

Fleet Organization and Operations in the D-Day Invasion

LST-496

The 496 was commissioned on December 19, 1943, and left for France with LCT-708 as deck cargo. At Normandy, the Commanding Officer was Lt. Stanley H. Koch, USNR, and Lt. Frederick A. Hartung, USNR, was XO.

The 496 was carrying an LCVP Landing Boat Crew, LST Medical Group 35, Foxy 29, and war correspondent Albert Q. Maisel from Cosmopolitan magazine. Lt. Ozell A. Atkins, USNR, the senior surviving officer, reported in August:

On 11 June 1944, the USS LST-496 was in convoy proceeding to Dog Red, Omaha Beach, France. At about 0600, 11 June 1944, the ship had departed from Portland, England, with full cargo consisting mainly of light and medium tanks, but also containing a few half-tracks, jeeps, and two and one-half ton trucks.

The ship carried a complement of 142 enlisted men, 13 officers plus one Army medical officer assigned to the ship. In addition there were approximately 241 Army enlisted men and 17 Army officers on board as passengers.

At 2215, 11 June 1944, the ship was approximately six miles from its destination (Commanding Officer and Executive Officer on conn), at least two mines were hit. There were two blasts almost simultaneously, but with enough delay to indicate there were two mines instead of one. These mines may have been of three types, contact, magnetic or acoustic. The center of the blast was approximately at frame 43 about 13 feet inboard from port side of ship. The damage to the ship was tremendous. A hole, approximately 35 or 40 feet in diameter was blown through the bottom of the ship; the blast extended upward actually blowing off a large part of the super-conn, boat davit number 6, its motor and etc.

Since the blast was under Officer's Country, tremendous damage was done to most of this area. The main deck was blown open as far as athwartship as the starboard bulkhead, forward into the wardroom, and aft on the port side to Compartment 108. Upon hitting the mines, the auxiliary engine room was knocked out leaving the ship in complete darkness immediately. The main engine room was also completely flooded in less than one minute.

All officers of the ship's complement were either killed or injured. The number of casualties among

the enlisted men was approximately 75%. Most of the officers and a high percentage of the men were incapacitated and therefore, because of injuries received, unable to take part in the actions following the blast. The Commanding Officer and Executive Officer were immediately killed when mines were hit. Although water-tight integrity had been carefully set, it was immediately obvious, due to the tremendous damage to the ship, that it was only a matter of a short time before it would sink.

The immediate problem was to get all men including those injured and dead off the ship as soon as possible. The cooperation received from other ships nearby was excellent. At least one corvette, two patrol craft and a destroyer escort came alongside to remove the injured before the ship sank. In addition, a large number of small boats were sent to the scene by various ships. With this excellent assistance, all men were removed from the ship before sinking. This included all injured and dead that could be located after several complete searches. It is believed, however, that a few men were trapped, particularly in the main engine room, since they are missing.

All officers and men performed efficiently and bravely in carrying out their duties in caring for the injured, removing them from the ship, and in abandoning ship. There was no hysteria and not a single individual abandoned the ship until he was ordered to do so. Immediately upon a ship coming along-side, the injured were started to be removed and at the same time the Army was requested to begin abandoning ship. This process continued until all injured and dead and the Army were off the ship.

Several men risked their lives after the ship was in a critical sinking condition to carefully check compartments and other areas to make certain that no injured men were left behind. Injured men were therefore removed from areas that normally would not be entered under the dangerous conditions existing. The Senior Surviving Officer noted a number of instances of men who performed action above the line of duty including one man severely injured assisting in evacuating other men also injured.

The last men to leave the ship were members of the ship's complement who were uninjured. The last officers and uninjured men left the ship approximately five minutes before it sank. The ship remained afloat approximately forty minutes. Due to the tremendous damage done to the ship, the fact that the officers and men primarily responsible for the ship's records were either killed or incapacitated and due to the large number of injured and dead it was impossible to save the ship's records. Therefore this report is written without complete information.

Thirty-nine survivors were taken to Vicarage Barracks. The Army casualties were estimated at eight officers lost and four wounded. Five were reported uninjured. Among the troops, six were known lost and ten injured. PC-568 took aboard 21 non-injured crew and 129 non-injured Army personnel from Co. C and Co. G, Service, Headquarters, Transportation Service, Maintenance, and 3rd Battery of the 67th A.R. On the afternoon of June 11 LST-283 began taking aboard 156 casualties and 31 survivors from the 496 and the Nelson and at 4 p.m. on the 12th got underway for Portland. At 3:50 on the morning of June 12 LCI-490 brought 25 casualties from the 496 to LST-511 for treatment. At 7:30 p.m. on the 13th the 31 uninjured survivors were transferred to the Royal Navy's trawler/minesweeper Overfall in Weymouth Roads. Some seriously wounded remained aboard.

Monday, June 12

ATR-13 was towing Whale Unit 630. Just before 1 a.m. lookouts on the tug heard cries for help and it was quickly determined the Whale unit was sinking. One minute later it went under. The tug stopped engines and went to Man Overboard stations but the Whale Unit acted as an anchor preventing the tug from maneuvering to pick up survivors.

As reported:

Dropped life rings, turned searchlights on men and followed their movements as long as possible, meanwhile cutting towing pendant with acetylene torch. Unable to lower boats as sea and wind very strong.
