to fight." However, she has tended many types of ships, including cruisers, amphibious vessels, aircraft carriers, submarines, auxiliaries and mine sweepers. The repair efforts of the officers and men of SHENANDOAH have earned her a proud reputation in the Atlantic and Mediterranean.

In 1947 SHENANDOAH was the first flagship for Commander Naval Forces, Mediterranean. Since that first distinction, SHENANDOAH has served as flagship for Commander Cruiser-Destroyer Flotilla Four; Commander Cruiser-Destroyer Flotilla Twelve; Commander Cruiser-Destroyer Group Eight, and Commander, Service Group Two.

SHENANDOAH was awarded the Battle Efficiency Pennant for her competence in destroyer tending and her performance in Battle duties in 1952 and 1956. The tender was awarded the Engineering "E" in 1958, 1965, 1972, 1973, 1974 and 1979; the Supply "E" in 1962, 1963, 1967, 1976, and 1977; and the Communications "C" in 1978.

For her participation in contingency operations in the Eastern Mediterranean through October 1970, SHENANDOAH subsequently received the Meritorious Unit Commendation.

In addition to tending destroyers of the Atlantic Fleet, SHENANDOAH has deployed to the Mediterranean as Fleet Tender eighteen times, visiting many ports in Greece, France, Italy, Spain, Malta, Gibraltar, Tunisia and Turkey.

In April 1979 SHENANDOAH sailed from Norfolk on her final six month Mediterranean deployment. During the deployment more than 3,000 recognized repair jobs on various ships were completed by the crew of SHENANDOAH. The ship's 34th birthday was celebrated last August with an impressive ceremony in Gaeta, Italy.

Following today's decommissioning SHENANDOAH will be delivered to the Inactive Ships Depot in Portsmouth, Virginia where her final disposition will be determined.

We extend best wishes to the newly constructed USS YELLOWSTONE which will be homeported in Norfolk as SHENANDOAH's successor. We know YELLOWSTONE and her crew will uphold the same fine reputation that SHENANDOAH has maintained through her years of service.

The first vessel to bear the name Shenandoah was named for the Shenandoah River. She was launched in December 1862 and commissioned in June 1863 as United States Sloop-of-War SHENANDOAH. The SHENANDOAH played a major role in the blockading of North and South Carolina, in the amphibious assault on Fort Fisher in North Carolina (the largest amphibious operation in American history up to World War II), and in the protection of shipping lanes in the Carribean.

Following the Civil War, SHENANDOAH spent four years (1865-1869) in the Asiatic Squadron (the forerunner of today's Seventh Fleet) with the mission of keeping peace and watching over the interests of the United States.

She was involved in opening many Japanese ports to foreign trade and in charting and surveying the waters around Japan, China and Korea.

From 1870-1874 SHENANDOAH served with the European forces spreading goodwill for America throughout the Mediterranean. On Christmas day 1872 SHENANDOAH served as host to the King and Queen of Greece. On her return voyage from Europe to the states SHENANDOAH visited Caribbean ports.

SHENANDOAH was assigned duty with the South Atlantic Squadron from 1879-1882 and the South Pacific Squadron from 1883-1886. Her presence in South American waters greatly aided the security and protection of United States interest and citizens. The United States Sloop-of-War SHENANDOAH was decommissioned in October 1886 and sold to a shipping firm in California.

At the same time the Union Sloop-of-War SHENANDOAH was prowling the waters off the Carolinas during the American Civil War, the Confederates purchased a ship from Scotland (originally called the Sea King) in 1864 and commissioned her CSS SHENANDOAH. During her career as a Confederate Cruiser, CSS SHENANDOAH sailed the Atlantic capturing or destroying thirty-eight Union vessels, more than any other Confederate ship except the CSS ALABAMA. Following the war, CSS SHENANDOAH was sailed to England in December 1865 and surrendered to the British Government.

The third vessel to bear the name Shenandoah was a dirigible build by the United States Navy in 1923. It was constructed from the captured designs of a very early Zeppelin type dirigible. In September 1925 she was caught in 70 mph winds while crossing the Ohio Valley, encountering stresses beyond those anticipated by her designers, and broke into three segments. Twenty-nine of the forty-three persons aboard were saved.

**REAR ADMIRAL RICHARD E. NICHOLSON,
UNITED STATES NAVY (RET)**

Rear Admiral Nicholson was born in Charleroi, Pennsylvania. He started his military career as an enlisted man in the Army Air Corps in 1943 and served one year before entering the U.S. Naval Academy. The Admiral, as a junior officer, has been an instructor at the Naval Academy on two separate tours, has had duty on an aircraft carrier in the Pacific, a tour as operations officer on an amphibious assault destroyer in the Pacific and served as anti-submarine warfare officer and gunnery officer in a destroyer. He was operations officer on an amphibious staff and executive officer of a destroyer. In 1963, he was Special Assistant to the Secretary of the Navy, and the next year became the Administrative Aide.

Admiral Nicholson has had seven commands at sea. His first command was a minesweeper in the Atlantic. Later he commanded the destroyer USS LLOYD THOMAS (DD-764). This was followed by command of Destroyer Escort Squadron EIGHT in the Atlantic.

In 1968-69 he was Assistant Chief of Staff for Operations on the staff of Commander Naval Forces, Vietnam. During the same period in Vietnam, he commanded the Swift Boat Flotilla. After his tour in Vietnam, he commanded the Destroyer Group followed by command of Destroyer Squadron 26.

The Admiral's next tour of duty was in the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations, Washington D.C. From Washington, Admiral Nicholson took command of Cruiser-Destroyer Group EIGHT and commanded a Battle Group in the Mediterranean. He served on the NATO Staff in Naples, Italy. His last assignment before retiring was Commander Naval Base, Norfolk and Commandant Fifth naval District. He is presently Vice President, Marketing and Head of the Military and Government Services Department for the Virginia National Bank in Norfolk.

Admiral Nicholson has been awarded the Silver Star, four Legions of Merit, one in combat, one Bronze Star in combat, and two Meritorious Service Medals.

He is married to the former Marilyn Fiedler and they have two children.

A Portland, Maine native, Captain Charles M. Plumly attended the University of Maine prior to entering the U.S. Naval Academy where he graduated in 1955. He is married to the former Sibyl Ann Middleton of Thomasville, Georgia. Their son, Chad, is a senior at Frank W. Cox High School and their daughter, Honey, is in her final year at Lynnhaven Junior High School. Captain Plumly is a graduate of the Armed Forces Staff College and the Naval War College. His Naval Sub-speciality is Political-Military Strategic Planning.
