
What's the latest? How many points have I got? When are we going back to the states? Ship's office is flooded with questions and with surplus work. Weekly thru this column we hope to answer some of your questions, to give you a little dope you are entitled to know. The biggest problem is points and how they effect you. The big news is that the points have been officially dropped effective 1 November. For enlisted men the critical score will. be lowered to 41, 1 Nov.; 39, 1 Dec.; and 38, 1 Jan. SKD's are the only frozen rate on the ship but Storekeepers, Yeomen, and mailmen have a critical score of 44, which will not be lowered until after the first of the year. Another important change is that retention for Military necessity has been lowered from 120 to 90 days. Provisions for retention of officers deemed "Essential" in excess of 90 days remain in effect except that requests for retention must be instituted not more than 15 days after any officer attains his critical score. So far that has not effected any one on board but, with big drops in points it is possible. One of the biggest question is how to determine points for sea duty. Sea duty started aboard here the day you reported aboard after 30 May. For duty on any other ship it is the day you reported for duty. For duty outside the U.S. it is the day you leave the states and the day you return. It is easier for you to figure them up and time does not permit ship's office to go through every man's record, so please cooperate. Months for duty and sea duty must be full months.

For those men desiring further information on any points of interest concerning demobilization, "shipping over", and discharge, a question box has been provided in ship's office. Please drop any questions you may have therein; and the "Nameless News" will attempt to answer them.

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

HIGHLIGHTS OF PURDUE-ONIO STATE GAME In one of the season's biggest upsets, Saturday, before 74,000 screaming fans at Columbus, Ohio, Purdue trounced the Buckeyes in a game that had everything. Canfield, Cody, and DeMoss outran, outpassed and outmaneuvered the Ohio eleven at every turn. With the aid of fine blocking, the first half was all Purdue. Cody came out of a T formation and crossed the line for the first score, and 6 more points were quickly obtained when DeMoss passed to Canfield.

Cody again smashed into the end zone shortly after, but due to an off side penalty, the play was called back. The boilermakers were not depressed however, and DeMoss passed a long one to Canfield, and again a touchdown was scored! After the conversion the score stood at 20-0.

The Buckeyes put in Kessler, and opened with a passing attack. This was hipped in the bud, and, when Cody blocked a punt in the end zone, Purdue added 2 points. The half ended with the score standing 22-0.

The second half started when Ohio kicked off. Ohio State recovered a fumble, and started a march down the gridiron. This show of power was short lived however, and another DeMoss pass sent Purdue on the way. Cody went over for the touchdown and the conversion was muffed. The scere now stood at 28-0.

Ohio again started a march down the field and made 3 straight first downs. Kessler was again sent in for an aerial attack, which did not materialize. Winters recovered a Purdue fumble for Ohio. The Buckeyes first score was made as Kessler received a pass and went over. The kick was blocked.

Purdue, not to be outdone, started on another march, and ended only when Cody drove through the Ohio line for another score. The conversion was made, and Ohio was being trounced 35-6.

After making their 9th first down on a long pass, Ohio again scored and converted. The ball game ended with Ohio State on the short end of a 35-13 score.

BREFING THE NEWS

JAPAN...

It was announced yesterday by General Mac Arthur's Headquarters in Tokyo that all Japanese military forces will have been evacuated from Korea by 1 November. They are to be returned to the Jampanese home islands...Tokyo-American news broadcasts state that Japan has requested permission to import 4,000,000 tons of food in 1946, to relieve the critical shortage:...Trials for Jap war criminals will begin within 60 days....those found guilty of atrocities will be dealt with severely.......

Hopes for a peaceful settlement of the disputes between Chang-Kai-Shek's Nationalist Government and the Communists in China appeared rosy as it was announced yesterday that the Communist Army was being withdrawn from 6 Eastern Chinese provinces.... Chang has already offered the Communists representations in his Government if they will dessolve their autonomous military set-up and bring themselves under his military rule. Pressure is being brought to bear by both the U.S. and Russia, who has shown her self willing to cooperate in the job of unifying a greater China. GERMANY . . .

I.G. FARBENINDUSTRIE, the largest chemical comporation in the world is to be completely destroyed. Allied Military Council has decieded after extensive investigations that this Corp., with its cartel characteristics, was one of the prime factors in Germany's war machine. This is but a continuation of the policy already decieded upon by the Big 3" for rendering Germany totally incapable of ever again waging war....Members of German U boat, killed helpless survivors of a British freighter, were convicted of wanton murder by the War Trials Commissionary in Germany 3 received the death penalty and several others lips imprisonment.....General Eisenhower's Headquarters announced that Germans, serving prison terms for war crimes would be required to complete their sentences even should the U.S. withdraw its occupation forces before their sentences had been completed. ENGLAND ...

British statesmen last week proposed to the Arab nations of the middle East that Palestine be made a national home for the Jews. This proposal was rejected almost immediately by the several countries composing the Levant, including Syria, Iraq, Saudi-Arabia and Egypt amoung others. This problem is one
