1. In accordance with reference (a), the war diary for the month of October 1945 is submitted herewith:

OPERATIONAL CONTROL - Commander Service Force, Pacific Fleet.

- Anchored at Iwo Jima, Volcano Islands. 10/1/45 Pursuant to confidential sailing orders from Port Director, Iwo Jima, got underway for Yokosuka Naval Base, Honshu, Japan.
- Steaming in convoy with USS AURIGA (AK98)(OTC), USS ALKAID (AK114) and U.S.A.T. ETOLIN enroute from Iwo Jima to Yokosuka. 10/3/45 Retarded all clocks one hour to conform with minus 9 zone time. 10/4/45 Arrived Yokosuka Harbor and anchored.
- Anchored in Yokosuka Harbor.
- Shifted to dock to discharge 90th Construction Battalion, U. S. Navy and receive passengers for passage to continental United States. 10/18/45 Shifted to anchorage in Yokosuka Harbor.
- Anchored in Yokosuka Harbor, Honshu, Japan. 10/24/45
 Pursuant to sailing instructions from Port Director, Yokosuka, got underway for San Francisco, California, set Great Circle course. 10/24/45 Sighted Japanese floating mine Type Mark 93 abeam to port about 60 yards. Unable to sink by gunfire due to proximity of other ships. Reported to USS UHLMANN (DD687) who disposed of mine. A second mine was sighted at 600 yards on the port beam at dusk and its position was reported to NDT Tokyo, Japan (RAD).
- (6) 25 ctober 1945 31 October 1945
 Steaming singly on Great Circle track enroute from Yokosuka, Honshu, Japan to San Francisco, California. 10/25/45
 Advanced all clocks one hour to conform with minus 10 zone

2. During the month of October, two drifting mines were sighted. Bad weather and a frequently overcast sky made navigation via the Great Circle Route difficult.

BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF THE SHIP

U.S.S. PRINCE GEORGES is a cargo-transport of "Liberty Ship" class (hull design EC2-S-C1).

Originally "AP 165" hull number changed August 1944 to "AK 224", in accordance with restricted letter OP-23-3-JK serial 231423, from the Navy Department, Office: Chief of Naval Operations dated 25 July 1944, endorsed by Secretary of the Navy.

Originally scheduled to carry 1133 enlisted men and 60 officers. To date has carried about 21,000 passengers.

205,000 cubic feet of available cargo space carries average load of 4,500 measured tons of dry cargo. To date has carried about 94.500 tons of cargo of all kinds.

Average speed of advance - ten (10) knots.

Hold #1 Upper and Lower - for enlisted passengers.

Hold #2 Upper only - enlisted personnel.

Hold #3 Upper only - galley and mess hall for enlisted passengers. Seats about one hundred (100) men.

Hold #4 Upper only - for sixty (60) officers.

No other special features.

Commissioned 10 November 1943 at San Francisco, California.

First Commanding Officer - W. J. Lane, Lieut. Comdr., USNR. Relieved July 1, 1944 by L. O. Hess, Lieut. Comdr., USNR to the present time.

Participated in one initial invasion, Saipan, 20 June to 25 June. July 1 and 2, flagship of ComTransDiv 34, Task Group 51.19. Carried R.C.T. 106 (INE). No damage. No casualties. Rates one bronze star for this operation on Asiatic-Pacific ribbon.

Has travelled approximately 75,000 miles to date, south as far as Auckland, north to Yokosuka, west to Palaus, east to San Francisco.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE USS PRINCE GEORGES

The U.S.S. PRINCL GEORGES is a cargo-transport of the "Liberty Ship" class (hull design EC2-S-Cl). She was originally classified as "AP-165" with a troop carrying capacity of 1133 enlisted personnel and 60 officers. In August 1944 her hull number was changed to "AR-224" but no troop spaces were altered and she continued in the same line of duty as before. The troop spaces are allocated to three holds. Upper and lower number one hold and upper number two provide five tiered bunks for enlisted personnel and upper number four provides space for troop officers. Upper number three hold is in use as a troop galley and mess hall with a seating capacity of about one hundred men.

The ship's 205,000 cubic feet of cargo space provides stowage for nearly 4500 measured tons of dry cargo and the PRINCE GEORGES has carried everything from ammunition to beer. Since being commissioned on November 10th of 1943, the ship has carried approximately 21,000 passengers from all branches of the service — the Army, Navy, Marines, Coast Guard, Seabees and even members of the Royal New Zealand Air Force. Traveling at an average speed of ten knots, the PRINCE GEORGES has covered roughly 75,000 miles during her better than two years in commission, a record reportedly unequaled by any ship of the same type in her squadron. 94,500 tons of cargo have been carried in her holds to all the limits of the Pacific, from Auckland to Tokyo Bay, from San Francisco, to Feleliu.

Formerly the S.S. RICH/RD MARCH HOE, the ship was in use by the Army Transport Service making runs to the Alcutian Islands with Army personnel. On the shortest possible notice, she was boarded by her first all-navy crew and though ill-equipped, a few days later she sailed from Port Hueneme - a commissioned vessel of the United States Navy. At that time the commanding officer was Lieutenant Commander W. J. Lane of San Francisco.

The story of the PRINCE GEORGES is not one of successive invasions but rather one of plodding tirelessly in the wake of the assaults. Her first operation took her to the shores of bloody Tarawa, shores still strewn with the litter of the dead, still enveloped with the sweet-sick smell of death. This was Christmas and New Year's day of 1944 for the men of the "I.G.". The ship then returned to Pearl Harbor, the port from which the majority of her subsequent operations started.

In February of 1944, the PRINCE GEORGES was again wending her way through the still mysterious and ominous Marshall Islands to disgorge men and material on the atolls of Kwajelein, Makin Island and Apamama. Down her debarkation nets went the men who must now hold what had been taken and initiate the thrusts which "seftened up" the enemy for the onward movement, men of the 820th and 396th Bombardment Squadrons. The cocky little landing craft returned to the ship laden with the battle-weary combat troops, the 2nd Battalion, 6th Marines, of the well-known 2nd Division, who were to be returned to the Hawaiian Islands.

In April, for a third time, the "AP 165" returned to the Gil-

berts and Marshalls to help form a back-log for a now swiftly moving schedule of invasions. She added to her list of island hops Majuro and Eniwetok, where they still were nervously alert for possible airraids. The Easter morning sun rose over the barren atoll of Eniwetok -- an atoll stripped by a Lurricane of gunfire.

Upon returning to Pearl Harbor this time with Marine and Navy casuals, the men of the PRINCL GEONGES learned that they were to become the flagship for "ConTransDiv 34" and a part of the famed task force 51. The ship engaged in maneuvers for several weeks at the island of Maui and this completed, she left with her group to participate in her only invasion - Saipan.

Steaming through Ewajelein, with the men of the 106th R.C.T. lining her decks, the PRINCE GEORGES transferred part of her urgently needed combat troops to the decks of a rolling destroyer while still three days from her destination.

When the anchor was next dropped, it was at the southern end of Saipan Island, within firing range of both Saipan and Tinian. She began immediately to disembark the much needed troops and unload the valuable cargo. At the same time casualties were being received aboard to be treated. As in a half dozen other instances in the ship's career, luck was with her. Enemy shells fell in the vicinity, enemy planes ranged nearby on three different occasions, twice bombs nearly struck home, often at night ship was made a perfect target, brilliantly illuminated by enemy flares. When a warning was flashed, other speedier ships could quickly disperse but the PRINCE GEORGES was called "nuch too slow" and had to merely "sweat it out". From June 20th to 25th and July 1st and 2nd she lay in this predicament but remained unscathed with no damages and no casualties. For this operation the ship rates one bronze star on the Asiatic-Pacificaribbon.

Returning to their "home" port of Pearl Harbor via the now familiar Eniwetok, the ship was given a brief availability. It was at this time than an order from the Chief of Naval Operations changed the hull number of the PRINCE GEORGES from "AP 165" to "AK224". Lieutenant Commander L. O. Hess assumed command during this period., the position which he has held ever since.

With her new coat of paint and 1200 troops, the "Ak224" left in early September to back up the invasion of the Palaus. After a stopover in Lniwetok, she proceeded to the only available anchorage at kossol koads and thence to the southernmost island of the group, Angaur. As anchorage facilities were not available there, it was necessary to keep constantly under way during the unloading and disembarking of the mixed units of army Engineer and keyy groups - the garrison forces the ship carried there. Recently secured, there was no longer any organized resistance on the island at both Angaur and nearby Peleliu, Japs were still being routed out in small skirmishes. Time and again the crew of the PRINCE GLORGLS watched bomber groups take off from the islands and head west for strikes against the not yet impenetrated Philippines. The unloading completed, the ship again proceeded to the anchorage at the northern-

most end of the islands - Kossol, just off the Jap-held island of Babelthuap, an island with a population still running into the thousands but brazenly enough, ships of the navy used this former Jap harbor. Frequent bombings of Babelthuap by our planes from Angaur and Peleliu kept them subdued. Enemy submarines were frequently reported at the entrances to the harbor.

For a second time; the ship left lossed and returned to Angaur to take on men and equipment of the famed 81st Infantry "Wildcat" Division. The loading was interrupted for several days by a violent typhoon which the ship rode out without damage. It was necessary at the termination of the storm to leave all but two of the damaged landing craft on the island, however.

By now jokingly calling herself a "coast wise" vessel, the PRINCE GLORGES proceeded again to hossel Roads and then to Anguar and Peleliu to complete loading. By now it was early becember.

Under orders to deliver the men of the Slat to a jungle training center at Noumea, New Caledonia, the ship steamed past Yap and Truk and headed south. Formal initiation of the ship's "pollywogs" was held at the crossing of the equator. The first stop was at the beautiful kussell Islands in the Solomons Group. She arrived at her destination of Noumea in the latter part of December.

Disembarking her troops the PRINCE GEORGES began to immediately take on men of the Royal New Zealand Air Force and was to be routed to Auckland. A second Christmas away from home for many of the ship's crew was spent in Noumea. The ship was under-way New Year's Eve but arrived New Year's Day in Auckland, having been escorted all the way by ships of the Royal New Zealand Navy. Here a glorious five days of liberty were spent and then underway again, once more headed for New Caledonia with the 39th General Hospital, U.S. Army aboard. At Noumea, remnants of the 87th C.B. Unit were loaded and the ship headed for Tulagi. In a downpour of rain, explosives were loaded into her holds and she was on her way again. This time to Eniwetok with the French ship CAP DES PALMES as escort. Just prior to arrival there, the CAP DES PALMES was relieved by American escort vessels. The ship was unloading at Seipan in the latter part of Larch.

At Saipan the "224" was made OTC of a large convoy, not an unknown occurrence, and was routed to Eniwetok where it was disbanded.
The ship proceeded independently to Tearl Harbor and took a load of
naval casuals. She then moved to Ronolulu Harbor and took a load of
Army replacements and headed once again for Saipan via Eniwetok.
This accomplished, she re-loaded with Army garrison forces and left
for the recently secured Iwo Jima, arriving there at the end of March.
Here the garrison forces were traded for the men of the 1st Battalion,
12th Marines of the famed 3rd Division. Upon leaving Iwo Jima, enemy
aircraft were sighted and reported approaching the island but none
came near the convoy. The following day one of the PC escorts reported a definite underwater contact and began to drop a pattern of
depth charges. A resultant underwater explosion, possible a summarine, knocked out of the PC's sound gear and did some slight dam-

age to the fire room of the PRINCE GEORGES. The contact was not able to be picked up after that.

The U.S. Merines were returned to Guam. The ship was immediately ordered to Espiritu Santo, New Hebrides for enward routing to Nounea. Dipping down under the equator for a second time, the 109th Station Hospital was picked up at Neumea and the ship proceeded again to Tulagi. Here two C. B. Maintenance Units were added to the passenger list, some of the last remaining units in the South Pacific areas. After shifting for a short stay at Guadalcanal, she was routed to Eniwetok. On the way there another definite contact was reported by the excerts which was lost. From that point through the Gilberts and Marshalls air coverage was provided. From Eniwetok the ship was routed to Saipan, Marianas.

The "P.G." also dubbed the "Workhorse" "The Traveller" and the "Gorgeous Georges" by her crew, then worked down the length of the Marianas, through Tinian and then Guan, discharging her cargo and personnel as she went.

Returning to Pearl at the end of June, great news was in store for the ship's crew. After 20 months of overseas duty she was to return to the United States for voyage repairs. Steaming under the Golden Gate Bridge was a genuine and unforgettable thrill for many. Ten days availability was to be given the ship which unfortunately did not permit leaves for the crew; this was July 1945. Early August found the PAINCE GLORGES steaming into Pearl Harbor once again with a load of naval casuals who were being returned from the states for reassignment.

The next port of call was Kahului Harbor at the island of Laui, T. H. Here the entire 43rd Construction Battalion and gear were loaded aboard. The ship then proceeded to Honolulu Harbor, arriving just in time for the greatest news of all -- the end of hostilities. The ship joined many others in the harbor and added to the din by blowing the equivalent of the morse "V" on her whistle, sounding her general clarm and hoisting on her signal most the long-awaited flags "Victor Jig" - Victory over Japan. It was August 14th, 1945.

The next morning she left once more on the long haul to Saipan via Eniwetok. Here the 43rd was disembarked and the AK224 proceeded with a comparatively empty bottom to Iwo Jima where the entire 90th Construction Battalian was taken aboard. Considerable difficulty was encountered during the loading operations here as this was the typhoon season. Operations were frequently suspended due to the heavy surf which did not permit small craft to operate. Once it was even necessary to form a convoy and put to sea to esecape the might of the storm.

October 1st the island of Iwo Jina was again left behind and like a weary travellor reaching the end of her journey, the PRINCE GEORGES steamed toward the home islands of Japan. Her destination was to be the Yokosuka Naval Base within Tokyo Bay on the island of

Honshu. A few days later found her picking her way precariously through the minefields at the entrance to Tokyo Bay with visibility nil. Her assigned berth was within a former drydock, one that had once turned out proud ships and treacherous submarines. Hen from the ship's crew assisted in putting the huge Japanese cranes into operation and unloading began.

At this point heartening news was again received. The "Gorgeous Georges" was to report to the "Magic Carpet" for duty - the
"Lagic Carpet" which was doing its utmost to return men eligible
for discharge to the United States. A load of a thousand of these
men were taken aboard, some even before the unloading of the 90th
battalion was completed.

As October was drawing to a close, the PAINCE GEORGES headed her bow into the cold grayness of the North Pacific and started the long voyage home. Her first evening off the coast of honshu was nearly her last as she just skirted one ugly green-clad mine and narrowly averted striking another. These mines were seen - who knows the luck that was really hers in the blackness of the night?

Buffeted by winds and plagued by storms, she patiently and slowly made her way along the Great Circle track, and for men used to tropic climes, temperatures in the thirties felt a bit cold. The original destination was to be San Francisco, but when just at the top of the "Hump" her orders were changed and she directed her, self towards Seattle, Washington. The anniversary of her two years as a commissioned vessel of the . S. Navy was celebrated as she wearily steamed into the straits of Juan de Fuca, November 10, 1945. A large percentage of her original crew remained board to witness this "triumphal entry". At present she lays in a shipperd at averett, Washington, once more undergoing voyage repairs, once more unable to grant leaves to her crew. She is to run again to finish the story ----- plodding tirelessly.
