Once again the ships of Amphibious Squadron Twelve are preparing to deploy to the Caribbean Sea area. Together with elements of the United States Marine Corps, a Helicopter Squadron, Underwater Demclition Teams and other special units they will form an Amphibious Task Group. The mission of the Task Group in the Caribbean is to be ready twenty four hours a day to strike out and repel any aggressive force which would threaten to destroy the free peoples living in that area. 




THE FAMILY SERVICES CENTER
