- 1. On the morning of Sunday, November 15, 1942, at 0315, GMT, the U.S.S. ALMAACK, while a member of Convoy MEFI(y), proceeding on course 315° True, speed 13 knots, occupying convoy position 11, was torpedoed.
- 2. The torpedo hit the port side of the engine room, approximately at frame #110, definite location unknown, causing material damages listed in Enclosure (A).
- 3. Personnel casualties as follows were occassioned by this hit:

All casualties occurred to men of the engine and fireroom watches.

- 4. Just prior to topedoing, escort vessels on port been had opened fire with machine gun bullets. With the firing of the machine gun bullets, the convoy Commodore had ordered "Emergency Ships Right 450" to course 3150 True. The turn had been completed and ship steaded on new course approximately two (2) minutes when ALMAACK was hit.
- 5. No observation of either submarine or torpedo was made by any person on this vessel. This vessel was in Condition of Readiness III, Watch I, with one half (1) of the guns of the ship manned. Sea was calm, wind force 4, from SE, 60% overcast, no moon. Althought the night was dark, ships of the adjacent column were at all times visible. No individual evasive action was taken by the ALMAACK.

As a result of a preliminary investigation undertaken by divers, and without docking the ship, the following report of damages is submitted.

Entire port side of engine room is gone.
A hole, approximately 5'x6' is in port side of
Hold #5. The bulkhead between engine room and Hold #5 is also crumpled and longitudinal frames have been pulled from position, making additional leaks from the

The leak to the shaft alley has not been located and extent is unknown, but believed to be minor. (c)

(a) The main generators, switchboards, and main circulating pumps, all located on port side, are apparently demolished.

(e) The evaporator is undoubtedly repairable.

Both boilers were steaming and were immediately flooded while under full pressure. Fort boiler is undoubtedly actually damaged by explosion. Starboard

boiler may only require retubing and rebricking. As all of the auxiliary machinery of this ship is (g) electrically driven and a great majority on the lower engine room platform, which is at present under about ten feet of water, this machinery will require extensive rewinding or rebaking to recommission.

In the opinion of the Commanding Officer, as a result of the present preliminary investigation and because of the ship's location in Gibralter where full repairs cannot be undertaken, it will be necessary to drydock the ship, undertake hull repairs requiring no less than 30 days, and tow to a United States port where repairs can be undertaken with some degree of expediency.

The Commanding Officer is of the opinion, in view of the above, that the ship will be out of commission for no less than six (6) months.

Because of the extensive time that the ship will be out of service due to extensive damages, the Commanding Officer is recommend-ing that the majority of the crew and officers be transferred and a minimum crew consistent with the towing to the United States be retained on board.

- 6. Almost simultaneously with the torpedoing of the ALMAGE, the N.V. ETTRICE, Convoy position 21, and H.H.S. AVENGER, Convoy position 22, were also torpedoed, the ETTRICE sinking the following morning at 0836. H.M.S. AVENGER detonated with the torpedo hit and sank almost immediately.
- 7. Routine steps, looking to the safety of the ship, were taken. General Quarters was sounded. Investigation showed the engine and fire rooms and Hold # 5 to be flooded and the shaft alley was flooding beyond our control. The flooding was localized to these compartments due to the strength of the bulkheads separating the fireroom from Hold # 4 and the bulkhead separating Holds # 5 and # 6.
- S. With the coming of daybreak, H.M. Escort Vessel GLAISDALE (144) was observed to be standing by the ETTRICE, picking up survivors, and, as the ALMACE was considered to be in a very dangerous situation, arrangements were made with the GLAISDALE to take off 185 men and 8 Officers, with pay accounts, service records, confidential communications, and other valuable papers. These were transported to Gibraltor, where they were billeted at the Colonial Hospital to swait the arrival of the ALMACE.
- 9. Twelve officers and one hundred twelve men were retained on board for the handling of the ship, gun watches, etcetra. At 1540, H.M.S. BRILLIANT reported with orders to act as anti-submarine protection for ship, and further informed us that H.M.T. JAUNTY, together with two (2) trawlers, had been ordered as tow and further escort for this vessel's return to Gibralter.
- 10. On the following day, Monday, at 1340, M.W. Tug JAUNTY arrived and took the ship in tow from a position eight miles South of Cape Santa Maria, Portugal. The ALMAACK arrived in the waters off Gibraltor at about 2300, November 17, 1942, and anchored in position, bearing 333 True, distance 1675 yards, from North Jetty Light, Gibraltor.
- Il. Recommendation of the Senior U.S. Naval Officer at Gibraltor, Rear Admiral B.H. Bieri, U.S.H., as to the disposition of the ship and crew will be made by separate correspondence when the extent of the damage has been determined by the British Naval Constructors attached to the Gibraltor Dock Yard.
