Officers and Crew assembled forward for Commissioning Ceremony, Commander L.F. TEUSCHER USN, representative of the Commandant Fourteenth Naval Dsitrict, read his orders (Port Director, U.S. Maval Base, Pearl Harbor, T.H., serial 8270) directing him to place the Ship in Commission in the U.S. Naval Service.

The U.S.S. HEWELL was acquired for use in accordance with CinC, PacFlt dispatch 250306Z

of March 1948, being formerly the U.S. Army vessel FS 391.

The National Ensign, Union Jack and Commission Pennant were hoisted, and the Ship was placed in Commission, and delivered to the Commanding Officer, LTJG John W. HINKELMAN, Jr.,

The Commanding Officer, LTJG John W. HINKELMAN, Jr., USN read his orders (BuPers dispatch 191949Z of May 1948) directing him to assume command and accept the ship.

The Commanding Officer, LTJG John W. HINKELMAN, Jr., USN ordered the Executive Officer to set the Match, start the Ship's Time and start the Ship's Log.

Chief Boatswain E.A. MESERVE, USN assumed the duties as Officer of the Deck. The following Officers reported aboard for duty:



Receiving the following services from the dock: Electrical power, Fresh and Salt water, and Telephone service.



As shown by the following the Hewell was used to transport natives and copra from Island to Island with the home base being Apra Harbor Guam.

The Copra was crushed coconut and was hauled from the smaller islands to the larger islands mostly Koror to be crushed and bagged and sent to Europe to be used in the making of facial Crèmes and lotions.

Sometimes as many as 60 or 70 natives would board to be transported to different islands.

While between ships or waiting for ship to come in to Guam personnel stayed in Quonset Huts. These were open on both ends with emergency flaps available for the stormy season. Each bunk was equipped with its own netting to keep insects out.


The showers and latrines were in another hut with very little privacy.

Emory Matthews LtJg Executive Officer, D Gordon Carlos Operations Officer, George Scully ChBosn, Glen Ulster ChMach
Scully served as Exec Off 6-150- thru 10-01-50 on which date Emory Matthews Assumed those duties.

Hewell was in Drydock at Pearl Harbor to start the year 1950. She headed back To the Islands (Marianas, Marshalls) to resume ferrying natives and copra from Island to island. Arriving at Kwajalein on Jan 21st.

Hewell left the Islands in July and moved to the Far East arriving in Yokosuka Japan on July 17th making several trips between Japan and Guam thru Dec of 1950. The first trip to Yokosuka was with the intent of transporting cargo in the Area of Japan, but was directed to return to Guam to be fitted for transporting Ammo.

Hewell was at Wonson/Chinhae ferrying South Korean troops out of harms way As the North Koreans had backed them up to the coast.

During this same period Hewell crew fished an American pilot out of the ocean as his plane crashed due to mechanical problems. Unharmed but wet.


Hewell replenished the destroyer DD729 USS Mansfield with 672 rounds of 5" AAC at Inchon Korea.








onape Island – Ponape is a mountainous island of volcanic origin located in the East Caroline slands. It is 337 nautical miles southwest of Eniwetok Atoll and is roughly 12 miles by 14 miles is size with mountains rising to 2,300 feet. Receiving over 400 inches of rain per year streams, and waterfalls are abundant throughout the island. Ponape is surrounded by a coral reef that contains 25 inlets and serves to protect the island, allowing for mangrove on the shore line. Occupied and fortified by the Japanese with numerous coastal and anti-aircraft weapons of all types, its defenses proved to be a formidable challenge attacking forces. Also located on the island were Japanese airstrips at Nan Pohn Mal and alikir and a seaplane base at one of the barrier islands with a ramp facing the calm water side the reef. It remained occupied by the Japanese until it was surrendered on September 11,


Ponape Island: Natives and copra Being transported from Ponape To Majora. Spring/Summer 1951








USS Hewell AKL14

Jan 51 Hewell was working out of Guam again transporting Copra and passengers from Island to Island. Crewman who boarded in the years 1949 and 1950 were mostly still aboard even though a regular tour on board was listed as 18 months.

A list of Ports visited by dates follows

On May 11th Lt. Dale Holland assumed command from Stanley Jarwarski.

On May 6th Mel Risenhoover and Dennis Smith boarded at Guam. They came right Out of Boot Camp at San Diego. Mel went on to be Storekeeper 2nd, and Dennis went On to be Yeoman 2nd.

On Saturday June 23rd 1951 Hewell steaming from Rongelap to Kwajalein entering South Pass Kwajalein at 0600 to rendezvous with NOB picket boat to pick up Mel Risenhoover for emergency leave commencing on arrival in United States as his Brother, who was in the Air Force had died.

On July 2nd Wm B Gray assumed duties as ChBosn

Between trips to the islands when a longer stay was made at Guam the Hewell routinely Did training exercises such as mine practice and anti aircraft practice.

Aug 20th LtJg Donald E Moors assumed duties of Exec Officer relieving LtJg Matthews Had two August 23rds as Hewell crossed International Date Line.

Lt Moors had been Exec Off of the USS Camano AKL1 which was put out of commission At Guam in July.

Willard Adams was on the Camano with Lt Moors.

On August 20th Hewell set sail from Guam to Pearl Harbor to enter dry dock for repairs. August arrived Pearl Harbor and entered Dry Dock.

Oct 9th 1951 Willard Adams boarded the Hewell for duty from TAD Submarine Base at Pearl Harbor having arrived from Guam in August having served on the USS Camano AKL1 for a short time prior to being put out of commission at Guam in July.

Hewell was in dry dock from August 25th until Nov 19th when she set sail for Sasebo Japan Via Guam.

Arrived Guam 24th having lost a day due to crossing the International Date Line.

Departed Guam on Nov 30th arriving in Sasebo Japan on Dec 4th.

On Dec 25th of 1951 Hewell arrived in Ulsan Korea with load of 2000 lb bombs making it The first of 59 trips the Hewell would make from ports in Japan to ports in Korea from Dec 25th51 thru May 7th 1954.

December 26th thru Dec 31st Hewell at sea en route to Japan.

Hewell was in Sasebo Japan on Jan 1st,2nd arriving in Chinhae Korea on the 3rd for her Second trip to Korea.

During the year 1952 Hewell made four trips to Chinhae, Korea, five trips to Ulsan, Korea Fourteen trips to Pohang, Korea one trip to Suyong, Korea one trip to Inchon Korea one Trip to Pusan, Korea: A total of 26 trips, with the time between trips loading in Japan and Going thru degaussing trips to Korea and unloading, time at sea between trips the crew was Busy most all of the time.

There was an incident where a crewman had become frustrated and was angry with a ship Mate and had picked him up to throw him over the side when Lt. Moors, Exec Off, had to Pull his 45 and was at the point of actually getting ready to shoot before he released the ship Mate.

On Feb 2nd Willard Ison boarded and assumed the duties of Boatwain.

On March 5th Rueben Lorenson LtJg assumed duties as Exec Off as LtJg Moors was transferred To USS Whiteside, AKA

On March 23rd Queenie B Preston assumed duties as Captain from LT. Dale Holland who was Promoted to LtCmdr and transferred to Naval Observatory.

May 26th RADm B.B. Biggs made unannounced 20 minute visit to Hewell. ComServRon 3. On Dec 11th D.H. Miller assumed duties as EngMach from David Bly.

Dec 14th steaming en route to Yokosuka Japan to load ammo and return to Sasebo.

Dec 18th loading black powder at Yokosuka

Dec 18th thru 22nd en route to Sasebo from Yokosuk via inland sea. Left Yokosuka Seas as smooth as glass on turning to go up to Sasebo hit a wall of water that was unbelievable All the way to Sasebo. Captain stated that if we had not had both cargo holds full of heavy powder We probably would not have made it. Ship did 40-45 degree rolls. Everyone sick but Tom McGuire, We had buckets hanging on the gyroscope for upchucking.

On arriving at the Ordinance Dock moored along side USS Missouri BB63 and off loaded the Black powder to her. One of the hardest few hours of work I remember during my term in the Navy. Thankful for Leo Jenkins along side as he took a lot of my load.

A few nights later we were pretty far north in Korea under dark of night and all night watch Standings we could see and hear the bombs and shelling, see the skies light up from the shelling And it was the Missouri and CV10 sitting 10-12 miles at sea. The North Korean planes were very Close but we were so small we were insignificant to them.

Dec 25th Christmas Day Yeoman Dennis Smith transferred off the Hewell having been aboard since

Jan 1st of 53 Hewell was at Ordinance Dock Chinhae Korea off loaded munitions and The crew went ashore and engaged in a little snow ball fight. Rudy Garcia had never seen snow before, we pelted him good.

In 1953 Hewell made four trips to Chinhae, four trips to Ulsan, ten trips to Pohang, one trip To Kunsan, one trip to Inchon, four trips to Pusan. For a total of twenty four trips.

ON April 1st 53 James McChesney relieved W.A. Ison as Boatswain and remained aboard

Until decommissioned Mar 15th of 55.

The Hewell entered the shipyard at Yokosuka Japan on April 10th and remained until June 9th. After which she resumed her supply runs carrying beans and bullets to both the ground Troops and ships on an unglamorous but still vital mission.

July 2nd several ships underway from Sasebo to Korea but skipper declined to go due to the Radar being on the blitz. An Admiral from Comservpac arrived on his barge and told the Skipper to get underway immeadeatly (which he did) inquiring of the skipper how did he think they sailed before they had radar.

On July 31st 53 Hewell docked at Wonson in North Korea and picked up 200 South Korean Marines to be transported back to Chinhae in South Korea. Arriving August 2nd.


The troops were put in the two cargo holds and covered being advised thru their interpreter there was to be no fire, cigarette lighters, matches and so on in the holds. When they arrived in Chinhae and uncovered the holds there were candles sticking all over the bulk head. Captain Preston was very upset to say the least.

On Sept 30th of 53 Ens R.H. Carpenter assumed duties as Exec Off, and on 7-12-54 was promoted to LtJg and was the last to serve as Exec Off of the Hewell transferring off at decommissioning on March 15th 1955.

On Dec 1st 53 Robert J Zeer assumed duties as Eng/Mach and was the last to serve in that position being one of the last three off at decommissioning March 15th 1955.

1954

Hewell was in Sasebo Japan 1st thru 4th of January. During 1954 Hewell made one trip To Chinhae, one trip to Wonson (North Korea) four trips to Inchon, and two trips to Pusan, for a total of six trips, last trip being May 7th 1954.

In January of 54 Lt. Remig F. F> Gerzewski assumed duties and was the last skipper of The Hewell being the last man off at decommissioning March 15th 1955. From May 7th 54 thru June 16th Hewell made trips from Sasebo to Yokosuka and back.

From May 7th 54 thru June 16th Hewell made trips from Sasebo to Yokosuka and back. On June 23rd 54 Hewell departed Yokosuka in route to Pearl Harbor via Guam. Arrived Guam on 23rd staying thru 24th and was redirected and dispatched to Wotje Atoll Island Spending July 1st and 2nd at Kwajalein moving on to Wotje Atoll Marshall Islands. Arrived Wotje on 3rd staying thru the 9th.

Purpose of the new orders was to accommodate the crew of a seaplane that had landed Due to mechanical troubles. Hewell remained until the 9th to provide housing and food For the crew.

Yeoman Waylon Smithey relates that while they were at Wotje the natives came out in Their out riggers and invited everyone aboard to come ashore for an eat out, stating it Was one of the strangest shore leaves he had ever been on.

When Hewell departed Wotje for Pearl Harbor the crew was advised that the Hewell Had been chosen by Warner Brothers to be used in the movie Mr Roberts.

Hewell left Wotje on 10th arriving at Pearl Harbor on the 18th and remaining until Aug 23rd when she departed for Midway Island to begin filming the movie Mr. Roberts with Henry Fonda, Ward Bond, Patrick Wayne, Betsy Palmer,

Arrived Midway Island/Sand Island on 28th Aug remaining until Sept 24th when she left For Kaneohe Bay, Kewalo Basin, Honolulu Pearl Harbor arriving Sept 30th to film some more.

On Wed Sept 1st 1954 at Midway Island 1330 hrs underway to commence filming the Movie Mr. Roberts. Filming thru the 4th on the 5th remained moored at dock resumed Filming thru Thursday 23rd.

On Friday 24th of Sept underway from Midway to Kaneohe Bay Hawaii arriving on Wed Sept 29th.

On Friday Oct 1st at Kaneohe Bay resumed filming Sat thru Sunday moored at the USMC Air Station.

On Sunday Oct 3rd while docked at USMC Air Station Kaneohe Bay at 0355 Auker Chester L. ENC fell forward from bit on fantail into water, Larsen Richard B EMFM and Gallegos Eugene H. witnessed the fall, Gallegos jumping in after Auker.

George L Pierce jumped into water to aid Gallegos, at 0;410 called Travis Mosley HMC 0415 called LtJg R.H. Carpenter (Exec) 0420 pulled out of water by J.B. Garrett James P Bergeron and Larsen called for ambulance. 0421 Artificial respiration on Auker started by Mosley. 0426 Ambulance arrived 0430 Medical Officer arrived 0445 called OOD USMC air Station 0450 Marine Corps Guards arrived 0517 Auker pronounced dead by medical officer. 0525 remains removed to USMC Air station Dispensary Kaneohe Bay T.H.

Auker was a huge man and a loner never eating with the crew but forging around in galley after all

The others had gone.

Note: Gene Gallegos who entered the water first was just visiting old ship mates on the Hewell as he had transferred off earlier..

October 15th she set sail for Tongue Point Astoria Oregon Arriving on Oct 25th 1954.
