- The wounded men listed in paragraph six of the basic letter will be awarded Furple Hearts as soon as a supply reaches this Command.

- The ICI(L) #1 has been recommended by me for a Presidential Morit Citation. The action of her personnel, at the end, was in keeping with this citation, and no blame is attached to any person in the Naval Service for her loss.

1. Forwarded, concurring in the recommendations made in paragraphs 7 and 8 of the basic letter. A letter of appreciation for assistance rendered by ships of Flotilla One has already been addressed to the Group Commander.

- 2. The loss of ICI(L) One was particularly distressing to all of Flotilla Two as this gallant ship had performed outstanding duty in the SICILIAN invasion and had been recommended for a Presidential Unit Citation. The Captain, Executive Officer and several of the enlisted personnel have also been recommended for suitable individual awards.
- 3. By separate despatch to his immediate superior in Command, the Flotilla Commander has recommended that the officers and men of LCI(L) number one be transferred to the United States as a unit to take over a new LCI(L) to be designated as LCI(L) Number One in order that this fine ships company may continue as a unit in the war.
- 4. It is the opinion of the Flotilla Commander that the loss of LCI(L) number one was incident to enemy action, that the ship was well handled, that all hands performed their duty in a manner to be expected of a unit citation ships company and that no blame is attached to any person in the naval service for the loss. It is recommended that no further action in this respect be taken.

- This command desires to point out that the loss of the ship was due to enemy action and that no blame can be attached to any officer or member of the crew of ICI(L) One. This statement is made after careful investigation into the circumstances surrounding the case.



Subject: Loss of LCI(L) No. 1.

This ship was sunk on August 17, 1943 at approximately 2200B.

2. The position of the ship after sinking was 37° 13' 20" North and 90 51' 12" East.

3. The sea was calm and visibility was good.

4. Ship was on a course approximately 095° true. The speed varied from 2/3 to full.

We were underway through the channel enroute to Lac de Bizerte proceeding at two-thirds speed; and enemy planes were overhead. I did not deem it advisable to proceed at greater speed because wake would reveal position of > channel to enemy planes. The enemy then dropped flares illuminating lake and channel. When we were approximately 300 yards from S.S. PAINE WINGATE, the enemy dropped flares over S.S. PAINE WINGATE and we went ahead at full speed in an attempt to get out of that area as quickly as possible. We had just attained full speed when an enemy plane dropped an incendiary bomb just aft the conning tower. The bomb set fire to fuel oil in service tanks immediately, and flames engulfed the ship amidships. Control and communication was disrupted immediately when bomb hit. The switchboard in the engine room was blown aft and up against the controls in engine room; ladder leading topside was disengaged on top. Engine room force succeeded in getting topside by climbing up hand rails. The command to abandon ship was given but due to the fact that communications were disrupted, it was impossible for anyone with the exception of the number one gun crew to hear the command. In the meantime ship was drifting and collided with the S.S. PAINE WINGATS, our bow hitting them forward on port side. I managed to get a line over to the WINGATE and with the help of their ship's force succeeded in getting Bos'n Joseph L. PALMER, Executive Officer who was wounded, aboard the WINGATE and then I went aboard. All men succeeded in getting off the ship and none were killed. Fourteen men and one officer were picked up by the LCI(L) 236; four men picked up by LCI(L) 324; four picked up by U.S.S. DELTA and two by S.S. PAINE WINGATE. The LCI(L) 236 and LCI(L) 324 proceeded as close to flaming hulk of ship as was necessary to pick up the men in the water. They performed this duty with great danger to themselves and are hereby commended for their courageous action. The S.S. PAINE WINGATE extended Bos'n PAINER and myself every courtesy. In this action we did not fire on the enemy planes. All the planes that we could see were out of range of our guns. - 7 -

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- The following is a list of those who were wounded:
 - (a) Bosn Joseph L. PALLER, D-V(S), USNR, File No. 144308. Flesh wound in right leg; burns on arms, hands and face. Condition serious.

(b) SWILM, Warne Alexander, BMIc, 551 54 58, USNR. Right leg broken; burns about hands and arms.

(c) MOORE, Edward Charles, GEGC, 664 33 58, USNR. Right eye badly injured, severe schrapnel wound in neck and schrapnel wounds about chest and body.

(d) AILEN, Oscar Owen, QM3c, 622 41 59, USNR. One leg bruised and wrenched.

(e) CRMEN, Richard Lee, SM3c, 670 68 74, USNR. Schrapnel wounds and burns about the chest, hands and face.

(f) ALEXANDER, Marvin Lamar, S2c, 650 65 03, USNR. Schrapnel wounds and sprained or broken ankle.

(g) BRAGG, James Henry, Slc, 636 72 36, USNR. Schrapnel wound in head.

(h) AURAND, Ralph Edwin, S2c, 300 77 46, USNR. Schrapnel wounds in head and thigh. Neck strained.

(i) PITTS, Carl Benjamin, RMLc 660 16 27, USNR. Fractured knee and multiple schrapnel wounds.

(j) DELPERDANG, Arnold Hubert, Modalic, 620 55 56, USNR. Multiple schrapnel wounds; one leg strained or bruised.

(k) EEVER, Bernard Wilson, MohM2c, 654 43 77, USAR. Burns on arms and back.

(1) BOUTTLIER, Curtis Suther, MolM2c, 368 73 62, USN. Burns on arms, hands and other places about the body.

- 7. This is the second time that Bos'n Jospeh L. PAILER has been wounded in action by the enemy. It is recommended that he be awarded the order of the Purple Heart with a Clasp.
- 8. It is further recommended that the enlisted men who were wounded and listed in this report be awarded the order of "The Purple Heart."
- 9. In colliding with the S.S. PAINE WINGATE no damage was done to the merchant ship. We were going approximately 2 to 3 knots when collision occured. It was not of sufficient force to warrant the making out of a collision report.
