

#### A NAVAL COMMISSIONING

The commissioning ceremony marks the transition of a ship from construction status or reserve fleet status to active service as a unit of the United States Fleet. The distinctive mark of a ship in full commission is the commission pennant which is flown continuously except when replaced by the personal flag of an officer of the United States embarked in an official status.

At the moment of hoisting the commission pennant the United States Ship WYANDOT (AKA 92) becomes the responsibility of her Commanding Officer who, together with her crew, has the duty of making and keeping her constantly ready for any service demanded by our nation in peace or in war.

#### HISTORY OF WYANDOT

USS WYANDOT, named for a county in Northwestern Ohio, which in turn had been named for a tribe of Indians of that region, was built for the U.S. Maritime Commission by the Moore Dry Dock and Shipbuilding Company, Oakland, California, and was launched on 26 June 1944. But she was acquired and commissioned by the Navy on 30 September 1944, as an attack cargo ship.

WYANDOT saw service in the Pacific from the time of her commissioning to the end of World War II. It was during this period that WYANDOT participated in the invasion of Okinawa. At the war's end, she remained a member of the Pacific Fleet until December 1945, at which time she became a member of the Atlantic Fleet and operated off the East Coast until July 1947 when she departed for Arctic Operations. This was the beginning of WYANDOT's participation in various operations in the Arctic and Antarctic waters.

In 1955 WYANDOT was one of the major units of Task Force Forty Three which conducted operation Deep Freeze in the Antarctic in 1955-56 under the leadership of RADM R. E. BYRD. When the WYANDOT was making another Antarctic voyage in 1959, she carried on deck the first plane ever to land at the South Pole, a Navy R4D aircraft named **Que Sera Sera**.

WYANDOT was decommissioned on 10 July 1959 and thereby became a member of the U.S. Atlantic Reserve Fleet, and so remains until joining the active fleet today.

For her services in the fleet, WYANDOT is authorized to display the American Campaign Medal Ribbon, the Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal Ribbon with one battle star, World War II Victory Medal, and the National Defense Service Ribbon.

#### WYANDOT'S MISSION

USS WYANDOT (AKA-92) a member of the Amphibious Force is an attack cargo ship with a mission of landing guns, vehicles, men and supplies in the condition and order needed by the assault troops.

To accomplish its mission WYANDOT carries a total of fourteen landing craft and two control boats. In this type of vessel, landing craft are considered the main battery. The landing craft have the ability to transport a number of combat loaded troops and/or cargo to the beach and thereby inflict WYANDOT's punch against the enemy. These boats run through the surf to a beach, lower the ramp, unload men and cargo, retreat and return to the ship.

The cargo WYANDOT will transport may be combat rolling stock or bulk combat supplies carried in one of the ship's seven holds. Four of the holds are forward of the ship's superstructure and three aft. To enable ship's company to efficiently operate these holds the ship is provided with various cargo booms—four 30 ton booms and six 10 ton booms—with their appurtenant rigging which allows for safe operation.

WYANDOT has an allowance of 24 officers and 241 enlisted men. Troops are also carried when the ship is combat loaded.

Because of WYANDOT's ability to load, transport, offload, and move to the beach necessary equipment and cargo she plays a vital role in Amphibious Landings and is an essential unit in modern Amphibious warfare.



# REAR ADMIRAL FREDERICK BURDETT WARDER, USN

Rear Admiral Warder was born in Grafton, West Virginia, and attended parochial and public schools there before his appointment to the U. S. Naval Academy at Annapolis, Maryland, where he graduated with the class of 1925.

He was assigned to USS MILWAUKEE and spent two and a half years on board before entering Submarine School at New London, Connecticut in January 1928. He joined USS S-16 in July of that year, and from then until August 1948 all of his sea duty assignments were in the submarine service.

As commanding officer of USS SEAWOLF during World War II he saw extensive action in the Pacific and for that service he was awarded the Navy's highest decoration, the Navy Cross. Subsequent war patrols in SEAWOLF brought him a second Navy Cross, a Bronze Star Medal, two Navy Unit Commendations, and two individual Letters of Commendation. He relinquished command of SEAWOLF in January 1943 to become Commander of Submarine Division 122. He also commanded Submarine Squadron THREE and USS COLUMBUS.

Admiral Warder was appointed to flag rank in September 1952, and has flown his flag as Commander, Cruiser Division FIVE and as Commander Submarine Force, U. S. Atlantic Fleet. Other flag rank assignments were Deputy Chief of Staff for the Commander in Chief, U. S. Atlantic Fleet and Assistant Chief of Naval Operations for Undersea Warfare.

He assumed duties as Commandant of the Eighth Naval District, with headquarters in New Orleans, on January 29, 1960.



#### REAR ADMIRAL JAMES C. DEMPSEY, USN

Rear Admiral Dempsey was born in Eastport, Maryland on August 30, 1908 and
entered the U.S. Naval Academy in 1927.
He graduated in 1931 and after two years
service on the USS OKLAHOMA entered
the submarine service in 1933. After
coaching boxing at the Naval Academy for
three months he served in submarines from
1934 to June 1938. He then attended post
graduate school at the Naval Academy and
graduated from the General Line Course in

1939. From July 1939 to January 1940 he was an instructor and plans officer at the Naval Torpedo Station, Newport, Rhode Island. He then rejoined the USS SHARK, where he had seen duty previously, as executive officer. In November 1941 he left the SHARK to assume command of the USS S-37 in the Philippines. While he was commanding, the S-37 was the first U.S. submarine ever to sink an enemy destroyer. This feat, during the battle of Makassar Strait, earned him the Navy Cross. From March 1942 to March 1943 he was Commanding Officer of the USS SPEARFISH and while holding this command he was awarded a Gold Star in lieu of a second Navy Cross. Completing his tenth war patrol, while in command of the USS COD, he was awarded the Silver Star Medal, the Bronze Star Medal with Combat "V," and a Gold Star in lieu of the second Bronze Star Medal for heroic service during patrols of the SPEAR-FISH and COD. He served for two months as Operational Planning Officer on the Staff of Commander Submarines, Southwest Pacific Force before serving as Operations Officer on the Staff of Commander, Submarines, Atlantic Fleet. During the later part of 1945 and until November 1946 he commanded Submarine Divisions 101 and 72. For services during World War II he received three Letters of Commendation, with Ribbon, two stars and Combat "V." Admiral Dempsey's post war assignments have included duty on USS ADIRONDACK; executive officer of the Submarine Base, Pearl Harbor and as acting Commanding Officer of that base; Senior Course at the Naval War College; Commander Submarine Squadron One; Joint Staff, Joint Chiefs of Staff; Joint Strategic Planning Group; Deputy Chief of Staff (Plans) to the Commander Submarines, Eastern Atlantic (NATO); Commanding Officer USS WACCAMAW; Second-in-Command of the Mobile Logistic Support Force Sixth Fleet; Commander Submarine Flotilla One; and Commander Military Sea Transportation Service, Atlantic Area, Brooklyn, New York.

Admiral Dempsey is presently serving as Commander Amphibious Group Two, U.S. Atlantic Fleet.

## CAPTAIN F. R. WHITBY, JR., USN

Captain F. R. Whitby, Jr., was graduated from the University of California, Berkeley, California, in 1934 and was commissioned in the U. S. Naval Reserve in May of that year. At the commencement of World War II he was assigned to active duty at Treasure Island, but shortly thereafter was in the South Pacific as executive officer of the USS WHIPSTOCK. While in that area he was transferred to the USS KANKAKEE (AO 39) as gunnery officer and later became executive officer. From March 1944 until December 1945 he served again in the Pacific, as executive officer of the USS DREW (APA 172). After accepting a commission in the regular navy early in 1946, he went to the USS BALTIMORE (CA 68) as executive officer and as commanding officer when she was decommissioned in Bremerton, Washington.

After tours of duty with Pacific Reserve Fleet in Bremerton and the Staff, General Line School, Monterey, California, he became Commanding Officer of the USS RICHARD B. ANDERSON (DD 786) which saw action in the Korean Conflict, and while commanding the RICHARD B. ANDERSON he was awarded two bronze stars. After being relieved of command of the RICHARD B. ANDERSON in May 1954 he served tours of duty on the Staff, Commander Destroyer Flotilla Six based at Newport R. I. and at the Naval Ordnance Test Station, China Lake, California. Then in July 1957 Captain Whitby became Division Commander of Destroyer Division 172 in the Pacific, which he held until February 1959.

Captain Whitby then served as Assistant Chief of Naval Personnel for Morale Services, and it is from that post that he comes to command WYANDOT.

Captain Whitby resides with his wife and family at Virginia Beach, Virginia.

# Uniform:

The uniform prescribed for officers participating in the Ceremony will be Full Dress Blue Bravo. Navy guests may wear Service Dress Blue Bravo. Other military guests may wear appropriate winter uniform.
