


"BATTLE OF GUAM"

On 21 July 1944, the Third Marine Division and the First Provisional Marine Brigade, with the 77th Infantry Division in reserve, began the invasion of line Brigade, with the 77th Infantry Division in reserve, began the invasion of Guam. The assault troops landed after the most complete pre-landing bombardment (an air and naval operation which lasted 13 days) in the Pacific war. In spite of the intense preparatory bombardment, the twenty-day campaign to wrest the island from its determined defenders cost the lives of 1289 American servicemen and more than 10,000 Japanese. The capture of Guam American servicemen and Tinian, provided the Allies with bases from which to launch the devastating B-29 raids which were climaxed by the use of atomic bomb on Hiroshima and Nagasaki.



Guam was the first occupied American territory to be retaken from the Japanese and, in addition to its obvious military value, the island's recapture provided a strong morale boost to the American people.

SHIP'S CREST FOR USS GUAM

BACKGROUND

In developing the ship's crest for the USS GUAM, it was attempted to In developing the ship's crest for the USS GUAM, it was attempted to symbolize by heraldic devisements, three main well springs of significance: the mission of an amphibious assault ship (LPH), the Battle of Guam in World War II and other major events in the island history, and the close tactical relationship of the NAVY-MARINE CORPS team.

SYMBOLISM

SHIECLISM

SHIELD: The chevron rompu (the broken chevron) in the middle of the shield symbolizes an amphibious attack. The caltrop (spike) at bottom of the shield is used to symbolize the Navy's support of the assault forces. This also symbolizes the shoulder sleeve insignia of the Third Marine Division which made the initial assault landings for the liberation of the island of Guam in 1944. The chief embattled of three gules (the top of the shield with staggered bottom edge) alludes to an area under triphibious attack and also depicts the three segarate landings made by the amphibious forces in 1944. The chief embattled also alludes to the island of Guam in that the native Guamaniane were from Chamorri the ancient name for the chief in the Chamorro vernagular. Blue and Chamorri the ancient name for the chief in the Chamorro vernacular. Blue and Gold are the colors of the Navy and Scarlet and Gold the colors of the Marine Corps. The latter colors are also the colors of Spain and allude to the discovery of the island of Guam by the Spanish under Magellan.

CREST: The winged grenade refers to the Marines and the assault landings made by sea and air based on and supported by the crossed anchors symbolic of the Navy. The wings also depict the winged helmet of the old Viking sea rovers, their intense love of individual freedom, and their aggressive and fight-

SUPPORTERS: The winged alligators symbolize the triphibious concept of assoult through the three mediums of sea, air and land. They also symbolize the fierce, tenacious epirit of the amphibious forces with the once scornful name gator" now being worn as a well earned mark of honor. The crossed palm fronds symbolize victory and also allude to the tropical location of the island
