WELCOM ABOARD THE USNS GENERAL MAURICE ROSE. We hope that your voyage to Europe will be a pleasant and enjoyable experience.

Since most of the ships in the Military Sea Transportation service were built in WWII, they are not luxurious, but they are safe, dependable and comfortable. With the limitations of existing facilities.

You can be assured that everything possible will be done to make your voyage a memorable one.

The ROSE is virtually a floating city. She is 609 feet long and contains numerous facilities and services to make the voyage safe and pleasant. Power is supplied by four boilers located in two engine rooms, developing a total of 20,000 horse-power. Maximum speed is 21 knots, but the cruising speed, the most economical, is about 19 knots.

The engine room also contains evaporators. These convert sea water into drinking water by distillation.

Passengers on MSTs Transports are often curious and occasionally angry about the fact that many of the activities aboard the ship are not in full operation by noon of sailing day, or even the day after.

Perhaps the easiest way to begin an explanation is to point out that the military department whose principle responsibility is the welfare of the passengers total not more than 25 persons. Since almost half of them are medical personnel not directly concerned with "entertainment" of passengers--it is obvious that all of this work must be performed by the troops.

And when less than 700 troops are being carried, the military department falls under strength.

Troops stand guard, work in the galleys, operate the equipment to provide the ship's music, run the movie projectors, staff the game room, libraries, and newspaper, and generally help the Chaplain do a host of additional jobs that add to your comfort.

USNS GENERAL MAURICE ROSE

The ship on which you are sailing was built in 1945 by the Bethlehem Alameda Ship Yard.

She was originally called the Admiral Hugh Rodman. She sailed as a Navy Troop Transport in the Pacific from Seattle to the

Phillipines, Hawaii, Japan, and the Pacific Islands.

In May 1949, the ROSE was assigned to the Army control at New York, where she underwent conversion for peacetime usage.

On 17 Feb 1959, the ROSE was assigned to Brooklyn Army Terminal and renamed in honor of General Maurice Rose the Commanding General of the Third Armored Division.

His military career began in Jun of 1916, when he enlisted as a private in the First Officers Training Camp at Ft. Riley, Kansas and was commissioned as a 2d Lt in the Infantry Reserve in August, 1917. He was assigned to the 353d Inf and went to France with that unit. In May 1918 where he was wounded. He received the Purple Heart at St. Michiel in September. He was honorably discharged in June 1919. In 1920, he returned to the service with a commission in the Regular Army and throughout the 20's served at various posts in the continental U.S.

In 1930, he attended the Cavalry School and then served in the Canal Zone and the States with various units until becoming Executive Officer of the 1st Amd. Brigade, Ft. Know, Kentucky. Then shipped for overseas duty in October of 1944 he was named Commander of the 3d Armored Division in France.

He won the Silver Star while a Colonel for re-organizing, loading lagging elements of an attacking company and turning them over to the proper CO. His citation reads, "Colonel Rose then proceeded to the forward-most observation point and with complete disregard of enemy machine gun and shell fire set an example which reflects the finest and best traditions of our Armed Forces."

In March 1945 he was awarded the Distinguished Service Medal. A few days later, while leading his Division in an offensive deep in Germany, he was killed in Action near Paterbenn.

NEW COMMANDER NAMED FOR U.S. FORCES IN VIETNAM

Lieutenant General William C. Westmoreland has been appointed commander of American advisory forces in the Republic of Vietnam, the Defense Department has announced.

General Westmoreland, a combat veteran of WWII and the Korean War, succeeds Gen. Paul D. Harkins, who is retiring.

Before the appointment, Gen. Westmoreland served as deputy to Gen. Harkins, having been assigned early in 1963. General Harkins became commander of American forces in Vietnam in February, 1962.

General Westmoreland, 50, was a passenger recently in a helicopter fired on by Communist Viet Cong snipers. The General was uninjured, but four other Americans received minor wounds.

A graduate of West Point, Class of 1936, General Westmoreland was appointed Superintendent of the Academy in 1960, a post he held for three years.

He first saw combat when he led an artillery battalion ashore at Casablanca in 1942. He fought in Tunisia and Sicily and later landed June 6, 1944, (D-Day) on Utah Beach in France as an executive officer of the 9th Regt., 2d Inf Div.

It was in 1952 in Korea, where he was commander of the 187th Airborne Regiment Combat Team, that General Westmoreland was promoted from colonel to brigadier general. In 1956, at the age of 42, he became the youngest major general in the Army.

ARMED FORCES STRENGTH SHOWS DROP IN MARCH

The Defense Department has announced that the strength of the Armed Forces on March 31 was 2812 less than in Feb. 29.

Preliminary reports show the march 31 total as 2,692,922. In comparison, the March 31, 1964, strength is 1,640 less than the same date in 1963.

COMMITTEE SEEKS FACTS OF NASA TEST MISHAP

A National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) fact-finding committee, in a preliminary report on the accidental ignition of a solid propellant rocket motor in the Spin Test Facility at Cape Kennedy, Fla., April 14, has recommended a series of tests to determine if static electricity caused the accident.

The Orbiting Solar Observatory B (OSO-B) spacecraft was mounted atop a Delta third stage X-248 motor which ignited. The rocket tore away from the alignment stand on which it was mounted, hit the ceiling of the building and landed in a far corner. Eleven men working in the building were burned - two fatally - and the spacecraft badly damaged.

The fact-finding committee concluded that there were four possible reasons why the rocket motor could have ignited: heat, shock, outside radio signals or an electrical impulse.

Although at the time of the accident, all power was off in the spacecraft, the committee said it is possible static electricity could have built up in such a way as to cause ignition. The committee has recommended that a series of tests be made to determine sources and energies of static electricity required to cause ignition of the motor.

Until the fact-finding committee completes its investigation and makes its final report, NASA will attempt no further flights of the X-248, which has been used as third stage of the Delta and fourth stage of the Scout launch vehicle.

MYSTERIOUS PLANE CRASH

INVESTIGATION CONTINUES - SAN FRANCISCO -
INVESTIGATORS BOTH HERE AND IN WASHINGTON ATTEMPTED SUNDAY TO RECONSTRUCT THE FINAL MINUTES OF LAST THURSDAY'S MYSTERIOUS AIRLINER CRASH IN THE SAN FRANCISCO FOOTHILLS WHICH CLAIMED THE LIVES OF 44 PERSONS. A TAPE RECORDING OF THE LAST MESSAGES FROM THE PACIFIC AIR LINES PLANE HAS DISCLOSED THAT THE PILOT OR CO-PILOT CRIED OUT, "I'M SHOT, SHOT, OH MY GOD, HELP, JUST BEFORE IT DIVED TO EARTH NEAR DANVILLE 40 MILES FROM SAN FRANCISCO. THE RECORDING AND A HEAVY REVOLVER FOUND IN THE WRECKAGE OF THE PLANE THUS FAR ARE THE INVESTIGATORS ONLY KNOWN CLUES IN THE MYSTERY SURROUNDING THE CRASH OF THE ILL-FATED F-37 TURBOJET CRAFT. 15TH ARMED FORCES DAY FINDS AMERICA'S MIGHT ON WORLD-WIDE DISPLAY

Washington (AFPS)—The land, sea and air power of the U. S. military forces is on exhibit throughout the Free World, May 9-16, to demonstrate the United States' preparedness.

An array of weapon systems in the U. S. defense inventory will depict the potential retaliatory power of this nation. These weapons are present also to secure the primary goal of the United States—PEACE.

To demonstrate this goal, the slogan for Armed Forces Day 1964 is once again "Power for Peace".

Military bases in the United States and on foreign soil will hold open house for a one-week period to permit greater public and military participation. May 16, has been designated Armed Forces Day.

An Armed Forces parade and review will be held on the Washington Monument grounds here May 10. Participating will be cadets from each service academy and bands from each branch of the Armed Forces.

A reminder of the need to maintain this nation's foresight may be found in the Armed Forces Day prayer, ". . . Let not our devotion to Country narrow our vision. Let us realize that Thou hast made of one blood all nations of men. Help us in our pledge to defend the rights and privileges in which the whole human family shares. May Thy peace reign in the hearts and minds of all men. Amen."

MCNAMARA SAYS SEATO WILL AID VIETNAM STRUGGLE

Defense Secretary Robert McNamara believes that other members of the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization (SEATO) will send additional aid and personnel to the Republic of South Vietnam.

Secretary McNamara said at a recent press conference this aid would not be in the form of combat troops but advisory personnel such as medical technicians, logisticians and field advisors.

SEATO member nations are Australia, Great Britain, France, New Zealand, Pakistan, Philippines, Thailand and the United States.

United States personnel will continue to be brought back to the United States as they complete training missions with the RVN forces.

"I anticipate," McNamara said, "the majority of the training missions can be completed by the end of 1965. I continue to believe we should not leave an American in South Vietnam longer than necessary to train a Vietnamese counterpart to carry on that action."

The Secretary would not predict what the totals of personnel reduction or returns would be at the end of this year or 1965, but added that the United States is sending new personnel to the Republic of Vietnam for training mission not previously carried on.

He did indicate that much of the light aircraft training should be completed before the end of 1965. He also reemphasized the pledge that United States aid to South Vietnam would continue as long as needed.

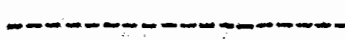

74 PERSONS KILLED IN PLANE CRASH IN PHILIPPINES
CLARK AIR BASE

AN AMERICAN MILITARY JET TRANSPORT PLANE WITH 83 PERSONS ABOARD CRASHED IN A RAIN STORM MONDAY NIGHT JUST SHORT OF THE RUNWAY HERE, KILLING 74 PERSONS. ONE OF THE DEAD WAS A PASSENGER IN A TAXI HIT BY THE STRICKEN PLANE. A UNITED STATES AIR FORCE SPOKESMAN SAID THE BIG C-135 JET OF THE MILITARY AIR TRANSPORT SERVICE STRUCK THE TAXI CAB AS IT HIT THE GROUND AND THEN BURST INTO FLAMES. THE SPOKESMAN SAID 73 PERSONS ABOARD THE PLANE WERE KILLED. 12 OF THE PLANES 83 OCCUPANTS, 73 PASSENGERS AND 10 CREW MEMBERS, SURVIVED THE CRASH, BUT TWO DIED LATER IN A HOSPITAL. THE TAXI DRIVER AND ANOTHER PASSENGER IN THE CAB ALSO WERE REPORTED CRITICALLY INJURED. IN WASHINGTON, WHITE HOUSE PRESS SECRETARY REEDY SAID PRESIDENT JOHNSON HAD REQUESTED A FULL REPORT ON THE CRASH AND HAD EXPRESSED SYMPATHY FOR THE FAMILIES OF THE VICTIMS.

PLOT TO KILL MCNAMARA IN VIET NAM SAID FOILED
SAIGON

ONE OF FIVE YOUTHS ARRESTED IN AN ALLEGED COMMUNIST PLOT TO ASSASSINATE DEFENSE SECRETARY ROBERT MCNAMARA LEAPED FROM AN UPPER FLOOR OF THE SAIGON POLICE STATION IN AN APPARENT SUICIDE ATTEMPT MONDAY. THE YOUTH, IDENTIFIED AS NGUYEN VAN THOI, 24, WAS REPORTED IN SERIOUS CONDITION. POLICE ANNOUNCED THEY HAD ARRESTED TWO MEN SATURDAY AND THREE MORE MONDAY IN THE PLOT TO BLOW UP A BRIDGE AS MCNAMARA PASSED OVER IT. THEY SAID AT LEAST THREE HAD CONFESSED. THE MASTER MIND OF THE PLOT WAS AT LARGE AND ALL SAIGON POLICE WERE MOBILIZED IN A SEARCH FOR HIM. THE PLOT WAS FOILED SHORTLY BEFORE GENERAL MAXWELL TAYLOR, CHAIRMAN OF THE JOINT CHIEFS OF STAFF, ARRIVED ON HIS SECOND VISIT IN TWO MONTHS TO ASSESS THE AREA. MCNAMARA, WHO LEFT BONN MONDAY FOR SAIGON AFTER TALKS WITH WEST GERMAN DEFENSE OFFICIALS, WOULD NOT COMMENT ON THE ASSASSINATION PLOT.

(Fourth Article) INTERNATIONAL COMMUNISM AND WORLD LABOR

Treatment of Unions and Labor in Hungary

Unlike the East Berlin outbreak, the Hungarian rebellion began as a student protest movement, involving both non-Communists and some younger members of the Hungarian Communist Party itself.

By degrees, the dissident student groups were joined by industrial workers and others. Finally, the entire nation staged a general insurrection, backed by the national labor federation.

The attempt of Hungarian labor to assert its rights during the 1956 rebellion was doomed by armed Soviet intervention. Nevertheless, the Hungarian uprising had historical significance as a mass "workers revolt" against Communist policies.

Immediately after the end of WWII, the first postwar election in Hungary gave the Communists only 17 percent of the votes. The great majority of votes went to agrarian and Socialist candidates, resulting in a liberal coalition government.

However, between 1945 and 1947, the Communists steadily undermined and infiltrated the government until, on Aug 31, 1947, the legitimate government was unseated through a carefully arranged and managed election. The attrition of labor's freedom began shortly afterward.

The first act of the Budapest Communist regime in late 1947 was to abolish the right to strike. During the next three years, the rights of labor were progressively worn away until, by 1950, there was almost total regimentation.

The work-book system, introduced in 1950-51, effectively tied Hungarian workers to their jobs and placed at the mercy of Communist plant managers. A decree issued in 1952 provided penalties of up to five years imprisonment for plant managers who hired workers without books.

Punishment imposed for infractions of the work-book law added

to the growing bitterness of Hungary's working class prior to the 1956 rebellion.

Bad working conditions and a steady increase in production demands, through the device of raising norms, contributed to the spirit of rebellion that permeated the entire nation by October, 1956.

U.S. MILITARY FORCES PLAN JOINT EXCHANGE IN EUROPE

A new single exchange system that will serve both the U.S. Army and Air Force in Europe and the Middle East will be activated July 25, 1964.

Establishment of the new Europe Exchange System (EES) was jointly announced by Gen. P.L. Freeman Jr. Commander in Chief, U.S. Army, Europe, and Gen. Gabriel P. Disowsay, Commander, U.S. Air Force in Europe.

The streamlined dollar-saving organization, to be activated on the 69th anniversary of the worldwide Exchange Service, will replace the present European Exchange System and Air Force Europe Exchange. Headquarters will be in Nurnberg, Germany.

With physical facilities large enough to absorb the organization, the new system will offer greater economy of operation without disrupting customer service.

Military staffing of the new exchange system will be provided jointly by U.S. Army and Air Force in Europe.

The joint European Exchange System will result in a unified organization with a single headquarters and single field organization and one procurement, distribution and transportation system.

Are you going to visit a grocery store in Europe? If you do, don't ask for a pound of potatoes. Everything is sold by the kilo (pronounced kēlō) which by quick rule of thumb is two pounds but by actual weight is 2.2 pounds.

What about yard goods? They don't sell cloth by the yard either. They sell it by the meter, which is 39 inches (36 inches to a yard). You might find use for the below scale of measures when shopping for "yard goods."

He won't know what you are talking about because in Europe they sell gas by the liter and gage air pressure by the kilos (kilogram per square centimeter). For ready reference use the below charts.

SOUTHAMPTON: "GATEWAY TO ENGLAND"

Southampton, where so many Atlantic travellers first set foot on English soil, has always been one of the greatest of Britain's seaports, and, from earliest times, it has played an important part in English history. To the Romans who named it Clausentum, it was an important communication link. In the early years of the sixth century came the Saxons, to be followed later by the Danes, by which time the town had assumed, in Suthamtune, a recognizable form of its present name. It was at Southampton, so legend has it, that Canute, second of the Danish kings of England, demonstrated to Pscophantic court his inability to stem the flowing tide. Next came the Normans who as was their wont, built fortifications of such solidity and strength that many of them still exist today.

During the almost ceaseless wars with France, in the Middle Ages, Southampton saw the departure of more than one expeditionary force, and waved farewell to the men who went to make history at Greyc and Agincourt. Under the Tudor sovereigns, Southampton lost much of its importance, though the period left its mark upon the town, notably in the lovely Tudor House, which is now the town's principal museum.

The reign of James I staged at Southampton an event of transcendent and incalculable importance; on August 15th, 1620, the persecuted Pilgrim Fathers embarked in the MAYFLOWER for their journey to the New World. One of the unforeseen but inevitable consequences of this venture was the subsequent growth of transatlantic traffic, which raised Southampton to its present position as one of the world's greatest ports and principal ocean passenger gateway to Britain.

The total length of quays at the Old and New Docks is 31,000 feet. There are six dry docks which can accommodate all types of ships, and the King George V Dry Dock at the western end of the New Docks is the largest in the world. The passenger reception accommodation at the Docks is amongst the most modern to be found at any port. The New Docks provide a deep-water quay

1 1/2 miles long, and its nine berth can accommodate the largest ocean-going liners. Over 20,000,000 tons of shipping and nearly three-quarters of a million passengers are dealt with at the Docks annually.

Southampton was one of the major embarkation ports during the 1914-1918 and 1939-1945 wars, and suffered heavy damage from bombing raids in 1940-41. Reconstruction has been planned with foresight and determination and a fine new shopping centre has been built. Allowance has been made for the growth of the town as a major distribution centre.

Today Southampton plays three roles: as has been already stated, one of the most important passenger ports in the world, and is concerned with commercial and industrial activities of all kinds; it is a modern residential and holiday tourist resort, with amenities and distractions of all kinds; only 79 miles from London, it is a centre from which many places of great interest and beauty, as well as some of England's most attractive countryside, are easily reached. British Railways run regular services between Southampton and Le Havre, the overnight express route to Paris, and also to St. Malo which serves more southerly areas of France.

Among Southampton's recreational facilities may be mentioned The Common, which covers 360 acres, and is composed mainly of natural grassland, but also includes a paddling pool, model yacht lake, cricket and football grounds; the Lido, one of the largest and best equipped swimming pools in the country; and the Sports Centre which contains two golf courses, nine football pitches, four cricket pitches, three hockey pitches, twelve tennis courts, bowling and putting greens, cycling and running tracks, canoe lake, paddling pool and children's park. Speedway racing, greyhound racing, concerts, theatrical entertainments, cinemas and dances are some of the entertainments provided. Southampton Water and the Solent are known to yachtsmen all over the world.

Try to get to Southampton while you are in Europe. You will find it to be a pleasant experience.

A TIME FOR REDEDICATION

"Power for Peace." Simple though these three words may sound, they convey to the entire world the intention of all Americans to pursue our way of life and to insure that all of the freedom-loving people with whom we are allied may pursue theirs.

Eleven years ago "Power for Peace" was selected as the slogan for Armed Forces Week, the time when thousands of men and women serving beneath the Stars and Stripes become hosts to millions at home and overseas. It is a week when we graphically demonstrate the friendliness of the United States and indicate the high degree of military preparedness we maintain to defend our independence.

Armed Forces Day this year falls on May 16, but the observance actually covers the period May 9-17, thus assuring that millions of people everywhere will have the opportunity to visit the five branches of our uniformed services.

The major participation in Armed Forces Day observances is by all of the services which compose our defense team—Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force, Coast Guard, their reserve arms, the National Guard and the Air National Guard. Also, many of the organizations and programs related to the defense effort take part in this annual celebration.

That the public has accepted this annual opportunity to see their defense team in operation has been shown by the annual increases in Armed Forces Day participation. In 1963, more than 20 million people attended or participated in "open house" and community programs in the United States and abroad, while millions of others learned more about their country's military power through newspapers and magazine stories, radio and television programs and motion pictures.

We of the Armed Forces can well use this time to rededicate ourselves to the mission for which we have been chosen—use our power for peace and maintain that freedom which was established by our forefathers.

ROCKET ASTRONOMER GETS NAVY RESEARCH AWARD

Doctor Herbert Friedman, credited with launching the new science of rocket astronomy and with directing the project that put the first solar observatory into orbit in 1960, has received the Captain Robert Dexter Conrad Award.

The citation said Doctor Friedman received the award because of "his dedication to furthering the Navy's mission in research which has revealed in the teaching and training of young scientists who by their discoveries, have in turn, written new chapters in man's knowledge of the universe."

Last year Doctor Friedman received a \$10,000 Superior Performance Award, the largest individual cash award given by the government.

The Captain Dexter Award is presented annually to an individual who has made outstanding contributions to Naval research and development. Captain Dexter was the primary architect of the Navy's basic research program.

A. Members of the U.S. Forces may not import/export in unaccompanied baggage the following:

1. Alcoholic beverages
2. Coffee and coffee products
3. Tea
4. Cocoa
5. Chocolate
6. Cigarettes or other tobacco products

B. The privileged conditions referred to in Par. 4a (1) apply to items indicated below. Personnel may import/export, on their person or in unaccompanied baggage, the following items in amounts up to but not exceeding the authorized quantities indicated per month for each individual authorized to purchase such items from U.S. Forces facilities:

A FEW FACTS ON GERMANY

Perhaps many people aboard are wondering about what lies ahead when they reach Germany. For many, this will be your first trip overseas, and all the fascinating mysteries of Germany may leave you wondering what excitement is waiting at the voyage's end. For this reason, a few facts on the subject may help to give a better understanding.

Germany is located in central Europe, and is bordered on the north by the Baltic and North Seas and Denmark; on the east by Poland and Czechoslovakia; on the south by Austria and Switzerland; and on the west by France, Belgium and Holland.

Southern Germany is mountainous, while northern Germany is a great plain. The Danube, Elbe, Oder, Weser, Neckar, Ems, and Eider Rivers are all to be found in the scenic mountain areas.

The climate of Germany is fairly uniform throughout. The annual temperature varies from 35° in some sections to over 50° in others. The average rainfall ranges from 25 to 70 inches per year.

Agriculture is the chief occupation of the German people, even though the soil is sandy. The chief crops are rye, wheat, oats, barley, sugar beets, and potatoes. There is also an extensive amount of livestock raised each year.

Germany is essentially an industrial nation. There is a great resource of minerals, and Germany still ranks high in the production of chemicals.

Among specific products for which Germany is noted are her toys and fine lenses, known throughout the world as among the best.

Transportation in Germany is no problem for the person caught without a car. The railroads offer quite satisfactory transportation, the railways are only exceeded in

total length by Canada and the United States. In 1937, Germany had 217,000 miles of good highways, and today they are more than double that.

The German people are often noted for their blond hair and tall stature, even though they are very similar to the average Americans visiting them. Seasoned travelers usually find the German people friendly, and easy to get along with.

THEY ANSWERED THE CALL . . .

On May 20, 1927, Charles Augustus Lindbergh made the first solo flight across the Atlantic Ocean. He made it in the "Spirit of St. Louis," a plane financed by the citizens of the Missouri city. The perilous trip took 33½ hours from New York to Paris and was logged at 3,600 miles. Lindbergh's heroic effort blazed a trail followed by military and commercial flights and focused American military efforts on air power. The famous flight gave new meaning to the airplane. Spurred by Lindbergh's success, American air force pilots, probing the mysteries of flight, then began making rapid advancement in the field of aviation.
