1. In accordance with reference (a), the history of the U.S.S. PRENTISS is submitted.
2. The U.S.S. PRINTISS was built by the North Carolina Shipbuilding Company at Wilmington, North Carolina and launched on 6 December 1944. Mrs. Roger Williams of Phoebus, Virginia was sponsor. The ship was of C-2 Maritime Commission design and was given sea trials off Cape Fear on 11 January 1945.
3. The vessel was accepted by the U. S. Navy on 12 January and temporarily placed in commission under command of Commander C. $M_{0}$ Doar, USNR. Ship was sailed in charge of ferry crew to Charleston Navy Yard for fitting out. Upon arrival in Charleston, South Carolina the ship was placed out of commission and fitting out begun.
4. On 11 February 1945 the PRENTISS was placed in full commission under command of Lt. Comdr. G. P. Walker, USNR and left on 21 February for shakedown in Chesapeake Bay area.
5. Following a ten day shakedown and a short period of availability in Norfolk Navy Yard the ship was loaded with general cargo at Naval Supply Depot, Norfolk and sailed for Pearl Harbor on 16 March 1945 via the Panama Canal. The trip out was uneventful and cargo was discharged on 13 April.
6. Following unloading the ship was assigned to an amphibious training squadron under command of Commodore J. R. Palmer, USN and exercised in area south of Oahu Island. While in training group PRWNTISS was detached and ordered to Pearl Harbor to load ammunition for forward areas.
7. The ship was sailed on 6 May with 2,500 tons of ammunition plus 500 tons general cargo for Samar and Okinawa via Eniwetok and Ulithi. The trip to the Philippines was quiet-no eneny activity noted. The ship ran unescorted full distance. On 27 May commenced discharging cargo belonging to Eighth Army at Leyte. Later 1,200 tons of ammanition was discharged for Marine Air Group Twelve at Guiuan, Samar, Phillippines.

Damage was sustained by U.S.S. CURTISS and several smaller units. At approximately 2100 two enemy planes closed the PRRNTISS from the south. One attempted to crash dive the ship but was shot down in flames by PRENTISS' guns and crashed off port bow. Numerous small shrapnel holes punctured ship's plating in that area. Small parts of plane were found about decks next morning. There were no casualties to ship's personnel.
9. The PRENTISS remained at Kerama Rhetto about five days discharging a small amount of general cargo. Following this the vessel sailed for Hagushi, Okinawa to discharge 1,200 tons of ammunition consigned to Marine Air Group Fourteen.
10. The ammunition was discharged in about ten days and ship was sailed in convoy, Commander R. E. Perry, USN, OTC to Saipan. While discharging at Hagushi, the area was subjected to numerous eneny air attacks-particularly at night. None of these attacks were successful due primarily to excellent protection given by our combat air patrol.
11. Upon arrival at Saipan, PRENTISS was ordered to report to San Francisco for loading and was sailed independently on 11 July , arriving San Francisco 28 July. A short period of availability in the stream was granted the ship.
12. While at San Francisco the original loading orders calling for 4,500 tons of ammunition for forward areas were changed due to cessation of hostilities with Japan. The ship was finally loaded with 2,500 tons of general cargo and sailed for Pearl Harbor arriving 26 August 1945.
13. After discharging at Pearl, PRENTISS was ordered to await further orders. On 14 September the ship sailed for Eniwetok Atoll to load and be onward routed to the Philippines.
14. Upon arrival at Eniwetok on 23 September PRIKNTISS anchored and on 29 September commenced loading cargo from the Dutch merchantman POEJAU LAUT which had broken down enroute from San Francisco to Manila, and had put into Eniwetok for repairs. Loading was completed 12 October, and sailed for Manila, Philippine Islands.
15. The voyage to Manila was uneventul. PRENTISS arrived at Manila 21 October and completed unloading 27 October.

## Subj: U.S.S. PRENTISS (AKA 102). History of. 7 February 1946

16. While in Manila PRENTISS received orders to Fremantle, Australia and on 27 October got underway in accordance with these orders to load cargo for the U. S. at Fremantle. The voyage to Fremantle was uneventful.
17. PRENTISS arrived Australia 6 November and loaded 750 tons of ammuition for the U. S. At this time PRENTISS' original orders to the U.S. were modified and an additional 3400 tons of provisions consigned to Batavia, Java, Netherlands East Indies. Ioading at Fremantle was completed 28 November and PRENTISS sailed 30 November for Batavia.
18. Upon arrival at Tanjoeng Priok, the port for Batavia, on 8 December 1945 ship anchored and commenced discharging cargo using ship's boats. On 9 December PRENTTESS received orders to cease unloading operations and await further orders due to inadequate facilities ashore to handle cargo being discharged.
19. On 19 December PRENTISS received orders to proceed to Nakassar, Celebes, N.E.I. to discharge the remainder of cargo originally consigned to Batavia. The voyage from Tanjoeng Priok to Makassar was uneventful until arriving in the lakassar approach channel on 22 December where a horn type floating mine was sighted. Mine was exploded by 20 MM gun fire from PRENTISS.
20. All cargo consigned to Makassar was unloaded on 3 January 1946 and on 5 January 1946 PRiNTISS got underway for Samar, Philippine Islands for logistics and onward routing to the U. S.
21. On arrival Samar PRENTISS anchored in Guiuan Roadstead and commenced to provision ship and refuel. These operations were completed 13 January.
22. PRFNTISS got underway for U. S. on 14 January but when underway five hours was ordered to report to Commander United States Naval Forces Australia-New Guinea for operational control. PRiNTISS returned to Samar for further logistics and to await orders from Commander United States Naval Forces Australia-New Guinea,
. 23. On 15 January at Samar, Philippine Islands in accordance with orders from BuPers, Commander George P. Walker, U.S.N.R. was relieved as Commanding Officer, for release to inactive duty, by Lt. Comdr., Richard H. Tibbets, U.S.N. R. All officers and men aboard PRENTISS eligible for discharge or release to inactive duty were transferred to the Receiving Station, Samar for transportation to the U. S.
23. On 17 January PRUNTISS received orders to Milne Bay, New Guinea to pick up cargo, and in accordance with these orders sailed 17 January arriving there on 24 January 1946.

26. During period covered while in Pacific, PRENTISS was attached to Transport Division 68, Capt. Crutcher, USN, Commander, and Transport Squadron 23, Conmodore Wetherspoon, USN, Commander, but never operated with these units.

## Description of action

2305 Set general quarters as a result of radio flash "Blue", control "Green", a warning of air attack probable.

2332 Information received of air attack imminent - flash "Red", control "Yellow".
2334 The order to commence firing was given to guns bearing on plane attacking ship from starboard quarter. The plane approached the ship from astern on the starboard quarter and veered across our stern and attempted to wing over and crash our port bow. While in area of port quarter one bomb was released. Just before crashing the plane released a bomb opposite our port bow some 200 feet from the ship, then crashed into the water approximately 75 feet from the port bow. Fragments of plane's bomb and shrapnel penetrated the ship's skin above the waterline at several places. Installations topside in the forward area were likewise damaged slightly and penetrated. No serious material damage to ship and no personnel were injured. The plane was observed in flames before crashing, and upon striking the water sank immediately.
