

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### SHIP! HISTORY

The U. S. S. WHEATLAND (AKA-85) is a standard C-2 hull built for the U. S. Maritime Commission by the North Carolina Shipbuilding Company at Wilmington, N. C. She was acquired by the Navy in 1944 and towed to New York for conversion, first being scheduled for conversion at the 56th Street Yard of Bethlehem Steel Company, Brooklyn, N. Y., but was actually completed at the Atlantic Basin Iron Works in Brooklyn.

The WHEATLAND, named for a county in Montana, is an attack cargo ship, part of the large Navy Amphibious Forces. She has an over-all length of 459 feet, a beam of 63 feet, and a displacement of 13,812 tons. She is designed to carry combat cargo and vehicles plus a moderate number of troops on invasions. The are 8 LCM's (landing craft mechanized) and 16 LCVP's (landing craft vehicles personnel) carried on board for use in transporting this combat material and combat personnel to the beach during invasive action. The ship has a maximum speed of approximately 17 knots, and a steaming radius of about 16,500 miles. Her armament consists of 1 - 5"/38, 4 twin 40MM, and 16 - 20MM. The laundry is operated free for the crew and a ship's store, post office and library are other facilities found aboard.

A. A. Vischio, Commander, U. S. N. R., has been Commanding Officer since the ship was taken over by the Navy, previously having commanded the U. S. S. A. TONIS (AKA-1) during which time he participated in the invasions of Italy. As a result of these successful invasions, he was awarded the Legion of Morit, Lieutenant Commander E. E. Havlik has served as Executive Officer and was instrumental in the formation of the crew during pre-commissioning days December 1944 to April 1945) at Newport, R. I.

The assigned complement before hostilities ceased with Japan was 35 officers and 325 enlisted men which includes the landing boat group.

Commissioning ceremonies were held on the 3rd of April 1945 at the Atlantic Basin Iron Works, Brooklyn, N. Y., by Captain N. U. McKitritick, U. S. N. representing the Commandant of the Brooklyn Navy Yard.

After sea trials in Long Island Sound, and completion of loading, she sailed for Hampton Roads, Virginia, 14 April, arriving noon of the following day. For the next ten days the ship went through a strenuous shakedown and amphibious training period. At the conclusion thereof, she was granted a post shakedown availability at the Norfolk Navy Yard, commencing 25 April.

On the 30th of April, the WHEATLAND cleared the Norfolk Yard and commenced loading her first cargo, of dry stores, at the Norfolk Army Base. By 5 May che was down to her marks with 5038 tons of cargo.

BEROR (ALD-121), as TU 29.6.1, the Task Unit Commander being Commander Vischio, we sailed for Fearl Harbor, Oahu, T. H., via the Panama Canal. The APD's left us at the canal; we continued on independently, transiting and clearing Panama May 14th.

OSOO on the 28th of May saw the WHEATLIND entering Pearl Harbor, where we immediately discharged our cargo, and then stood by for about 10 days. June 12 - 15 the WHEATLAND in company, for various portions of the period, with the U. S. S. BARNETT (APA-5), U. S. S. BURLESON (APA-67), U. S. S. MERRICK (AKA-97), conducted amphibious training operation off Maui, T. H.

Immediately upon our return to Pearl Harbor, we commenced loading vehicles and cargo of elements of the 9th Army Corps, plus a quantity of Favy equipment. On June 21 we embarked 252 enlisted men and 15 officers of the 9th Corps, and the same day we sailed for Leyte and Samar, P. I., being routed via Eniwetok and Ulithi Atolls, at which we stopped overnight on 29 June and 4 July respectively.

On the 7th of July 1945, the WHEATLAND entered Leyte Gulf, dropping anchor off Tarraguna, 25 miles south of Tacloban, Leyte. There we disembarked the old ents of the 9th Corps, we were carrying, with their equipment. 9 July found us crossing Leyte Gulf to Guiuan Roadstead, of Guiuan, Samar, P. I. There we lay till 14 July when we discharged the remainder of our cargo.

At first light, 16 July, the WHEATLAND sailed for Angaur in the Palaus I I rds, where we arrived 18 July. The same day we commenced loading vehicles, equipate and cargo of the 7th Marine AAA, while anchored in the open sea in 50 fathers are water. The loading was completed early in the morning of 21 July, by which is a we had also received 19 Army and 44 Marine enlisted personnel from Peleliu Isl a plus 2 Navy and 1 Marine Officers, and 193 men and 9 officers of the 7th Marine AAA.

The same day, after laboriously heaving in the anchor by a jurer windless, the regular windless having been rendered inoperative by salt water scepage, we sailed for Pearl Harbor, stopping at Eniwetok four hours for fuel, 26 July.

We arrived at Pearl Harbor 1 August 1945 and discharged our cargo, and passongers. Being granted a 10 day availability for voyage repairs, we commended a period of repairs, maintenance, and instruction that lasted until 22 August. During this time we were inspected by our division commander, Captain H. V. Mc Gown, USN, mTransDiv 72, and also made contact with our Squadron Commander's staff, ComTrans-Ron 24.

Commencing 13 August we also carried on a 24 hour a day school for student SeaBee stevedores, using the ship's own winch and hatch teams, on numbers one and two hatches, this training was concluded 19 August. On the 20th we were transferred to Temporary TransDiv 39, Temporary TransRon 22, PhibGroup 4, of the 5th Amphiblous Force Pacific Fleet.

On the 23rd of August, in company with the majority of our division, the WHEATLAND sailed for Hilo, Hawaii, T.H. where we arrived at dawn of the 24th. Immediately upon arrival we commenced loading vehicles and cargo of elements of the Fifth Marine Division at maximum speed. At first light of the 26th we moved into the stream to complete loading, and embarked 403 enlisted personnel and 11 officers of the 5th Marine Division.

At 0100 on the 27th we sailed independently for Pearl Harbor, arriving that same day, and immediately disembarked 121 enlisted men and 2 office of the ft. Marine Division.

During the afternoon of 1 September, in company with a number of amphibious 'vessels in command of Rear Admiral Reifsneider, we got underway for Sasebo, Kyushu, Japan with three day stop at Saipan; Marianas Islands, for logistics. For the first time the WHEATLAND sailed in convoy, there being a total of 34 ship's including escorts. The voyage was uneventful; we sighted our first Japanese Islands at dawn September 21st, and passed several more during the day. Early on the 22nd found as steaming up to Sasebo, Kyushu, Japan, from the south. Shortly after daybreak we sighted the entrance to Sasebo Harbor and anchored off the entrance with the rost of the formation, to lower our boats. By 0800 we were underway again entering the harbor, anchoring shortly thereafter just inside to await the securing of the docks areas.

At noon a Japanese pilot came aboard, and ten minutes later we were underway for the docks, our berth being in the Repair Basin of the Navy Yard. It 133 we were moored to the dock, the first United States or Allied ship to dock in Sucbo. We commenced discharging cargo immediately and continued at top speed, coupl. Sing same and disembarking the last of our troops in the early hours of September 25th. At O800 we moved out to a berth in the lewer harbor, having completed our part in the occupation of Sasebo, Kyushu, Japan.

The next phase of our journey started a short time after 1000 on the sere day when we, as a member of TransRon'22, steamed out for Subic Bay, P.I. We arrived there on the 30th in the morning, and after taking on board 4 LCM's and 1 LCM's as replacements for those left in Japan, we got underway in the afternoon for No. 12. Bay, P.I. At 2029 that night the anchor was let go at Manila Bay off Cavite, P.I. Here we encountered high winds and a rough sea, but took aboard dry and frezen stores plus a quantity of fuel.

On the 2nd of October, it was underway again, this time for Lingayen Gulf, P.I., we were, as before, in company with TransRon 22. The next afternoon saw us anchored in Lingayen Gulf off San Fabian, P.I. We wasted no time; that same evening at 2050 commenced loading elements of 32nd Division, U. S. Army, using our ship's boats. We embarked 102 enlisted men and 11 officers in addition to the carge of the same division by the 6th of October. Underway again on the 9th of October proceeding with TransRon 22 to our next stop, Sasebo, Kyushu, Japani

Matushima Suido special anchorage, Kyushu, Japan was our next stop, where we anchored at 0617 on the morning of the 13th. At 1540 the same afternoon, we were moving again until 1835, at which time we were moored in Berth H-3, Sasebo Harbor, Kyushu, Japan. A few hours later the same day, we began unloading cargo.

This concludes the history of the U.S.S. WHE.TL.ND up to 15 October 1945.

1. As directed by references (a), (b), and (c), the following report is submitted.

- 1. On 22 September 1945 this vessel a unit of Transport Division THIRTY-NINE (Temporary) forming a part of Transport Squadron TWENTY-TWO (Temporary, Amphibious Group FOUR entered Sasebo, KG, Kyushu, Japan and discharged troops and cargo in accordance with Commander, Transport Squadron TWENTY-TWO (Temporary) Occupation Order A2-45. This ship furnished boats to various units of the squadron as ordered by Commander, Transport Squadron TWENTY-TWO (Temporary) and Commander, Transport Division THIRTY-NINE (Temporary). This vessel debarked troops and cargo at a dock in Sasebo Navy Yard, completing unloading at 0230 Item time, 25 September. Got underway from lower harbor at 1001 Item time, 25 September and departed the area as ordered by Gammander, Transport Squadron TWENTY-TWO (Temporary).
- 1. This ship was a unit of Task Group 54.21 composed of 18 APAs, 8 AKAs and 1 LSV under the Command of Commander, Amphibious Group FOUR.
- 2. Sertied from Pearl Harbor, T.H., at 1000 Victor William time on 1 September 1945 enroute to Saipan, Marianas Island. Enroute conducted general drills, daily briefing of troops and crew on operation and landing orders. Haneuvering exercises were conducted by OTC on serveral occasions. Arrived Saipan at 1155 King time, 13 September 1945. Received legistics and departed at 1609 King time on 16 September 1945. Enroute Sasobe, Kyushu, Japan, conducted general drills and daily briefing if orew and troops. Schoduled training at Saipan was cancelled due to heavy smalls.
- 3, Our election was to land troops and supplies in continuouse of the exemption of the departure implies at the state of propert salistage and disorder, and to income traplate out provides of the departure.

#### 22 September 1945

0703 - Anchored in outer anchorage, Sasebo, Kyushu, Japan.

0704 - Lowered away all boats.

0725 - All boats dispatched in accordance, Master Boat Employment Plan, Alternate 2.

0752 - Underway for inner harbor.

1159 - Japanese Pilots came aboard and two tugs alongside to assist in moving into Boat Repair Basin, Sasebo Navy Yard.

1212 - Underway for Boat Repair Basin.

1338 - Made fast to dock in Boat Repair Basin.

1340 - Started unloading troops and cargo.

#### 25 September 1945

0230 - Completed unloading cargo and troops.

0803 - Underway for lower anchorage.

0926 - Anchored in lower harbor.

1001 - Underway, departing the area.

### PART IV - ORDNANCE

- 1. As this operation was conducted without enemy opposition, no offensive or defensive action was necessary by this Task Group.
  - 2. No enemy resistance encountered.

### PART V - DAMAGE

- 1. There was no damage incurred by this vessel during this operation.
- There was no damage inflicted upon the enemy.

### PART VI - AMPHIBIOUS ACTION

- 1. TROOPS AND CARGO.
  - A. This vessel embarked 282 enlisted men and 9 officers of various units of the 5th Marine Division.
  - B. These troops embarked at Hilo, Hawaii, T.H., during the period 24 to 26 August 1945, and disembarked at Sasebo, Kyushu, Japan on 22 September 1945.
  - C. A total of 2118.5 tons of cargo was received aboard consisting of:

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1186.2 Tons of general cargo 335.4 Tons of ammunition 115 Tons of gasoline 156 Miscellaneous vehicles

- D. Cargo loaded at Hilo, Hawaii, T.H., 24 to 26 August inclusive and discharged 22 to 25 September at Sasebo Naval Base, Sasebo, Japan. All cargo loading and unloading was conducted by ship's crew with assistance of embarked Marines.
- 2. LANDING CRAFT.
  - A. This vessel had 8 LCM(3)s, 15 LCVPs, and 1 LCPL.
  - B. Landing craft dispatched in accordance with Master Boat Plan. No ship's boats were used for unloading this ship's cargo or personnel. However, during the unloading phase, boats were made available to other units of the squadron.

#### SPECIAL PEATURES AND INCIDENTS

- 1. The Japanese Pilots and tugs were of no assistance in docking.
  This ship made use of own LCM(3)s for cocking and undocking.
  Dock area in which this vessel was moored was very congested with
  Japanese material.
- 2. In the first 12 hours of unloading 33 per cent of cargo was discharged. At that time the dock became so congested that the average for each 12 hours thereafter dropped to 16 per cent.

  Lack of adequate transportation from dock to dumps caused this drastic cut and considerably delaying the unloading.

### PART VII - PERSONNEL PERFORMANCE AND CASUALTIES

- All hands performed their duties in a highly satisfactory manner.
   They worked long hours and were commended for their admirable spirit and devotion to their duties.
- No casualties of any nature were incurred.

### PART VIII - LESSONS LEARNED, CONCLUSIONS, AND RECOMMENDATIONS

1. It is considered that this operation was well planned and executed by all units concerned.
